Introduction to Adoption

November is National Adoption Month. Where can you find a child to adopt? Despite the myth that it is faster and easier to adopt internationally, adopting through U.S. foster care may be your best option. According to the AdoptUSKids website, there are currently 104,000 children in the U.S. foster care system who are legally available and waiting for an adoptive home. U.S. Department of Health and Human Services reports that 51,000 children were adopted in 2011 through U.S. foster care and only 9,320 were adopted by U.S. citizens from all international sources combined. By 2013, the number adopted through U.S. foster care remained steady but the number of international adoptions to the U.S. had dropped to 7,092. Since 2009, the country providing the largest number of children for international adoption by U.S. citizens was China, followed by Ethiopia, Russia, South Korea and Ukraine. The average time to complete an international adoption from Hague Convention countries ranged from 79 days to almost two years. It takes roughly one year to adopt a child from the U.S. foster care system.

The costs associated with a foster care adoption are often much less than with an international adoption. In 2010, an international adoption from Hague Convention countries had a median cost of \$26,559, but ranged as high as

\$64,357. Most adoptions from U.S. foster care are free and many costs are reimbursable. Adoptive parents do not have to be wealthy, be young, own their own home, have other children already or be a stay-at-home parent to adopt a child from foster care. They do not have to adopt a child of the same race or ethnicity (except in Native American adoptions

where some special considerations come into play.) Adoptive parents may be permitted to adopt children who are related to them as well as children that they are fostering. Being a foster parent led to 54 percent of the adoptions of children in foster care last year. Adoptive parents may adopt children in foster care living in other states. Sometimes this takes a little longer but it is done with the help of federal laws which enable the process. Adoptive parents do not have to be married to adopt children in foster care. In 2011, 32 percent of children adopted from foster care were adopted by either a single-parent household or an unmarried couple. This includes adoptions by lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender families.

KCS Board Pushes to Discontinue SAT-10

vote. She said "time is of the essence" for the board to discuss the matter and wanted members to vote to "approve the discontinuance of the administration of the SAT-10" before the window closed on ordering the SAT-10 tests.

"It is not developmentally appropriate for our youngest students and it's not necessary," Rountree said. "We already have a mechanism in place to find out if our kids need intervention and it's the STAR test, which is mandated by the state."

McMillan requested a special call meeting, but found the scheduling to be problematic. While a simple majority (5 of the 9 members) is required on most BOE votes, a quorum of 6 members is required for a special call meeting. But McMillan wanted to set up the meeting before the Board's early November meeting, since the agenda was already packed.

Undeterred, Rountree continued to push to abolish the test. She created a simple survey to get parent and teacher input, which she placed on her Twitter and Facebook pages. She received over 600 responses, overwhelmingly opposed to the SAT-10 assessment.

Apparently feeling the pressure, McIntyre last week acquiesced slightly

to the SAT-10 test, throwing the board a bone by declaring "After much consideration, I have decided to end the administration of the SAT-10 assessment in Kindergarten in the Knox County Schools."

He explains the reasoning for using the SAT-10 test in the first place by stating in his memo, "When the Department decided that Kindergarten would be part of the SAT-10 assessment strategy, we decided to at least see if we could make it workable." But the SAT-10 assessment is NOT required by the state, something that McIntyre never acknowledged in the memo.

He insisted that the SAT-10 be continued for grades 1 and 2, saying, "I still believe the SAT-10 is appropriate and valuable in the first and second grades, and the early literacy and numeracy information the assessment provides in these grades is urgently needed to inform critical instructional and educational decisions. Therefore, I will look to continue the administration of the SAT-10 assessment in first and second grades."

Dr. McIntyre has less than one year of teaching experience. BOE members now have collectively over 60 years of teaching experience, most of it in elementary education. It is not up to the Superintendent to

unilaterally make decisions about what tests will be administered, that authority is given to local boards of education.

Rountree, who has five years of legal experience in addition to her 6 years teaching experience, again requested that McMillan schedule a special call meeting. McMillan agreed, and requested a special call meeting within the regularly scheduled work session on November 3. Both Rountree and McMillan conferred with David Buuck and Bud Armstrong in the Law Department to ensure the request was within policy and statutory bounds.

McIntyre said this meeting is "not necessary," but it is the jurisdiction of the Board Chair, not the superintendent, to request a special call meeting.

It is also "not necessary" to mandate the SAT-10 assessment for K-2, or for 1-2. In the East Tennessee area, last year the SAT-10 was given in 21 districts, including Knox, Sevier, Hamblen, Hancock, Monroe, Roane and Scott counties, as well as Athens, Maryville, Lenoir and Etowah districts. But 13 districts, including Anderson, Union, Granger, Jefferson, Cocke, Green and Blount County do not give the SAT-10. Nor do the highly acclaimed and often compared Oak Ridge and Alcoa school systems.

to audit or direct the audit committee to have her audit. Brown said the difference was a "matter of now or next month."

Commissioner Sam McKenzie agreed with Wright that the audit committee should be charged with conducting the audit, saying, "I think that's proper."

The commission also voted to direct the audit committee to review a recent report on the school system's use of Physical Plant Upgrade funds as a result of an internal audit. While no criminal violations were uncovered in the PPU audit, several inappropriate things were.

The Audit Committee is

to report back to commission in January.

Commissioner McKenzie also asked if the commission wants to continue the Joint Education Committee which ended mid-year after a one-year appointment by Commission Chairman Brad Anders. Four commissioners served on the committee that met monthly with the superintendent and four school board members to resolve differences between the two bodies. While McKenzie has said he found the committee useful apparently not all the commissioners agreed.

Commissioner Ed Brantley said it would be a good idea for the commission chairman and the school

board chairman to meet on a regular basis.

Attorney Armstrong said that the joint committee would have to be authorized by the commission and then appointed by the chairman, since the one-year terms have expired. Since the subject was a discussion item, no vote was taken.

The commission voted to postpone any more discussion on changing their meeting times and will take it up when a full commission meets again.

Also discussed with no vote was an idea from Brown to raise fees for beer sales violators but Brantley countered with how it "hurts the little guy." Brown said that in most cases the business owners simply agree to pay the \$500 fine rather than take a 30-day suspension of beer permits.

Only two people volunteered on the county ethics committee, Scott Daniel and Anthony Brown. The commission took both names in nomination and Brantley nominated Lewis Cosby, who had not applied. Armstrong said that the commissioners could nominate anyone they wanted whether the person had applied or not.

The nominees will be asked to appear before the commission at the next work session.

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School Woes and Little Children

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Having served on the Knox County Board of Education, I learned a long time ago to watch out when someone was intoning, "It's all for the children." The

election of Mike McMillan as Chairman of the Knox County Board of Education came as a distinct shock to many and the coalition of Chamber of Commerce types, the Knoxville News Sentinel and their allies tried their best to influence the contest without success. It was a struggle for power and control and they proposed to invest that authority in Superintendent Jim McIntyre.

McMillan has called a special session for the Board to consider whether or not to continue administering the SAT-10 tests to kindergarteners, as well as first and second graders.

The special called meeting of the board was requested by South Knoxville representative Amber Rountree. Rountree is a former educator herself and helped to proctor these tests and has personally witnessed the stress it has caused youngsters. McIntyre was horrified at the thought of a special session and has fought the idea bitterly. Past boards and chairs of the board of education have ceded way too much authority to McIntyre and he does not want to give it up. Few may realize that McIntyre is the sole employee of the board of education, a fact McIntyre ought

to be reminded of at every possible opportunity.

McIntyre tried to get in front of the parade by announcing, after supposedly much consideration and reflection, that he was dropping SAT-10 testing of kindergartners. The school systems in Alcoa and Oak Ridge are always held up to us whenever the Chamber folk and the Sentinel are beating the drum for higher taxes, yet both of those school systems no longer administer the SAT-10 tests to first and second graders. It is NOT mandated by the state, but by Jim McIntyre.

McIntyre's minions on the Board: Karen Carson,

Doug "High Tax" Harris, Gloria Deathridge, and Lynne Fugate will dutifully do all they can to let McIntyre have his way. They have wanted to delay serious consideration of revising policies in the hope that McIntyre supporters Tracie Sanger or Charlotte Dorsey will win tomorrow's election. McIntyre and his rubber stamps shudder at the thought of Jamie Rowe winning.

Carson has become the bully of the Board and anyone who has witnessed her recent performances can only cringe to think she votes on a bullying policy for the Knox County Board

ELL Program Serves Students from 60 Counties, 80 languages

In September when County Commission was interviewing candidates to temporarily fill Indya Kincannon's Second District BOE seat, John Fugate said he thought one of the biggest concerns in the district was the "immigrant problem." Although some reporters ridiculed him for this slightly non-PC statement, he raised an important issue.

It is an issue he is intimately familiar with. His wife, Sandra Fugate, is the ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) Program Coordinator at the UT Center for Literacy, Education, and Employment.

According to the KCS ELL website (knoxschools.org/Domain/1004), the enrollment of English Language Learners (ELLs) in Knox County Schools has doubled within the last five years and continues to increase rapidly. Approximately 2,400 English Learners from more than 60 different countries who speak 80 different languages attended KCS District schools in 2013-2014.

Also known as ESL, (English as a Second Language), the students who do not speak English as their first language represent a variety of backgrounds, home countries, native languages, and immigrant statuses. Many Knox County's ELL students are born in the US. In fact, last year 79% of all ELL students in Knox County were born in the U.S.

Alyson Lerma, KCS supervisor of world languages and English Language Learners, said that Knoxville is a refugee resettlement area,

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including families from Cuba, Columbia, Syria, Iraq, Burundi, and Myanmar. But whether ELL students are born in the U.S. as citizens, resettled in Knoxville as refugees, adopted by loving families, or living here in other circumstances, KCS has an obligation to educate them. Excellence for EVERY child.

Knox County has the fourth largest English language learner population in Tennessee. A recent report in the News Sentinel indicated that the number of Hispanic students in Knox County has almost doubled in the past five years, from 4 percent in 2010 to 7.14 percent in 2014.

But ELL students in Knox County Schools are from many cultures and backgrounds in addition to Hispanic. And not all children of foreign background are ELL students.

For example, 48% of the students at Lonsdale are Hispanic, but ELL students comprise 36% of the 372 students at Lonsdale. These students have origins in Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador, and other Latin countries, as well as, Burundi, Tanzania, and Iraq. The largest percentage of Lonsdale ELL students are Guatemalan, and Spanish is their second language. They speak different dialects of the indigenous form of Mayan, so a large number of these families aren't literate in Spanish either.

Across town, approximately 16% of Cedar Bluff Elementary students are Hispanic, but the ELL population comprises 11% of the 1138 students at the

school. Cedar Bluff ELL teacher Angie Suffridge said the school also has about 20 transition students, who have passed the ELL test but are monitored for two years as follow up.

Suffridge said when she started in ELL at Cedar Bluff, the school had the largest number of ELL students at any one school in the county. Last year, data from KCS indicate there were 127 ELL students at Cedar Bluff Elementary, and 133 ELL students at Lonsdale. The district will be updating their data for the 2014-2015 school year this week, according to Lerma.

The majority of Cedar Bluff ELL students are of Latino origin, including Hondurans. The second largest

population is from Arabic speaking nations, including Iraq, Palestine, Egypt, and the United Arab Emirates. There are also students from the Federated States of Micronesia.

Suffridge explained that students are identified as potential ELL-eligible during registration if their parents indicate the child speaks any language other than English. Lerma adds that the family is asked a series of three questions: What is the first language the child spoke as a baby? What is the most frequent language spoken outside the home? And, what is the most frequent language spoken at home?

The child is then given the W-APT (WIDA-ACCESS Placement Test). It is an

English language proficiency "screener" given to incoming students who may be designated as English language learners. The test screens for English literacy in reading, writing, listening, and speaking. Kindergartners are only screened for listening and speaking.

Suffridge said that she feels Knox County is keeping up with the increasing number of ELL students. Currently there are 65 ELL teachers across the system, with four at Cedar Bluff and four at Lonsdale Elementary. Norwood Elementary has three ELL teachers. Many schools within the district share ELL teachers with other schools. Students identified as ELL spend one hour each day with the ELL teacher.

But other ELL teachers have concerns. The Focus spoke with another ELL teacher on the condition of anonymity. One concern is the overlap between ELL, Tier 2 and 3 interventions, Special Education and the Federal IDEA (Individuals with Educational Disabilities Act) law. Effective this year, the state requires all students to be screened for RTI2 (Response to Instruction and Intervention). KCS uses the Renaissance STAR universal screener in grades K-5.

Students who score below the 25th percentile will receive Tier 2 intervention, those below the 10th percentile, who have not made significant progress in Tier 2, or are 1 1/2 to

HOW OUR HIGHWAYS GOT NAMED

Our recent story about bridge names brought an inquiry from a reader asking how Chapman Highway was named. The story of Chapman Highway and other roads is unique.

CHAPMAN HIGHWAY

If one man can be credited with the creation of the Great Smoky Mountain National Park it would have to be David Carpenter Chapman. The Spanish-American War veteran, UT football player, WWI Tennessee National Guard Commander, and wholesale drug company owner was a founder of the Appalachian Club prior to his interest in creating a park. The Club was an organization of seasonal home owners in the Elkmont community in the Smoky Mountains. Chapman was also involved in Knoxville social clubs, fraternal organizations, and civic clubs. In 1910 Chapman served on the board of the Appalachian

Exposition in Knoxville, which had the main goal of drawing the nation's attention to the East Tennessee region. He became involved with the grass-roots effort to turn the Smoky Mountains into a huge national park. Chapman was appointed as the East Tennessee representative to the State Park and Forestry Commission in 1925 as recommended by the Smoky Mountains Conservation Association. The Association voted to add "Great" to their name. Negotiations began to purchase the land from the mountain property owners and two years later Tennessee and North Carolina gave \$2 million each. Chapman and others convinced

millionaire John D. Rockefeller to donate and others added \$5 million to the cause. After the creation of the Tennessee Great Smoky Mountain National Park Commission, the purchased land was turned over to the federal government and Chapman became the first park commissioner. The nation's most-visited park was officially established in 1934 with President Franklin Roosevelt present for the dedication. Mount Chapman, a 6,340 peak is named in Chapman's honor, as is Highway 441 in South Knoxville. Chapman Highway became a main route for early visitors to visit the Great Smoky Mountains.

EMORY ROAD

In 1789 Peter Avery was hired by North Carolina to blaze a trail from Clinch Mountain to Fort Nashborough. The path basically followed the old Cherokee path known as Tolluntee's Trail and crossed the Emory River near Wartburg. The route was known as Avery's Trace and then Emory Road. William Emory was a man who drowned while trying to swim across a stream. Early maps show the stream as "William Emeries River." Today Emory Road runs from one end of north Knox County to the other.

OTHER ROADS

Ball Camp Pike is named for long hunter Nicholas Ball who established a camp there prior to statehood. Schaad Road is named for the Schaad family, Swiss immigrants who established a dairy farm after the 1870s and

became prominent Knox County citizens. Sutherland Road is apparently named for the Sutherland family. Dr. John Sutherland, Jr. settled in Knoxville before moving to Texas and volunteering in the Texas War for Independence, his nephew, died in defense of the Alamo. Millertown Pike is probably named for the Miller family who settled there. Rev. Adam Miller, Sr., founded the Miller Chapel Lutheran Church. The Cemetery there now, beside the current Kingdom Life Church, has the graves of many family members. The Andrew Johnson (AJ) Highway is named for President Andrew Johnson. Many names of our highways and roads are obvious as to the origins: Norris Freeway, Maynardville Highway, Asheville Highway, Alcoa Highway, Maryville Pike, Jacksboro Pike, Strawberry Plains Pike and Rutledge Pike all eventually take you to those cities or did originally.

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Two 'odd' zoning changes

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Last Monday's zoning part of the Knox County Commission saw requests that were granted, but a couple of requests were noted as "odd."

In one instance, Jerry and Peggy Cardwell asked that 10 acres they own off Berkford Road north of Hannah Brook Road be taken out of a Planned Residential (PR) and zoned for Agricultural (A).

Even Metropolitan Planning Commission Director Mark Donaldson noted the odd or unexpected request as so many open land zoning requests usually go the other way and become subdivisions or apartments.

Jerry Cardwell told commission that he and his wife wanted a small farm there. He said they rescue animals and the place has "turned into a sort of a petting zoo for the neighborhood."

The MPC staff recommended the zoning change and the commission agreed.

In another "odd" request, the planning commission asked that a Business and Manufacturing (CB) zone for an entire subdivision be zoned Low Density Residential (RA). The subdivision of about 9 acres and 17 lots is located on the east and west side of Parkridge Drive, north and south of Spring Place Circle.

Commissioner David Wright said it was unusual in that there was no applicant, just a request from the planning commission. Donaldson said the request is on behalf of the residents who live there when it was discovered that a residential subdivision was in a business zone. The Commission agreed to the rezoning.

The commissioners also approved the request of Worley Builders to change a property on the north side of Dutch Valley Road east of Bob Kirby Road from low density residential to Neighborhood Commercial on an MPC recommendation.

Cumberland Avenue Food Fight at Forum

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"I come today as a member of the Cumberland Avenue Merchant's Association looking for some support from the council and mayor," said Robert Wyncoop, owner of Gyrene Burger. Wyncoop is concerned about the "Dining Dollars" program at the University of Tennessee and why all the merchants are not benefiting from the program. He spoke in the public forum at the council's Tuesday evening regular session.

Dining Dollars is food purchasing program offered to students at UT that allow them to dine off campus using their Dining Dollars card, but not all area merchants are included in the program. Wyncoop's Cumberland Avenue restaurant and several others are not part and he said he's heard that the program is becoming mandatory this spring and had already hurt businesses along the strip.

The university opened a new building on Cumberland and 17th street and it houses two Aramark franchise restaurants, Panda Express and Raising Cane's. Aramark is UT's food service provider.

"The university purchased this building which was the former location of McMillan's Books and went to the state building commission and said that this is going to be used as classroom space and administrative purposes," Wyncoop told city council. "However, last month the university opened a full-service dining facility that is basically a food court."

"We feel, as local merchants, that it is a threat to small businesses here on Cumberland Avenue," he said.

The Cumberland Avenue Merchant's Association have met on the issue, talked about declining sales and have created an online petition asking that the Dining Dollars program be extended to all the vendors. The university maintains that the program responds to student requests and not

merchants. The petition is seeking student input by signing the "Free Our Food UTK."

Students or parents currently deposit money into the student's Dining Dollars account. The cards can be used at all campus dining including convenience stores, dining halls, and all "national" brands. Some of the restaurants shown on the site are Chick-fil-A, Subway, Sbarro, Rocky Top Café, Petro's, Starbucks, and Panda Express.

Wyncoop said he sees his revenue at his restaurant declining and the association is concerned about not being allowed to take part in the program, especially if it becomes mandatory for student participation.

The Gyrene Burger restaurant gets its name for the term "Gyrene" that is a slang referring to Marines. Wyncoop said he got out of the Marines a year ago and selected Cumberland Avenue to locate his new business. He said the "multi-million dollar relationship" between the University and Aramark has put small businesses at a disadvantage.

He said the local Papa John's, an independent franchise, is on the Dining Dollars plan where other local businesses are not. He also said the city's Cumberland Avenue revitalization program will help in the long run but hurt the merchants there while it is underway.

"I ask the city council to engage the university to open up this Dining Dollars program to local merchants so we may survive this construction period," he said. He said the Cumberland Avenue merchants have seen a decrease of 10 to 15 % because of not being able to take part in the card program.

"I just wanted to ask the council to take a look at this and see if there's anything you can do in support of small business," Wyncoop said.

The Axe Man and Jewel Tea

Weekends at our house in the 1960's took on a routine that included work, play, and family. Back then, our parents managed life on a small income and herded three boys along the way. We had jobs to complete, church to attend, and Sunday dinners to enjoy.

On Saturday, we boys were charged with cleaning the house. Daddy wasn't a skilled mechanic, carpenter, or plumber, so we boys didn't learn how to do those kind of things. However, mother was a stickler for a clean house, and she made sure that her sons would never live in "pig sties." Sometimes we tarried too long before beginning the cleaning, and Mother would show a bit of anger to urge us toward our tasks.

We divided up rooms in the house. Somehow, I managed to get the living room and a hallway. It was the biggest room in the house and held the most pieces of furniture. The first step was to drag out the old vacuum cleaner. The contraption had a removable base in which water was poured. The machine was heavy and bulky and had no wheels to make it easier to handle. The wood floors were cleaned, and furniture was moved to vacuum in every nook and cranny.

The next job was dusting, something that we all hated. Mother insisted that every item be moved and dusted. The furniture in the living room included an old pump organ with ornate carving and shelves. On one occasion, I lifted a small statuette of a man wiping his brow and holding an axe and dropped it. The axe broke into several pieces. Mother was disappointed and swore that she owned not one thing that we

boys hadn't chipped, dented, or destroyed.

The rest of Saturday was filled with washing cars, pulling weeds in the garden, or polishing shoes for Sunday. Jim and I always sneaked in enough time for playing outside or just goofing off. By evening, we had taken baths, and the family settled in the living room to watch favorite television shows that included "Perry Mason" and "Gunsmoke."

Sunday mornings began with pancakes or waffles for breakfast. We finished and put on our "good clothes" for Sunday School. If Daddy weren't working, we all attended church. Neither parent put up with any nonsense at church, and failure to behave would lead to swift punishment upon our arrival back home.

After church, we boys hung up our clothes and put on our old ones and headed outside. Mother worked to complete the feast that we called Sunday dinner. Usually, a plate of fried chicken or a pot roast was served with vegetables, biscuits, gravy, and some kind of homemade pie. Another special treat was iced tea. On Sunday and holidays, the tea was poured from a Jewel T pitcher. It was sweet and thirst-quenching. After the meal, the pitcher was again placed in the dish cabinet in the hallway where it stayed until the next "dinner." Weeknight suppers just didn't warrant the use of this special vessel.

The rest of the day was spent in play. Mother and Daddy cleaned the kitchen and then sat down in the den. Mother would read the paper until she nodded off to sleep, and Daddy would take a

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All In One Lifetime

James F. Byrnes of South Carolina

James F. Byrnes had resigned from the Supreme Court of the United States to accept the responsibility for running much of America's war effort at the personal request of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Byrnes had given up a lifetime appointment, but being a wily politician, he realized the opportunity for further advancement. As the 1944 Democratic National Convention approached, Byrnes believed he had the backing of President Roosevelt to seek the vice presidential nomination to replace incumbent Henry A. Wallace.

Wallace desperately wished to be renominated and Roosevelt, rather than telling the vice president the truth, nudged him to run again. FDR had in fact encouraged any number of influential and ambitious Democrats to seek the vice presidential nomination.

Jimmie Byrnes's innate sense of timing and politics failed him on one occasion where he allowed his own ambition to get ahead of his usually impeccable common sense. There was little real chance for Byrnes to be nominated for vice president as he had several glaring weaknesses as a national candidate. Byrnes was objectionable to organized labor and many of the big city bosses worried that the South Carolinian having left the Catholic church would be highly offensive to the hundreds of thousands of Catholics who comprised much of the Democratic voting base in large cities across the country. African-Americans were opposed to a Byrnes candidacy as the former senator had been a white supremacist, although by Southern standards Jimmie Byrnes was something of a racial moderate, never having been a vulgar racist like so many of his colleagues.

Byrnes, sensitive to any political development, heard rumors that Missouri Senator Harry S. Truman might be a

candidate for the vice presidential nomination. Byrnes sought to commit Truman to his own candidacy by asking the little man from Missouri to place his name into nomination. Truman readily agreed and was one of the few Democrats in the country who didn't want the nomination.

Yet the most important Democrat of them all, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, was still weaving a web of deception as he encouraged the various candidacies of those who truly believed they had the president's firm commitment of support. Roosevelt gave Vice President Henry A. Wallace a carefully worded statement that said were he, Roosevelt, a delegate to the Democratic National Convention, he would vote for Wallace. Roosevelt also gave the Chairman of the Democratic National Committee, Robert Hannegan of Missouri and a Truman supporter, a letter saying he would be delighted to run with either Senator Harry Truman or Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas.

Once it became clear to a very surprised Jimmie Byrnes that he was not in fact Franklin Roosevelt's choice to serve as vice president, he withdrew and returned to South Carolina. President Roosevelt, perhaps in part to assuage any hurt feelings Byrnes might have, took the former senator with him to the Yalta Conference where the president met with British Prime Minister Clement Atlee and Soviet dictator Josef Stalin.

Within months of having been reelected to a fourth term, FDR was dead. It was James F. Byrnes who informed President Harry S. Truman about the Manhattan project and the development of the atomic bomb. Truman highly esteemed Byrnes and few were surprised when the president appointed the South Carolinian as Secretary of State in July of 1945.

Byrnes immediately took a hard line with the Soviet Union and increasingly rarely consulted with the President on foreign policy matters, an inauspicious beginning for any Secretary of State who serves at the pleasure of the president.

Despite the longstanding friendship between Harry S. Truman and James F. Byrnes, it

was increasingly difficult for the two men to work closely together. Truman fretted that Byrnes was setting American foreign policy himself, without regard for Truman's own feelings. President Truman also believed that Byrnes deeply resented not having been Franklin Roosevelt's choice for vice president in 1944, which would have made him President of the United States when FDR died.

Truman was likely right about Byrnes believing he was superior in both ability and intellect to the president. Relations between the two continued to deteriorate and although Byrnes was named by TIME magazine as its "Man of the Year" in 1946, he resigned as Secretary of State in 1947.

Byrnes set out to give his own version of events through what became a best selling memoir, *Speaking Frankly*. Byrnes, already wealthy, used the royalties from his book to finance a foundation that would provide scholarships for orphaned children. The Byrnes Foundation would become increasingly important to Jimmie Byrnes as he entered his twilight years.

At least one person was not entirely happy with Byrnes's book; Harry Truman snapped that he knew how Caesar felt after reading the memoir. Byrnes retorted that Truman was no Caesar and he was no Brutus.

Once again, Jimmie Byrnes had not completely abandoned elective politics. With Strom Thurmond barred by South Carolina law from seeking a second term, Jimmie Byrnes was eyeing a gubernatorial bid. Although he was sixty-eight years old in 1950, Byrnes entered the Democratic primary. Byrnes faced little serious

opposition and while he had three opponents in the primary, he won with quite nearly 80% of the vote.

Governor Byrnes tried hard to equalize educational opportunities for black students, dramatically increasing money for schools which served African-American children. Byrnes also fought with the Ku Klux Klan again and the governor insisted the legislature pass a law which forbade anyone from wearing a mask in public save at Halloween.

Although still nominally a Democrat, Byrnes openly supported the presidential candidacy of Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1952. Byrnes also rejected the official nominee of the Democratic Party for the United States Senate from South Carolina in 1954. Senator Burnet Maybank, a close friend and ally of Jimmie Byrnes, died in his sleep in 1954, necessitating a special election. Due to the time frame for naming a nominee, the Democratic State Executive Committee hastily nominated long-time State Senator Edgar Brown. While some believed Byrnes wanted the nomination himself despite being seventy-two years old, the governor quietly backed the candidacy of Strom Thurmond, who ran and won as a write-in candidate.

Byrnes left the governor's office in 1955 and over time, it was Jimmie Byrnes who foresaw the South leaving the Democratic Party. The former governor believed the national party was far more liberal than Southerners and would do little for the South, which had been staunchly Democratic in its voting since the Civil War. Byrnes worked quietly

and effectively, eventually becoming a Republican himself. That same legacy exists today as South Carolina is a reliably Republican state.

Byrnes wrote yet another memoir, *All In One Lifetime*, which became a best seller and the royalties again went to finance the Byrnes Foundation to provide scholarships for orphaned children. Byrnes and his wife Maude never had any children, but as they aged, they took a personal interest in the many youngsters who were the beneficiaries of their gift. Neither objected to several of the young people referring to them as "Mom" and "Pop" Byrnes.

Like many childless people, both Maude and Jimmie Byrnes loved animals, dogs in particular. They had a series of fox terriers they doted on and while living in Washington, maintained a very nice apartment in the elegant Shoreham Hotel. Byrnes himself professed to be satisfied with a couple of tailored suits each year, as well as a supply of Hanky Bannister bourbon.

Byrnes remained an iconic figure in South Carolina during his lifetime and his advice was still sought by many aspiring politicians in his home state. Not only those aspiring to office in South Carolina sought out Jimmie Byrnes; Richard Nixon consulted with Byrnes in his 1968 presidential bid.

James F. Byrnes continued to receive a steady stream of callers until the end of his life. He and his wife devoted more time and energy to the youngsters who were the recipients of the scholarships provided by the Byrnes Foundation. Despite all the honors and positions of power

that James F. Byrnes held, he later said the Byrnes Foundation was the most rewarding thing he had ever done in his life.

Governor and Mrs. Byrnes took a real interest in each of the young men and women they were helping through college. Frequently invited into their home, some recalled being entertained by the elderly couple who would sing "Let Me Call You Sweetheart." One young lady recalled holding up her camera to photograph Governor and Mrs. Byrnes when Jimmie Byrnes impishly said, "I'll give you something to photograph!" He then grabbed Mrs. Byrnes and gave her a big kiss.

Byrnes would write letters to the recipients of the scholarships, inviting them to contact him at any time with their problems, concluding with the simple, yet sincere statement, "I want you to make good."

The former governor made it clear that financial support for the scholarship recipients was the least of what he hoped to accomplish. Cards, letters, and telephone calls were answered promptly; students joined Governor and Mrs. Byrnes at luncheons and even weekend trips to South Carolina beaches.

After James F. Byrnes died on April 9, 1972, Maude Byrnes carried on the work with the foundation until her own death. That legacy remains in place today.

A statue of James F. Byrnes stands on the statehouse grounds, oddly he is depicted in the robes of a Justice of the United States Supreme Court, an office he held for little over a year. By any standard, James F. Byrnes lived an interesting and productive life.

South-Doyle High School was formed in 1991, and while there has been some success in football up through the last few years, Thursday night's matchup at Sevier County was certainly one of the, if not THE, biggest regular season football game in the school's history. Check and check.

the catalyst for the Cherokees. With his game high 215 yard rushing performance, the 5'11" and 170 pound Rollins surpassed the 1,000 yard rushing mark for the season, to go along with his 1,000 yard plus passing yards on the season.

In typical fashion, Rollins passed on the credit to his success to his teammates.

"I have to give all the credit to the guys up front", Rollins told me. "They did a great job of opening holes and all I did was run through them."

Indeed.

While the line did a great job of opening initial holes and the wide receivers made some key blocks downfield, Rollins' athleticism was responsible for much of his success on this night.

And if his offensive explosion wasn't enough, Rollins also made what was perhaps the play of the game from his defensive safety spot.

With South-Doyle leading 20-17 early in the final quarter and Sevier County driving to try to tie the game or take the lead, Smoky Bear QB Deuce Wallace hooked up with Devante Matthews on a 20-yard slant pass in to Cherokee territory. Rollins made the hit, then stripped the football away from Matthews, and covered the football to stop the drive. That was certainly a

That football program is a dumpster fire with an embattled athletic director running the show.

How many northerners prefer Tennessee weather and lack of a state income tax? The answer is all of them. Jones isn't going anywhere. But the rumor mill wound up last week anyway.

Will Tennessee fans be forever scarred by Lane Kiffin's midnight run?

Johnny Majors was a Tennessee guy, was Vols head coach for 16 years and then thrown to the curb when it was decided they

should be winning more. Phillip Fulmer was a Tennessee guy, was Vols head coach for 17 years and then thrown to the curb when it was decided he wasn't winning enough.

Lane Kiffin was not a Tennessee guy, was Vols head coach for 14 months, and then left UT high and dry 3 weeks before national signing day for greener pastures and his "dream job."

So now anytime a Tennessee coach is even remotely associated with an opening at another college or in the NFL, folks are going to panic and start looking up Flightaware.com?

Heck, I remember hearing people talk about Mark Richt's job and wonder if Derek Dooley would leave Tennessee for Georgia. Yes, Derek Dooley, arguably the worst coaching hire in major

college football this side of Charlie Weis at Kansas.

So you have those Tennessee fans... you also have the flip side to this coin. The Tennessee fans that believe the Vols should be back among the elite teams in the SEC right now. These are the fans that believe that the Vols have "lost enough," and don't understand why it isn't always 1998 in Knoxville.

Leading into the South Carolina game things turned to the "Why didn't Joshua Dobbs start from day 1?" camp. Maybe because he wasn't very good back in August and Justin Worley gave the Vols the best chance to win.

That logic has no place in this argument good sir...

Look, there is nothing wrong with supporting your team to the fullest, and at the same time questioning why the Vols are still a step behind the rest of the SEC.

But living in fear that your coach is going to bolt at his earliest opportunity, or giving up hope and criticizing everything going on with the program... neither of those things is healthy.

For your program or yourself.

Tennessee is on the road back. Eventually the fruits of the coaching staff's recruiting labor will flourish.

Until then, I advise you to hide under your desk.

Defensively, Harley Wheeler led the Cherokees, just as he has done all year long, with 16 total tackles, including 2 tackles for loss. Rollins added 6 tackles and two fumble recoveries.

For the Smoky Bears, Seth Arwood had a terrific night on defense by registering 11 solo tackles and 3 assists.

Each team converted 17 first downs offensively. A huge statistic on the night showed the Cherokees converting on 8 of its 12

third down opportunities to keep drives alive, while Sevier County could only make good on 4 of 11 third downs.

Total offensive yardage was relatively close, with South-Doyle getting the edge 390 to 349.

With the win and a 10-0 record, the Cherokees will likely be the number 1 seed in quad 1 of the TSSAA's Class 5A playoffs. They will be at home on Friday night for the first round.

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CAK's Ground Game Gets Going in 42-20 Win

On a cold, rainy Halloween night at Christian Academy, the Warriors treated their home crowd to a 42-20 victory over the Kingston Yellow Jackets. In a rarity for the pass-oriented Warriors, CAK scored more rushing touchdowns than passing touchdowns on the night, finishing with four touchdowns on the ground. Michael Thompson and Cole Welch paced the Warrior rushing attack as Thompson carried 11 times for 57 yards and two touchdowns while Welch carried six times for 52 yards and one touchdown. Even receiver Austin Pope got into the rushing touchdown smorgasbord.

The CAK defense set the tone for the game right from the start as they recovered a Paul Bolden snap on the Yellow Jackets' first play from scrimmage. One play later, Thompson scored his first touchdown of the game from 9 yards out as the Warriors capitalized on the Kingston turnover for the early 7-0 lead.

"That was huge on the

first play," CAK Head Coach Rusty Bradley said. "We had deferred the coin toss. I wanted to get our defense out on the field early and set the tone and they did that, and I was really pleased."

The Warriors feasted on Kingston again like they were Halloween candy, getting a second straight turnover on a Bolden interception. CAK again capitalized as quarterback Cole Smith threw an 18-yard touchdown pass to Austin Pope for a 14-0 lead.

Just before halftime, the Warriors converted a 13-play, five minute drive with Pope's second touchdown, a one-yard run for a 21-0 lead.

The Warriors picked up where they left off in the second half. They went on a 7-play drive that took 2 minutes and 15 seconds. Thompson ended the drive with his second touchdown run of the game, an 8-yard score. CAK led 28-0.

"The run game was really important for us tonight," Thompson said. "All the blockers and everything, we just played our game,"

he added.

Kingston finally got on the scoreboard with a 50-yard touchdown run from Rhett Jones to cut it to 28-7 with 8:48 left.

The momentum, however, was short lived. CAK took the ball from its own 19-yard line all the way down the field, scoring a touchdown on a third-and-goal. Baylor Caughorn got loose in the left corner of the end zone, and Smith rifled the ball to him for the 9-yard touchdown.

Leading 35-7, the Warriors got the ball back on another Bolden interception, his second of the game. The Warriors began the fourth quarter at their own 6-yard line after the turnover. Three straight CAK penalties temporarily derailed the drive, but the Warrior offense got back on track with a 34-yard Philip Nichols catch. Three plays later, Cole Welch ran for a 22-yard touchdown run to put CAK up 42-7.

The Warriors, so accustomed to throwing for many more touchdowns than they rush for, had four rushing

was not available at press time. Kingston finished the season at 3-7, 0-4 in District 3AA.

"We really wanted to make a stand and go into the playoffs on a win," Smith said, "and we no doubt came out here ready to play defense and offense."

Fulton survives scare, slips past Carter, 18-12

On a Halloween night, it was fitting that Carter gave Fulton a scare.

Nearing the midway mark of the third quarter, the Hornets had a 9-6 lead over the state's top-rated team and were threatening to add to it with a first down at the Falcons' 17-yard line.

That's when big and fast D.J. Campbell did his version of the Monster Mash, picking up a fumble in the Carter backfield and returning it 81 yards for a touchdown and the go-ahead score in Fulton's 18-12 victory Friday night.

"I think our kids lost some confidence during the game, but I just preached to them that somebody was going to make a play and we've just got to follow that up," said Fulton Coach Rob Black.

The 6-foot, 277-pound Campbell made that play with his scoop and score. A key block by Kentel Williams near the Carter 20-yard line allowed Campbell to rumble on into the end zone.

The win gave Fulton a 10-0 regular season record and the District 3-AA title. But in a horrendous first quarter, the Falcons didn't look anything like a nationally ranked team (No. 18,

Fulton committed five turnovers in the first quarter and had an uncharacteristic 158 yards in penalties

in the game.

"We hadn't had issues with penalties all year long until tonight," said Black. "A lot of those turnovers had to do with field conditions, but those are things

we've got to learn to play through."

The weather was wicked, with drizzling rain, gusty wind and temperatures in the upper 30s when the nearly 3-hour long contest ended.

Carter was given excellent field position when Fulton made an errant snap in punt formation on its opening possession. The Falcons also lost four fumbles in the opening 12



Gifts Differing

Philosophically, I am a 20th century man who finds himself transported into the 21st century. Mark Twain once wrote a book about time travel and a man who was transported backwards in time to King Arthur’s court. That Connecticut Yankee found himself so technologically advanced within legendary 6th century England that he was considered a wizard. Having been dragged forward to this 21st century I am certainly no wizard. In fact, this Southern boy finds himself often mystified by the techy world of the 21st century.

The internet (which was not invented by Al-gore) is a wonderful place for the curious. When something comes up that I need to learn, Mr. Google is my guide, just as the Roman poet Virgil was Dante’s guide in “The Divine Comedy.”

The movie Jobs was about Steve Jobs and the Apple Computer company. The one thing I remember was that Jobs felt his computer should be an extension of the person, a useful tool, like a shovel is to me in my garden. And now with an Apple iPhone in my hand the knowledge of the world is available to help me care for my patients and to satisfy my curiosity. Some complain that there’s a lot of misinformation on the Net, and that is true. However, there is even greater truth because of the diverse opinions available to the seeker. There is of course a difference between facts and truth, and the seeker finds the latter if he sifts the information and uses his brain and heart.

I wrote an essay several years ago about differences between the sexes. It’s unfortunate that our politicized and politically correct

culture so often dwells on our differences instead of celebrating them. The Apostle Paul two thousand years ago noted that we all have differing gifts. Our differing perspectives actually promote a broader vision and a closer approximation of the otherwise elusive truth.

It is well known that the average American woman lives longer than her male counterpart. I could get quite peevisish about this inequality and say it isn’t fair, but that would be ridiculous. Life isn’t always fair. A recent report from our good ole CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) caught my attention with new data showing Americans are living longer. In fact, the average American can expect to live to almost seventy-nine years old. It’s too bad that men put a drag on this longevity curve, since boys born in 2012 can expect to live only seventy-six years, whereas girls can plan on eighty-one years of life. I wonder where the notion of the “weaker sex” originated.

I was also intrigued by a recent interview on the Net with Dr. Marianne Legato, professor emerita at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons. This doctor maintains that there are twice as many boys conceived as girls, and yet the male/

female birth ratio is about equal. She went on to explain that more males perish in utero than girls, and males have more difficulty than girls if born prematurely. The doctor says this is because males are not as hardy as females and slower to develop than girls. To lend some credence to the doctor’s assertions, most of us have observed that boys do seem to lag behind girls, at least until physical maturity.

I’ve heard many women wonder aloud, “Where have all the available men gone?” It can’t be that all the “good men are taken” as some women say. Perhaps more marriageable men are lost due to accidents. The CDC reports that death from accidents ranks as the third leading cause of death in men, whereas accidents rank sixth in women’s mortality. Dr. Legato says that the brain’s frontal lobes develop more slowly in men than women, and this is associated with greater risk taking in men. Scientists believe that the frontal lobes of the brain (behind your forehead) are important for rational thought, risk assessment and responsible behavior. We’ve all heard some variation of the joke, “What are the last two words of a (fill in the blank) male?” The punch line goes, “Watch

this!” I thought about this as I watched my grandson on the playground recently. He was actually less adventuresome than some of the girls of comparable age, one of whom was actually a bully of the other kids. So much for generalities.

Doctors have wondered for years why women seem to develop coronary artery disease later in life than men. It was thought that estrogen must be the cause since, with menopause and declining estrogen levels, coronary artery disease significantly increases in women. Actually, a research study was done in men with coronary artery disease. They were given estrogen as a therapeutic maneuver to try and reduce recurrent heart attacks. That didn’t work out very well – or prevent recurrent cardiac events.

Perhaps being the traditional bread winner with job stress is what kills men earlier than women. I don’t believe this, and can testify that being responsible for a two year old all day long is also quite challenging. It will be interesting to see if modern role reversal in the work place or the necessity of both parents working to support the family will take a toll on our health. I know the stress level of single parenthood, often associated with poverty, is even higher and translates

to poorer physical and mental health in all family members.

It is well known that men tend to visit the doctor less often than women. Perhaps we men were schooled to “be a man and not a cry-baby.” Some have called this the John Wayne syndrome. Data suggests that women may in part be healthier because they don’t ignore issues and share their concerns with each other better than men. Conceptualizing and then verbalizing our concerns relieve stress and lessen isolation. Along this same line of thought, a minister friend of mine has noted that women more often ask for intercessory prayer than men do.

Interestingly, data shows that married men are healthier than those without wives, perhaps because we have a partner with whom to share life’s struggles. Maybe it’s the civilizing effect women have on their men folk. Or perhaps it’s because that same good woman drags her man to the doctor when she can no longer stand his whining!

"A second angel followed and said, 'Fallen! Fallen is Babylon the Great, which made all the nations drink the maddening wine of her adulteries'" (Revelation 14:8). It is in Revelation chapters 17 and 18 that this announcement by the angel is spelled out. Babylon, a city, is described as a harlot. The harlot is pictured as riding on the beast from the sea. The sea beast

represents wicked government and in this context Roman imperialism. This woman represents the city of Rome in its role of holding dominion over the world. She is drunk with the blood of the saints and of the witnesses to Jesus (Rev. 17:1-14).

The harlot is obsessed with displays of wealth. It is uncomfortable to even say the word "harlot." This

image was used by John to startle his readers into seeing the seductive qualities of materialism and violence because the citizens of Rome craved luxury and feasted on violence. What should be repulsive was alluring. John is encouraging his readers to have different values from the world. Many of John's readers thought there was no problem with going along with the values of the culture of the day. It was acceptable to do what everyone else was doing. John does not

want people to "go with the flow." A voice from heaven says clearly, "Come out of her, my people, so that you will not share in her sins, so that you will not receive any of her plagues" (Rev. 18:4).

What does the fall of a great city like Jerusalem or Rome mean for us today? While the Babylon of Revelation represented Rome its initial audience, Babylon is still present today. Its form changes but its essence remains. The beast of Revelation represents antichristian persecution throughout history embodied in different governments or world empires. The harlot also represents

the world as the center of antichristian seduction and can be applied to any moment in history.

Rome was filled with luxury, pleasure, and amusement. Many Christians were torn to pieces in the arenas for the amusement and entertainment of the public. The harlot was drunk with the blood of the saints (17:6). In any age, we are called to come out of the world. We are to oppose that which is at war with the Lamb (Christ).

Babylon's fall takes place throughout history, but especially on the great day of final judgment. The fall of the last great Babylon

– whoever that may be – will coincide with the coming of our Lord in judgment.

The harlot holds in her hand a golden cup in which she entices people to drink. But this cup is deceptive. It promises good drink but it is filled with filth. The devil tries to entice us to drink in the lusts of the flesh, to pursue fame, power, and wealth at all costs. The harlot is still very real today, and the price for drinking in her adulteries is costly. The world has so much to seemingly offer than Christ and His church. This is why church attendance is down and the study of God's Word is low. There are more exciting pleasures begging for our attention and time. on Sunday, October 26, 2014, at Wallace Memorial Baptist Church where she has been a member since 1960. She joined one year after Dr. Jim McCluskey became the pastor.

Born in Scott County, Tennessee, Maxine's family later moved to Campbell County. After high school graduation, Maxine moved to Kingsport, Tennessee, to work for Tennessee Eastman. The only other education Maxine had was some short business college courses. She worked in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, for Stone & Webster Construction Company, but during the war her father transplanted the family north to Akron, Ohio. There, Maxine worked for the Goodyear Rubber Plant. After many years of service, she asked for and was granted some time off to visit her brother, Don, who was stationed at the Navy base in Memphis. When Maxine's boss told her she could not leave, Maxine said she was going anyway. She recalls her boss's reply: "Well, don't expect to have a job here when you get back."

"That's fine with me," Maxine said. After visiting

for The University of Tennessee's (UT's) Agriculture Experiment Station in Knoxville.

Maxine has lived in the same home since 1959. Her late husband, Alan Washington, was a Navy Pilot who flew in the Pacific during World War II and spent thirty years in the reserves. His career as a U.S. Civil Service Investigator, which began in Oak Ridge during the civil rights movement, took them to Memphis. Maxine fondly remembers when Alan took her across the Mississippi River to see Jerry Lee Lewis perform before he was famous. After living in Memphis for a year, they were homesick for East Tennessee and came back. Maxine has five children, many grandchildren, and even a great-great-grandson. She also has two living brothers, ages 88 and 86.

Today, Maxine regularly attends church services and Women's Missionary Union (WMU) meetings; she is the secretary/treasurer of her JOY (Jesus first, Others second, Yourself last) Sunday School class--the only class to which she has belonged; and she goes on mission trips to Appalachia.

She even went on Wallace Memorial's first mission trip with Jim and Lib McCluskey to Grenada in 1979 where Dr. Carter and Charlotte Davis were serving as missionaries. She also went to Costa Rica where former church member and missionary Pat Stooksbury served.

The 90 year old who water-skied on Norris Lake in her early years is still active for her age, eats an apple every day, is amazed by technology advances, and is quick to recognize the source of her strength. "The Lord has been good to me, and I thank Him every day for it," she said. "I am forever grateful -- I can't ask for anything more." Maxine is truly blessed, and she is a blessing to all of us who know her!

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Chipotle Pork Roast

2 TBS chili powder
1 tsp salt
1 tsp garlic powder
2 tsps ground cumin
9 small unpeeled red potatoes, quartered
3 small sweet potatoes, peeled, quartered
1 medium onion, cut into 3/4-inch wedges (about 1/2 cup)
1 boneless pork shoulder roast (2 1/2 to 3 lb)
2 TBS olive or vegetable oil
1 can (8 oz) tomato sauce
1 can (14.5 oz) diced tomatoes, undrained
1 canned chipotle chile in adobo sauce, finely chopped (about 1/2 tablespoon)
2 TBS water
2 TBS cornstarch

Spray 5- to 6-quart slow cooker with cooking spray. In large bowl, mix chili powder, salt, garlic powder and cumin. Add potatoes, sweet potatoes and onion to bowl; stir to coat. Place vegetables in slow cooker.

Remove netting from pork. Rub oil over pork; roll in spices in bowl to cover. Place pork over vegetables. Pour tomato sauce, tomatoes and chopped chile over pork and vegetables.

Cover; cook on Low heat setting 6 to 8 hours.

Remove pork and vegetables from cooker; cover to keep warm. Pour sauce from cooker into 3-quart saucepan. In small bowl, mix water and cornstarch; stir into sauce. Cook over high heat 5 to 10 minutes, stirring frequently, until thickened. Serve sauce with pork and vegetables.
