

year. The cost would be divided between us and the state. When the state says they are giving teachers a 3% raise, their funding formula requires Knox Countians to pay more than half of it. So instead of a 12% raise over two years as you stated, it would be about half that amount. That's pretty reasonable given that Knox County is one of the most prosperous counties in the state yet not even in the top twenty when it comes to teacher pay. Equally important to us this year is raising the pay of our "non-certified" staff such as teaching assistants and cafeteria workers. Current wages for these folks are shamefully low.

The Board of Education is guilty of neither "artful doublespeak" or being "pluperfect bureaucrats." They are hard-working citizen legislators who are trying to help Knox Countians build the best school system in the south. Not so we can pat ourselves on the back. So our children and grandchildren will have the kind of future they deserve.
