## Lonsdale wants input on the proposed Emerald Youth facility

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It is obvious that the residents of Lonsdale will welcome a \$10 million Emerald Youth facility in their community but many of the citizens are asking that the neighborhood be included in planning and running the project.

"We must have a buy-in," one of the residents told the public meeting Thursday evening at the Lonsdale Elementary School.

Knoxville Mayor Madeline

Rogero hosted the meeting along with Steven Diggs, President of Emerald Youth Foundation. Diggs told the sizable crowd that the foundation has its own board of directors but said he would take the suggestion of an advisory council for consideration.

"It's not out of the question. You can't put a facility in a community and not include the community," Diggs said.

Rogero asked Diggs to "develop a partnership with the community."

The proposal, which involves the donation or sale of about a block of city-owned and county school land as well as a \$1 million streetscape project with lighted sidewalks in that area of Lonsdale, will require approval by the Knoxville City Council, Board of Education and Knoxville County Commission. The details are being worked out, hence the public meeting.

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## Proposed BMX Park draws strong support

Knox County's proposed BMX track met with strong support from leaders and residents in South Knoxville Thursday night.

Members of the community were largely positive about the proposed \$750,000 project, which would be built in South-Doyle Middle School's football stadium. Should the construction of the track move forward, it would be undertaken and supervised by Knoxville County Parks and Recreation Department.

Several officials attended the meeting in the South-Doyle Middle School Auditorium. Those leaders included school board member Amber Rountree, County Commissioners Bob Thomas and Carson Dailey and Tennessee State Representative Rick Staples.

Should the BMX Stadium and track be installed at South-Doyle, the track at the football stadium would stay in place while the field would become a track.

BMX officials voiced the need for the track when they

met with Knoxville County Parks and Recreation Senior Director Doug Bataille.

"It would be a unique facility," Bataille told the community members in attendance at Thursday's meeting. "It would be the first track in the country that would be on a middle school campus."

The proposed BMX track would also benefit SDMS as part of the project's funding would include provisions for school renovations and improvements.

Knoxville once hosted a BMX National race during the 1982 World's Fair and that event was held at Bearden High School, according to Bataille.

There was also previously a BMX track in 1977 in the West Hills Community.

Since then, bicycle racing has grown exponentially, yet there's no racing facility within 60 miles of the Knoxville Area.

BMX, which has grown 15 percent since 2013, became an Olympic sport in 2008. And should the proposed track come to the school, it would

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
