

When is it not wise to make an ethics complaint?

Answer: When you can't prove it. That's what happened when the Knox

County Ethics Committee voted 7-1 to dismiss charges against Commissioners Bob Thomas and Charles Busler Friday The complaint was made by failed

Following the dismissal of charges, Busler and his wife prayed together and left the meeting without making a statement.

Changes to the agenda included postponing recognition of both Farragut and Bearden High School Dance teams. Deputy Law Director Gary Dupler requested withdrawal of item 7.D.16 from the Items and Contracts Agenda.
