

Separate Ethics Complaints Filed Against Brad Anders and Lee Tramel

Two ethics complaints were filed against two Knoxville City Council members, Brad Anders and Lee Tramel, on Monday. The complaints were filed by the Knoxville City Ethics Committee, which is responsible for enforcing the city's ethics laws.
