## Historic Zoning Commission considers three petitions

On Thursday, Aug. 23 the Knoxville Historic Zoning Commission (HZC) had three petitions on the agenda for their consideration.

The house at 1160 Bryson Ave. in Fort Sanders is scheduled for demolition. Mark Bass of Q3D Engineering will grant the

Fort Sanders staff noted that the applicant took care of all the neighborhood's concerns.

After several-side discussions, the HZC postponed any next-month's decision to allow Southern Properties, Inc. to issue a grant for cement board siding rather than smooth finish fiber cement board siding to

state that the neighborhood does not want a four-grained cement board panel to be used. Staff noted that granting the request would set a precedent. Since 2012 there have been seven construction permits issued in Fort Sanders for smooth cement board siding. In six of those cases permits have

been determined if that action will mitigate the four-grained effect.

Christine and Haven Sutherland, the owners of the house at 240 E. Scott in Old Town, Knoxville, were granted permission to replace aged tongue-and-groove flooring on the front and back porches with a synthetic tongue-and-groove mate-

rials again looking for land suitable for that use.

Another factor in the city's initial search history: Deputy Mayor David Bruce reported the college that the school has an "Urbanization plan" and the city is interested clearing and redeveloping residential areas around the campus.

Bruce said the search for a new location will not delay the "much-needed replacement" of the old Cedar Valley Building "or delay the Clayton Family Foundation plan to build a \$150 million science and discovery center on the grounds of the Cedar Valley Auditorium and Safety Building."

Currently the city has pledged \$40 million for a new police and fire headquarters.
