MPC staff recently completed an update to the Major Road Plan, a tool used to coordinate and regulate land use. An overview of these changes will be presented at the Metropolitan Planning Commission's September Agenda Review, which is open to the public. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 11, in the Small Assembly Room of the City County Building, 400 Main St., Knoxville, TN

The Major Road Plan exists to ensure that the public's investment in roadway infrastructure is protected as development occurs by preserving roadway facilities for their intended purpose. It is updated periodically to account for changes to the road network such as new roadways that have been built, and to reflect current transportation plans and their identi-

The previous plan was adopted in 2011 and served as the starting point for this update. Major changes that were made to the roadway classifications in this update include:



So not only do the legislators want attorneys to pay their debts, if they do not pay their debts, they will take away an attorney's very ability to make money and prevent them from doing the job that they got by incurring student loan debt in the first place. Yikes!

Urban Wilderness connection plans continue

Long-range plans are underway to interconnect as many of Knoxville's greenways as possible and Tuesday the Knoxville City Council authorized an agreement with Vaughn & Melton Consulting Engineers to provide design and construction documents for the Urban Wilderness Gateway Project.

The agreement, just shy of \$1 million, is another step to not only develop an entrance to the large greenway in South Knoxville at the terminus of the James White Parkway but also connect all the Urban Wilderness trails south of the river.

Linking the new gateway to East Knoxville's Morningside Park is a goal in years to come. Several years ago a pedestrian bridge below the James White Parkway bridge, connecting the south greenways to the north side of the Tennessee River, was considered but Rebekah Jane Montgomery, Urban Wilderness Coordinator, confirmed with The Focus that pathway will be atop the

Councilman George Wallace asked Engineering Director Jim Hagerman about the agreement and Hagerman said it is Phase Two of the greenway project and that more public comments will be sought. He added that the third phase will be

Mayor Madeline Rogero reminded council and the public that a council work session is planned this Thursday at 5:30 in the City-County Building to discuss the Urban Wilderness Gateway Park Project.

A larger public meeting is planned for Tuesday, September 18, at South-Doyle Middle School with the design team, city officials, and community leaders. The 6 p.m. meeting will see a continued discussion of the \$10 million investment to create a linear park from Morningside Park to South Knoxville.

The project is made possible with TDOT's deeding of state property to the city. Information on the

1,000-acre urban park plans and project is available online at www. knoxurbanwilderness.com and the Gateway Project can be viewed at

https://bit.ly.2wn3iEo. In other action the city council voted to authorize \$3.4 million for Phase 3 and 4 of the Walter P. Taylor Homes along McConnell Street to include demolition and hazardous material removal as part of the Five

Points Revitalization Project. Becky Wade, director of community development, told the council the funding includes finishing sidewalks, green space, and demolition of the final units there.

Wade also spoke on two approved resolutions to sell city-owned residential sites, one on Harvey Street and the other on Colonial Avenue, to private citizens for redevelopment

as residential units. She said the properties are part of the city's blighted properties campaign and are usually sold for the appraised value of the properties.

Daffodils in fall

You may think it quite good root growth. When make sure that they are or whenever you notice odd to write about planning to transplant

time of year as daffodils are normally equated with Spring.

> However, Fall is the time to plant

daffodil bulbs as well as the time to dig them to transplant (unless you dug them after the foliage died down and stored them for replanting in the fall). Early fall is an ideal transplanting time when the soil is slightly still warm, but below

daffodils at your Daffodils in the Fall, you may need to mark the site earlier before foliage die back occurs, to make it easier to find the bulbs.

Use a shovel to dig

several inches away from the bulb clump making sure you don't accidentally cut into the bulbs. Lift the clump and shake off excess soil. Divide the bulbs by twisting them from the clump. Dispose of any soft or mushy bulbs.

When preparing to replant divided bulbs, choose a location that offers full sun. They need at least six hours

planted in well-drained soil. Daffodils don't like wet feet. Many of the popular species prefer neutral to acidic soils, but some prefer slightly alkaline soils, so consult your local nursery to see which is best for your daffodil variety.

Daffodils should be planted before the first hard frost of the season. In general, bulbs should be planted at least three inches apart and should be planted flat-side down at a depth of at least twice the diameter of the bulb.

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The Mystery After J. Will Taylor's Death Part Two

Pages from the Past

November 14, 1939, it sent shock waves through Tennessee's political community. Taylor had long been enormously popular inside Tennessee's Second Congressional district and "Hillbilly Bill" had exercised considerable influence throughout the state, especially when the GOP dominated the White House. Taylor's influence lessened somewhat with the election of Franklin Roosevelt as president, but the wily congressman was a shrewd politician and he reached an understanding of sorts with Tennessee's leading Democrats, not the least of which was Senator K. D. McKellar.

The Taylor family had insisted a guard be placed outside the Washington office of the late Congressman J. Will Taylor. The request was supposedly made by the congressman's widow; evidently Mrs. Taylor had personally telephoned Kenneth Romney, the House Sergeant-At-Arms to ask for around-the-clock guards to be stationed outside her dead husband's Mr. Romney was sick in bed when contacted by a reporter, but Mrs. Romney helpfully explained the situation. "Mr. Romney had a long distance telephone call from Mrs. Taylor Tuesday night," Mrs. Romney recalled. "Mrs. Taylor asked that no one be permitted to go into The guard will remain there until an executor arrives. She didn't say when that would be."

No official of the U.S. House of Representatives could ever remember any similar case previously and the request of the widow Taylor was all the more puzzling as the only people who had keys to the Washington office, aside from the Taylor family, were the late congressman's staff members. As Mrs. Taylor was ill, her daughter Elizabeth was designated to make the trip to Washington. "I will go to Washington as her agent, within a few days," Miss Taylor announced. The notion Mrs. Taylor's

request was "customary" was seconded by Dorothy Schultz, J. Will Taylor's secretary for twenty-one years. Miss Schultz said she was preparing to leave Knoxville for Washington, D. C. at the request of Elizabeth Taylor. "I see nothing unusual about that police order," Miss Schultz said coolly. "It is the customary thing."

The late congressman's personal secretary, Dorothy Schultz, had been kept out of the office until Miss Taylor could go through her father's personal effects. Miss Taylor, accompanied by her attorney, managed to finally get inside her father's office on a Saturday night. On Sunday, Miss Taylor, joined by Mrs. R. J. Buckman and Dorothy Schultz, returned to the office to complete packing up Congressman Taylor's papers. Mrs. Buckman was a personal friend of Miss Taylor's and the two had driven up to Washington, D. C. together from the Taylor

> family home in LaFollette. Miss Schultz worked alongside Miss Taylor and Mrs. Buckman, although congressman's daughter locked the doors to the office. When pressed as to why there was a need to post a guard outside J. Will Taylor's Washington office, his daughter replied, "The seal of the Knoxville office had been broken into, so we telephoned Mr. Romney (the House Sergeant-At-Arms) and asked him to see to it that no one got into the office here until someone from the family had a chance Romney's way of carrying out our request."

> Miss Taylor's reference to the seal being broken was a piece of tape placed across the door of J. Will Taylor's Knoxville office on the third floor of the Federal Building. When Miss Taylor had first visited her father's Knoxville office, she had been joined by Sheriff Carroll Cate and Knox County Welfare Commissioner I. C. King, both close friends of her late father. King had served as U. S. Marshall throughout much of the decades of the 1920s through the recommendation of Congressman J. Will Taylor. There is still a park in Knox

County named for I. C. King. The tape covering the keyhole to Congressman Taylor's office had been broken, causing Elizabeth Taylor to become concerned. "The tape was broken," Sheriff Cate admitted, "but there is no way of telling whether the door was actually opened or if so whether anything was taken." I. C. King was far less communicative than Sheriff Cate, replying when queried that he had "nothing to say" about the matter.

Will Taylor almost lost reelection in 1936. That had been a banner year for Democrats as President Franklin D. Roosevelt was coasting to reelection, winning every state in the nation save for Vermont and Maine. Taylor also faced a formidable candidate, John J. O'Connor, the mayor of Knoxville. Congressman Taylor, after eighteen years in office, only won by 1,604 votes. Taylor had won reelection in 1932, another big year for Democrats, with almost 58% of the vote. In

Jack Dance acknowledged there was some support for Elizabeth Taylor to succeed her father, although he very well may exaggerated it. "I find there is a sentiment over the Second District for Miss Taylor to fill out the unexpired term of her

father." Judge Hu B. Webster, a local power in the Knox County Republican party, said he believed either J. Will Taylor's widow or daughter ought to be selected to fill the seat until a successor could run in the regular election in 1940. Webster thought unseemly for other candidates to express interest in running for

Hometown folks in LaFollette seemed genuinely interested in Miss Taylor running in the special election to fill her father's seat and some thought it would be "a fine tribute" to the late congressman to allow his daughter to serve a brief term in the House of Representatives. State Senator W. A. W. Carden, who had known Elizabeth Taylor since her birth, claimed the congressman's daughter had "inherited traits of her distinguished father and has the ability to carry on his unfinished work." Carden's endorsement may have been more harmful to Elizabeth Taylor's prospective candidacy than helpful. Opposition began to gather to the idea of Miss Taylor succeeding her father, even briefly. One prominent Republican growled that allowing Congress

would likely become the "Congressman without portfolio." Other powerful Republicans objected to the idea of honoring Miss Taylor and believed it was better to nominate and elect a Republican who could immediately begin to garner seniority and be

reelected in 1940. Elizabeth Taylor flirted with the idea of becoming a candidate to succeed her father, although there was not an outpouring of support for her. When Miss Taylor eventually announced she would not become a candidate to succeed her father, the Memphis Press Scimitar published an editorial hailing her decision titled "Inheriting Public Jobs." As indicated by the headline, the editorial was far from complimentary, noting "we are glad she will not become a candidate at this time." The Press Scimitar archly said, "If she feels that her abilities and talents can better serve our state in the halls of Congress we should be very glad to see her exercise her right and offer herself for such service at some other date, when the voters can judge her and her platform uninfluenced by maudlin

sentimentalism." In the end, Miss Taylor, citing the ill health of her mother, decided not to run. Republicans held a tumultuous convention, which nominated Judge John Jennings, had once been soundly defeated in a primary by J. Will Taylor. Once nominated, Jennings won the general election and served in Congress until his defeat in 1950 by Howard Baker, Sr. The mystery of who, if anyone, had broken into "Hillbilly Bill's" office remains to this day.

Just as many Knox County residents want sidewalks, many city dwellers want bus shelters. Belinda Woodiel-Brill, director of Knoxville Area Transit Communications and Service Department, recently updated The Focus with where shelters have been established from 2017 to present and where others are planned.

New shelters placed since 2017 include four shelters along the Cumberland Avenue Corridor, two at the Change Center on Harriett Tubman, and two at the Industrial Parkway off Western Avenue. Individual shelters were established on Chapman Highway at Fort Dickerson's entrance, along Ray Mears near Downtown West and on Island Home Avenue.

Upcoming shelter projects include shelters on Central Street, four on Magnolia Avenue along the redevelopment area there, four on Clinton Highway at Merchants Drive, a shelter on Sevier Avenue at Dixie and a trolley shelter on

KAT recommends that those non-KAT shelters be placed where waiting passengers can see an arriving bus and near a bus stop. KAT guidelines also indicate that neighborhood or business shelters can be unique, such as art-based shelters, and that the city authority cannot provide full funding but may provide some based on the cost of a stan-

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

"After that, I earned a starting position playing our nickel linebacker, the nickel position basically."

Galyon was named Special Teams Player of the Year in 1998.

After four seasons with the Giants, Scott played three years for Miami. He was voted the Dolphins' Ed Block Courage Award winner in 2001, which goes to players who overcome injuries and adversity.

Galyon said he and his staff at Seymour have let the players know they have high expectations of them and they're going to coach them hard and challenge them, but they're not going to embarrass them or beat

Prior to the start of the season, he said, "I think they are trying to figure us out. too."

Galyon also listed "things that drive me crazy ... when we're not a good teammate,

when we don't show up with a great attitude and when we don't play with great effort.

"Those things will get you chewed out," said the new head coach. "Mistakes we can cor-

rect," he added. "That's what we're here for as coaches ... If we don't execute on Friday nights and we're confused, that's my fault as a coach - we haven't gotten them ready." In his position with the

FCA, Galyon spent six years in Morristown and Hamblen County and the last four years in Seymour and Sevier County.

Scott and his wife Chasity have been married 18 years. They have three children -Elijah (15), Gracie Mae (14) and Micah (10).

Caruthers, new West AD, says protecting integrity is goal No. 1

West High School may have a new athletic director in Chris Caruthers, but he has been around the business for more than a decade.

"Goal No. 1 for any athletic director has got to be to protect the integrity of the program," said Caruthers recently.

Helping West High "keep a good face" will mean following the regulations that are provided and doing the right thing, added Caruthers. When such happens, he believes a school ends up with a program that athletes want to play for and supporters want

"And to say that is not to say that it hasn't been a program with integrity, because it has been," emphasized Caruthers, who was a teacher at West from 1996 to 2006 before going into administra-

This summer, longtime West assistant principal and AD Steve Killian became an administrator at Farragut High and Caruthers was appointed to the West post the first week of July.

"The second week of July, I hit the ground running," said Caruthers, who the previous nine years had been at Austin-East, where he assisted AD Alvin Armstead. He also had assisted Principal Ken Dunlap three years prior to that at Powell.

Caruthers said his No. 2 goal is learning all he can about being an athletic director.

"That means learning all the ins and outs of the TSSAA," he said.

Much of an AD's job he said has to do with entering eligibility for each athlete on the TSSAA portal, transfers and things behind the scenes that require

"Those kinds of things are where you can get in a lot of trouble if you're not careful," added Caruthers, who pointed out he has been assisted by several athletic directors in the Knox County Schools' system in the early going of his new job, including Dunlap (AD at Karns), Jody Wright (AD at Fulton), Armstead and Killian.

"These guys have helped me. When I have a question, I can give them a call. And I'll also say the officials at TSSAA have been extraordinarily helpful."

Killian had been at West a long time and had a "great reputation" in the West High community, said Caruthers, whose new post includes being 12th

grade administrator. "Steve had done a lot of good things for West High the last 10 to 12 years. My goal is for folks not to

Caruthers said his approach has been "to be open, take as much suggestion as possible, but also to listen to the veterans and to Steve."

Caruthers said he also has found the West High Athletic Council to be a strong support group.

Caruthers' third objective has to do with the "West has access to some great facilities," he

said. "I'd love to see those things get upgraded and I think we're working on that." West's artificial turf was installed this summer

and its football stadium has been getting spruced up. Its track also is getting a new surface.

Since he has joined the West staff, where Ashley Jessie is principal, Caruthers said the school has hired Brent Smith as head coach for boys' and girls' track and field and Mark Boyce as assistant coach in softball. The head job in softball is currently vacant but steps have been taken to fill the post.

West also hired new girls' basketball head coach Caitlin Hollifield in the spring.

Caruthers, who played prep football and graduated from Cumberland County High in 1990, was an assistant coach on Bill Wilson's football staff at West for three years.



Corn, summer squash, peppers, green beans, tomatoes, zucchini--you name it, there is plenty to go around. Plenty to can, freeze, give to neighbors and friends, yes, there are plenty to go around.

I'm always on the lookout for exotic new recipes and I was glad to find quite a few in Kroger's newsletters they send every month. Let me share with you a garden fresh flavor

PESTO GRILLED SQUASH WITH BALSAMIC GLAZE

1-1/4 lbs yellow squash and zucchini, sliced diagonally into 1/2 inch thick

2 tsp. plus 1/4 tsp kosher salt

1 c. packed fresh basil

1/4 c. plus 2 tab. extra virgin live oil

2 tab. Parmesan grated

1 clove garlic

1/4 c. pine nuts, plus extra for garnish

Balsamic glaze, for gar-

Fire up your grill to high made for summer: heat. In a colander, toss the squash and zucchini with 2 tsps. salt, drain for 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, process 1/4 tsp. salt, basil, 1/4 c. olive oil,, cheese, garlic and pine nuts in a blender or food processor until smooth. Toss the squash and zucchini with 2 tabs. olive oil. Grill for 2-4 minutes per side, or until golden brown and tender. Serve with pesto, a drizzle of balsamic glaze and a sprinkling of pine nuts. Refrigerate any leftovers.

Balsamic glaze: mix in saucepan 2 c. balsamic vinegar, 1/2 c. brown sugar. Bring to boil, then lower heat and simmer for 20 minutes, until it sticks

to back of spoon. Put in jar with lid, refrigerate.

And my favorite is chicken corn soup, which is not well-known here in the South but a favorite up North. It's tasty and you'll

In a medium pot, cut up 1-1/2 lbs. chicken, 1 small onion, 1/2 c. celery, 1 tsp salt, 1/4 tsp pepper, five ears of fresh corn (remove corn from cobs). Cook all together about 2 hours until chicken is very tender.

ples of this taking place on his first missionary trip to the region of Galatia in present day Turkey, where Paul and Barnabas went to a series of churches with the gospel: Pisidia Antioch, Iconium, Lystra, and Derbe. At his first stop in Pisidia

Antioch, many people were excited to hear Paul preach. What we find here is the longest recorded sermon from Paul that we have in the New Testament. This made the Jewish leaders jealous and nervous. They stayed and preached as long as they could before being expelled from the region (Acts 13:50), yet they were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit despite the attempts to dampen their spirits.

The next stop on their journey, around seventy-five second missionary journey.

miles away by way of the crow, was Iconium. They preached the gospel here until threats of personal harm came their way, which took them twenty miles further to Lystra. While there, we learn that Paul saw a man who was crippled from birth and Paul told the man to stand up on his feet (Acts 14:8-18). The man stood and began to walk. The people were shocked and believed the gods had come to visit them. The priest at the temple of Zeus brought animals to be sacrificed to Paul and Barnabas, but they were mortified at the thought because they were mere men.

Paul goes on to make an amazing speech that foreshadows a similar one Paul would make in Athens on his God was the one who had was in it.

Paul tells them the living

All was going good until some rabble-rousers from Antioch and Iconium arrived to win the crowds over. Paul, who earlier had been hailed as a god is now being stoned to death. After his apparent death, he is dragged outside the city walls. Here we see some irony. Paul's conversion began after giving approval for the stoning death of Stephen. Now it looks like his life met the same end as that of Stephen. The new disciples gather around Paul as they wept and prayed. Suddenly, his lifeless body came to life and he sat up. What relief and joy. What Paul does next was amazing. "He got up and went into the city"

(Acts 14:20). Paul was courageous and persistent. The made the earth and all that next day Paul and Barnabas left the city and travel sixtyfive miles to the east to the city of Derbe. Luke simply says of their time there that they "proclaimed the good news to that city and had made many disciples" (Acts 14:21). We don't know how long they were in Derbe. As they left Derbe, instead of leaving the region, they went back to the towns from whence they had just preached the gospel. They went back to places where they were persecuted and asked to leave - Lystra, Iconium, and Antioch. Why did they return? To strengthen and encourage the new disciples to remain true to the faith and to appoint elders. What an example of perse-
