

Commission may hire attorney in pension board case

By Staff The Tennessee State Commission on Pension Reform is considering hiring an attorney to represent the commission in a lawsuit filed by the Tennessee State Employees' Pension Board. The lawsuit, filed in federal court in Nashville, alleges that the commission violated the pension board's rights under the National Labor Relations Act. The commission's attorney, David L. Smith, said the commission is not yet ready to comment on the lawsuit. The pension board's attorney, Robert L. Smith, said the lawsuit is a necessary step to protect the pension board's rights. The lawsuit was filed on Oct. 1, 2014. The pension board is a union of state employees who pay into a pension plan. The commission was created in 2011 to study the pension plan and recommend reforms. The commission's report, released in 2013, recommended a number of changes, including a change in the way the pension plan is funded. The pension board is opposed to these changes and has filed several lawsuits against the commission. The lawsuit filed in federal court is the latest in a series of legal battles between the two groups.
