tion is the funding of the Behavioral Health Urgent Care Center. The Helen Ross McNabb operated facility, hailed as a victory in treating mentally ill and addicted minor law offenders when it opened, is facing a total state funding cutoff. The center's treatment policies are changing and Jerry Vagnier, director of the McNabb center, is looking to local governments for support. The city upped its contribution to the center from by \$183,950 to \$583,950

and the Knox County budget, which last year gave \$615,000, has increased to \$840,000 for the Behavioral Center. Vagnier spoke recently at the com-

mission's work session and said that the previous state funding accounted for about 75% of the Urgant Care Center's budget. He said the new governor stopped the funding and that is pressing the Center to look to local government. He said the judicial process has also changed as many of the minor offenders with mental health or additions are now being arrested rather

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
