When the Princeville City Council meets Tuesday morning the members will be asked for a final version of the code, an overall system of zoning and building regulations. More than two weeks have passed since the planning commission was asked to review and consider new rules that have been seen by many of neighborhood and business organizations.

The city council may see further opposition from citizens when they look at the 1990s code draft again. While several alterations have been made in an attempt to get the regulations to become law, the code, and most controversial, may be the exemption of higher income neighborhoods or established neighborhoods from existing secondary dwellings. That change in the proposed meeting when Councilman Andrew Stealy said he would not support the code unless the city, the Virginia Power Company and others, were given a chance to not participate.
