

I'm Shirley Braine, director of the City Community Development Department. Development of affordable housing and coordination of human services come through my department.

We are requesting that Council produce a vote on Ordinance 13-47, the closure of a section of Myrtle Street at East Fifth Avenue, for 12 weeks.

I want to provide a little background and context of what's being proposed at the site, which is composed of three City-owned parcels located close to Priority Living.

The City acquired this tract years ago, after the Southern Christian League harassed them (Knoxville and Carroll Park were being developed as a community park and park). Houses stood on this property on East Fifth Avenue were demolished to make room for the park, and ultimately, this specific tract became cut off from the park by the outfield fence of the softball field. It is idle and not used by Parks and Recreation, but it is zoned as open space.

Priority Volunteer Ministry Center approached the City with an idea to acquire the property and develop 48 permanent supportive housing units there. There is a great need in Knoxville for these units, which serve extremely low-income residents – the poorest of the poor.

It's very early in the planning process, and these units are extremely expensive to build and manage, but PVMC is going to do a lot to put together the feasibility of such
