Recode remains in auestion

Although the city council passed Recode in an 8-1 vote and Planning Direc tor Gerald Green promises to work with the Stakeholder Advisory Committee to clean up all the language before the new regulations become the law on January 1 the entire Recode effort may be in limbo.

The November general election of four new council members and a new mayor may see Recode being accepted, delayed, or killed. One of the candidates for mayor, Eddie Mannis, has announced he is opposed to Recode and plans to ask the council to delay implementing the plan

Mannis also wants to expand the stake of the community at large" and include Several active neighborhood organiza tions have opposed the reworking of the city's 50-year-old zoning and building regulations. The current zoning ordinance have been modified, tweaked and modernized over the years and some citizens feel that can continue without a total

revamping.
