The Knoxville City general election ballot is set, and Eddie Mannis will face Judge Thompson in the race to become the next mayor. Mannis led in both early voting and absentee ballots and ended up Tuesday evening with 38.64% of the vote.

Thompson, who had not declared that with 36.33% of the vote to Mannis' 38.64%.

Thompson's surprise of the evening was Amelia Farmer, losing the

four other candidates in the 40 Large Street C race with 28.88%. She pulled more votes than the presumed favorite Amy Smith who came in second in a tight race and received 26.33% of the vote. The two women will face each other in November.

Again in the Small C race former Commissioner Rick Thomas ran a very close third with 16.16%. Hager Smith and David Williams both pulled more than 12% each in voter ballots.
