The site would face Sutter Landing Park and the Larimer River and, in effect, open the view of many houses and businesses along the Arden Avenue corridor. Wayne Hines represented the residents along the route.

Hines mentioned that 540 residents signed a petition against the development and said that the proposal violates the "540" zoning there. He said there is nothing other than the design of the complex the developers want to put there.
