# Old Rule High School to be demolished

Old Rule High School will be demolished and the funding for that project is on the agenda for the Knox County Commission work session meeting on Tuesday.

Named for the noted Knoxville newspaper editor Captain William Rule who died in 1928, it originally opened in the fall of 1927. The facility was an elementary-junior-high school with 525 students enrolled in the elementary grades and 261 in the junior high and high school grades. Lower grades were dropped year after year until eventually the school just had grades

was acquired by Knox County as surplus property in 2016. The old facility has been used to house the Knox County Schools' maintenance division.

The commission is being asked to approve a \$786,200 demolition contract with Modern Day Wrecking for the project. The idea is to clear the valuable property, sell it, and get it back on the tax rolls

# **School board** approves contract to provide more custodians

Of the many challenges and problems public schools face, a shortage of custodians might not immediately come to mind.

Knox County Schools face such a challenge. Since the start of the current school year, KCS has been trying to fill dozens of available custodial positions.

At its work session last Monday, the Knox County Board of Education discussed hiring 50 janitors from the firm Duncan and Sons Building Maintenance, LLC. The contract would begin on Feb. 1 and run through June 30, and 17 schools would be affected. The price of the contract would be \$1,040,000.

The issue was a major item at the board's regular meeting last Thursday. Not all members were in agreement with the proposal to hire Duncan.

"What we're doing with this contract is solving the wrong problem," said board member Jennifer Owen. "The problem that we have is with attracting and retaining custodial staff. We are not currently doing anything to solve that problem. This is a very expensive bandaid for a very short amount the board that Monday's work session had raised a discussion about reviewing the application process and possible raises for custodial workers.

Alex Moseman, Executive Director of Talent Acquisition, told the board that streamlining the application process would be valuable, as well as making the job one that staff would see as a career and a chance to be a part of a community.

"One of the fundamental and technical challenges we face is how to make it easier for folks to raise their hands and say 'I wanna work for KCS,' Moseman said. "How do we connect folks to the right hiring manager and get them in the right role."

Money, of course, is a critical factor in attracting workers for any job. The starting pay for a custodian in KCS with no experience is \$10.89 per hour.

Watson asked if a new employee could start at a higher wage if he or she came to the job with custodial experience. Hemmelgarn replied that up to five years of relevant experience would put the employee on a higher pay scale.

Board member Katherine Bike then made a motion to give current custodial workers a \$200-per-month bonus, while giving the same to new hires. Her math, she claimed, would save \$19,000.

# Tax break approved for **Cumberland Avenue development**

A five-year tax break for a huge apartment, parking and retail complex along Cumberland Avenue near the University of Tennessee was approved by the Knoxville City Council Tuesday. The development will displace many current businesses in the area that includes White Avenue, 19th and 20th Streets but provide sheltered parking for nearby hospitals and 838 apartments

Retail space will also be available and the developer, Core Knoxville Cumberland LLC, hopes those businesses displaced will lease space in the 30,000 square feet of retail space in the

use buildings.

Councilwoman Seema Singh was critical of the tax break saying the developer "has the resume to do this without public funding" but Councilwoman Lynne Fugate countered by describing the large "public benefit" the development would bring after the fiveyear tax break.

Mayor Indya Kincannon told the council the development would produce \$2.5 million in tax dollars after the five-year period.

Patrick Birmingham of Covenant Health spoke in favor of the tax break noting the new 212 parking spaces for the local hospitals. Councilwoman Amelia

said there are other important projects in the city that needed a similar tax break.

While Singh and Parker voted against the "payments in lieu of ad valorem taxes," all of the other council members voted for the matter which had been requested by the Economic Department. The vote authorized the Industrial Development Board to negotiate and accept the agreement.

The council voted to approve an "Air Rights Easement" for the Core Cumberland Avenue complex to span an alley between 19th and 20th Streets.

The council also approved funding a grant Smith to create an application for a pedestrian and bicycle bridge project that would connect UT to the South Waterfront.

South Knoxville resident and activist Janet Tocher said there has been no public input on the latest bridge proposal. She mentioned a meeting to be held later last week about the grant request.

Councilwoman Lynne Fugate said the project will "reconnect to our waterfront." Mayor Indya Kincannon said the project funding "is not a simple application" and needs the details that CDM would provide. Deputy Mayor David Brace spoke of the urgency of the funding

# Tethering of unsupervised dogs may become illegal

Is chaining a dog in your yard lawful or not? Currently there's nothing in the city code to prohibit tying an animal up with or without supervision. That may change soon following the council's approval of a new regulation on first reading.

More than a dozen citizens spoke to the Knoxville City Council on both sides of the dog chaining issue Tuesday evening. Two issue: one to permit tethering and one to permit it but Knoxville. only when someone is outside to supervise the pet. Councilwoman Janet Testerman, CEO of Young-Williams Animal Center, advocated against the idea of requiring constant supervision of tethered dogs. She said a requirement to constantly supervise an animal outside a residence discriminates against lowincome pet owners. Testerman said that 24% of the city population live in poverty and 47% of people own pets, adding that many people cannot afford fences. She also said that more dogs escape fences than from tethers and referred to her eleven and ence at the center.

### The Knoxville FOCUS January 16, 2023 Merit Board selects officers, sets grievance hearing dates

The newly reformed Knox County Sheriff's Office Employees' Merit System Board of Directors met Wednesday evening and chose Christopher Manning as chairman and John Valliant Jr. as vice chairman.

Manning, who served as the alternate member of the prior three-member merit council, defeated Valliant in a 5-3 vote. Valliant, son of the former attorney for an ex-KCSO employee, was selected over Kenny Boatman.

Manning guided the new board, which includes former merit members John Marshall and Jim Wright Jr., into a discussion of four pending grievance cases passed along from the former council. Attorney Myers Morton told the board that each case should be considered new although one case, that of Wesley Keck, had been heard but not decided by the previous council.

Two grievances, filed by former KCSO employees Curtis Nathaniel Cole and Israel Suarez, were dismissed and Keck's hearing was set for the board's March meeting.

Although the domestic violence charge against Keck was dismissed by the Knox County Attorney General, the board was told the grievance can be heard. Manning suggested subpoenas be

issued for the two officers who made the arrest and the merit board receive all the text of the prior hearing and the Attorney General's ruling.

"I'd like to handle this in one day," Manning said.

The complaint filed by Lisa Jarrell was scheduled to be heard in the board's April meeting.

Jarrell spoke to the meeting saying, "I haven't hired an attorney." Manning replied, "You don't need an attorney. That's why we are here."

The merit board also discussed lowering the age requirement to 18 for correctional officers and

Sheriff Tom Spangler told the meeting dropping it would help in recruiting at high schools and the \$40,000 plus per year would be an incentive.

Valliant seemed to oppose the idea, questioning the maturity and judgment abilities of that age group. Clarence Vaughn countered that lowering the age might help recruit a more diverse group of officers.

Sheriff Spangler spoke about the 100 vacancies in the correctional department and the manpower shortage. The vote was 4-3 to recommend lowering the

age minimum and the matter now goes to the Knox County Commission.

The board also discussed adopting the county commission's rules and Robert's Rules of Order, the membership of the Merit Board of Directors, and a salary study to be discussed further in the February meeting.

Among the small crowd attending the meeting were former Merit Chairwoman Gina Oster and At-Large Commissioner Larsen Jay, who led the two-year effort to reorganize the merit board.

And as you now know, Damar "miraculously" survived, apparently with no brain damage. Yes, Mr. Hamlin was "healthy," received prompt and appropriate care on the field, including defibrillation with an AED (automated external defibrillator). But I aver

A miracle is an event that cannot be completely explained by natural phenomena and is therefore supernatural. For one who embraces a spiritual perspective, Damar's story has a miraculous and prayerful component.

Dan Kuykendall had returned frightened the Democrats, to West Tennessee when his employer, Proctor & Gamble, had sent him to Memphis as a regional the voters chose Reece manager. Kuykendall volunteered to help in Richard Nixon's 1960 presidential campaign and was the campaign manager for GOP congressional candidate Bob James, which quite nearly brought about the defeat of incumbent Clifford Davis in 1962. In 1964, Dan Kuykendall made the transition to candidate when he challenged Senator Albert Gore. Both of Tennessee's seats in the United States Senate were up for election that year due to the death of Senator Estes Kefauver in 1963. Howard Baker was the Republican candidate for the two remaining years of Kefauver's term while Kuykendall sought the seat held by Albert Gore for a six-year term.

At the time, Tennessee had never elected a Republican to the U.S. Senate by popular election. Only in two instances could it truthfully be said the GOP had seriously contested a race for the United States Senate since the Volunteer nominated what was very likely their strongest candidate in 1916, the first time Tennesseans voted in a general election to select their own U.S. senator; that had been Ben W. Hooper, a former two-term governor. Hooper won 45% of the vote against then-Congressman Kenneth D. McKellar. The second time the GOP seriously contested a seat in the U.S. Senate in Tennessee had been in 1948 when former Congressman Carroll Reece had perceived it to be an outstanding year for Republican candidates. Just two years earlier, Reece, as Republican National Chairman, had presided over a stunning rebuke of Democratic rule when the GOP had won both houses of Congress. Thomas E. Dewey was thought by practically everyone but Harry Truman to be the next president of the United States. Republicans confidently expected to increase their majorities in Congress. Tennessee's Democrats had just had a bitter bloodbath of a primary for both the governorship and the U.S. Senate. E. H. Crump, master of the Shelby County machine, had bolted the Democratic Party, refusing to support Harry Truman for reelection, backing Strom Thurmond

Housewives in particular were deeply concerned about rising inflation and the cost of goods. The Kuykendall campaign was especially effective in harnessing the volunteer efforts of housewives and women during the 1966 campaign. Dan Kuykendall kicked off his campaign with an outdoor rally at his home 4978 Brookwood Cove in Memphis. As campaign manager Lewis Donelson began introducing the candidate, Kuykendall's twoyear-old daughter Kay sat contentedly at her father's feet, preoccupied with crayons and a coloring book. Kuykendall wasted no time tearing into George Grider's record, pointing to the congressman's recent newsletter. "He himself admitted that on the minimum wage bill, he voted against the will of 63 per cent of his own people," Kuykendall told the 300 people assembled. "Several surveys have

shown that over 75 per cent of the people of Tennessee strongly favor the rightto-work law my opponent voted to kill it."

Dan Kuykendall referred to the congressman as "our Washington rubber stamption, the war in Vietnam and rioting on the Johnson Administration. Kuykendall said he supported federal tax rebates for the states to to repeal limits on the amount of money people could earn while collecting Social Security. Kuykendall's showmanship was evident as he welcomed his guests to view the "Great Society Supermarket . . . Grider Branch." There were twenty-four items, each labeled with its cost in 1964 and the higher price from 1966 due to inflation. Richard Nixon had carried Tennessee in 1960 and most political observers had thought the former vice president was dead politically after he lost a comeback bid to be governor of California in 1962. Nixon was on the campaign trail in 1966 and had received requests to appear for congressional candidates in all fifty states. Nixon was making a stop in Memphis to campaign for Dan Kuykendall, who would serve as the former vice president's host for the two-hour visit. Just before Nixon's arrival in Tennessee, Congressman George Grider and challenger Dan Kuykendall faced off in a televised debate on a local TV station in Memphis. The Commercial Appeal published an editorial following the debate and acknowledged at times it seemed the candidates were jostling for "debating points

rather than votes," the newspaper thought "both men were articulate and concise." The Commercial Appeal thought the appropriate lines had been drawn and the two candidates "gave Ninth District voters a pretty clear choice."

Richard Nixon possessed an encyclopedic knowledge of the politics of each state and knew the names and districts of the candidates he was campaigning

public life "because the fate of the two-party system is at stake and that means the future of our country is at stake." Nixon told his listeners in his travels he had come to believe Republican candidates in the South would fare 50% better than they had in 1964. The biggest issue of the 1966 campaign, Nixon said, was whether or not the people wished to repeat what they had done in 1964 - - - "go for; that was guite evident all the way with LBJ." Nixon

to bring inflation under control." The congressman said he would much prefer "today's economic problems to the recessions under Republican administrations, and I don't know anyone who doesn't."

Congressman Grider kicked off his own general election campaign with House Majority Leader Hale Boggs of Louisiana at the opening of his headquarters. "I don't know of any new member who has made a finer impression and done a better job than George Grider," Boggs said.

Grider realized he was hard pressed by Dan Kuykendall's candidacy. The congressman summarized what he thought the 1966 congressional election was about, at least in Tennessee's Ninth District.

"The challenger - - - and the challengers - - - are the same as in 1964," Grider cried. "The issue is the same: Shall we move forward with positive programs to make this marvelous nation still better -- - for all of its people? Or shall we turn aside from our future as a useless protest against a world that won't stand still?"

Grider expressed his dismay that a man like Dan Kuykendall was running for office. The congressman said in fact he found it "hard to believe." "His platform takes dead aim on social progress and on responsible and effective government itself," Grider complained. Congressman Grider dismissed the visit by Richard Nixon to his district, saying, "(Nixon) is the one man in our country who is certainly the greatest guide that there is through the maze of political issues. And the reason he knows these issues so well is that he's been on all sides of every one of them."

Grider and Kuykendall participated in a program where Memphians could call in with questions and both men seemed to enjoy it. The congressman pointed out Kuykendall was affiliated with a food products corporation he said was charging 20% more for goods than is "a leading Memphis grocery." "I don't think it comes well from a man making such a profit on grocery prices to moan and groan so much about prices going up," Grider said. "This is a perfect example of a runaround if I have ever heard one," Kuykendall retorted. The GOP challenger noted he was an official with "a chain of 7/11 drivein groceries, two of which are in Memphis" rather than grocery stores. Dan Kuykendall insisted escalating prices were the result of the policies of the Johnson administration. The two candidates verbally tussled over their differences and neither held back. As the Commercial Appeal had stated, both Dan Kuykendall and Congressman George Grider were forthright in stating their respective beliefs while managing to remain civil. With one month remaining before the general election, Dan Kuykendall's campaign was wellfinanced and superbly well organized. George Grider had his hands full.

Rivermont. Nixon predicted the reelection of East Tennessee Congressmen Jimmy Quillen, John Duncan and Bill Brock. Nixon also forecasted the election of Howard Baker as the first Republican ever to be popularly elected from the Volunteer State. Lastly, Nixon said he believed Dan Kuykendall would win the election to serve the Ninth District and Julius Hurst would be elected from Tennessee's Seventh Congressional District.

From the press conference, Nixon traveled to the Memphis Auditorium where a crowd of 3,000 people waited to hear him. Kuykendall introduced the former vice president as "Mr. Republican." Nixon quickly brushed aside the speculation about his running for the 1968 GOP presidential nomination. "To deny it or confirm it would open the door to 1968," Nixon said. "That's not the wise thing to do in 1966. My current goal is to campaign for others. They invited me. I came. My current goal is to avoid speculation about 1968."

Certainly Richard Nixon was focused and properly pummeled the Johnson administration, denouncing it as a failure. Nixon said the 1966 election was the most important political year of his twenty years of

Nixon pointed to the GOP candidates behind him, saying, "These men will not be rubber stamps for LBJ. We are united and the Democrats are divided. There's a new dance sweeping the nation. It's the Johnson drag."

Following the campaign boost the Kuykendall campaign received from former Vice President Richard Nixon's visit, the GOP challenger received another. The Kuykendall campaign released an endorsement of the GOP congressional nominee by 187 community leaders. The fields and occupations covered every aspect of daily life from clergymen to housewives and business leaders.

Congressman George Grider, in directly confronting the rampant inflation, described it as one of the prices of the Vietnam War and thought Americans should be willing to pay the price. "Our boys are sacrificing their lives in Viet Nam," the congressman said, "while we are financing a major war without wage and price controls. If we are asked to pay an added price for food, it's a small enough sacrifice, and I think it is beneath us to complain about it." Congressman Grider quickly added the president and his administration were taking "reasonable and measured steps PAGE B4

### The Knoxville FOCUS January 16, 2023 FROM THE MOUNTAINS BY JADON GIBSON Ninety Maids Wooed and Won

#### **By Jadon Gibson**

The earliest Jamestown settlers who disembarked from the Susan Constant, the Goodspeed and the Discovery were on the new continent for sixteen months without seeing a woman except for Pocahontas and others of the Indian race.

Anne Forrest and Anne Burras arrived in October 1608 a year after the founding of the settlement. Mrs. Forrest was the wife of Thomas Forrest, one of the men in the settlement. The 14-year-old Anne Burras was her maid. Within a year Anne married John Layton a carpenter in the settlement in the first wedding in Jamestown. Their first child, a daughter, was named Virginia.

Initially, their hope was to find gold but tobacco became the primary crop and source of revenue. Additional men and a small number of women continued to arrive from England. The men were given a tract of land to work and on which to construct a dwelling. In this early period, there were very few women in the settlement.

During the winter of 1609-1610, there wasn't sufficient food in storage and the inclement weather resulted in little success in hunting. This "starving time" resulted in 430 of the residents dying out of a population of 490. Anne Burras and her daughter survived the

#### bad winter.

The 1604 marriage of Pocahontas and John Rolfe was the social sensation of that period. There was much opposition in England and Virginia alike to the intermarriage of Christians and pagans, those without religion. The adverse commentary resulted in no similar marriages for many years. Incidentally, Pocahontas was the favored daughter of Chief Powhatan and the marriage resulted in good relations between the Indians and settlers for eight years. Pocahontas, who became the first Indian to convert to Christianity, died in England in 1617.

Rolfe had been married before but his wife perished after their ship wrecked off the Bermudas. Their daughter survived only to perish during infancy due to the unhealthy conditions at Jamestown.

The Virginia Company of London initially financed the settlement in the New World. They soon found there was a good market for tobacco from Jamestown. They decided that the tobacco output would improve if the settlement had more wives and children. This would give them a greater reason for toiling.

In 1618 the Virginia Company of London began sending "young handsome and well-educated maids" for the bachelors and widowers of Virginia. They

were to be of good character and were to come of their own free will. Interested women needed to be recommended by an employer or respected person.

The first two ships, the Jonathan and London moored at Jamestown in May of 1619 with this unusual cargo. They carried ninety maids, "homesick, seasick, but timidly inquisitive English girls" who could be wooed and won by the luckiest of about four hundred immigrant bachelors. The men were encouraged to be clean and dressed in their best garb.

The courting and mating began immediately on the Virginia shore but the men wooing and winning brides could not claim her until paying the Company one hundred and twenty pounds of tobacco. The fee was to defray the costs of her voyage from England.

It was written that the scene was amusing with the women being largely outnumbered. It gave them their choice of men and their own way in the matter.

It was said the wooing was done forthrightly and without embarrassment. Surprisingly it was soon over. The English company was paid for their costs and a sufficient profit to merit their continuing the practice of sending wives to the Virginians. It continued for several more years as there were many

additional men wanting wives.

The celebratory bursts of gunfire celebrating the marriages could result in a dwindling of the gunpowder supply. There was always the potential for an Indian uprising.

There was a major setback in 1622 when such an uprising occurred resulting in the death of a third of the colonists and the colony being largely destroyed. Additional men and women continued to arrive in the New World.

The first duel in Jamestown was fought in 1624 and was thought to have been between two rivals in love. Richard Stephens wounded 25-year-old George Harrison who died 14 days later.

Two women were sent back to England in 1632 because their behavior during a voyage that year was "disgraceful, rendering them unfit to be the mother of Virginians."

Nathaniel Bacon led an attack on Jamestown in the 1670s, burning the entire town.

"We added a girls' locker room, we have new wall padding and a new mat," Sayne said. "We have new wall padding all the way around." The renovations took contributions from local businesses, parents and other people in the community as Knox County Schools finds itself financially strapped.

"We're very fortunate to have a community like Halls and good parents," Sayne said. "I grew up in Halls and the community really comes together and it just helps, knowing that you have that kind of support when you have a school system that is limited in what it can do.

"We have a lot of community

support and that's what makes Halls so special."

Tindell's Building Materials also stepped up to help the Red Devils. The building supply store donated lumber for the renovations.

of those ong-ago days there were four games on the tube on New Year's Day, the Cotton (CBS), Orange (NBC), Sugar (ABC), and Rose Bowls (NBC).

As history would have it, the Tennessee Vols made it into each of them on a regular basis, providing many exciting moments in the school's football history. Tennessee's appearances in the Rose Bowl were in the days radio ruled the roost.

During his distinguished career, Columbia, Tennessee's Lindsey Nelson was often referred to as the "Voice of the Cotton Bowl," being closely identified with the game broadcast. He enjoyed telling the story of going to the field for a pregame interview and nearly missing the kickoff when the press box elevator malfunctioned.

The Cotton Bowl was part of Lindsey's exciting life in broadcasting. He also called major league baseball for the Mets, Giants, and Reds, the Notre Dame football replay on Sundays, and pro football on both Sunday afternoons and Monday nights. His sports coats were legendary.

More than 25 years have passed since his friends, including Notre Dame broadcast replay partner

Sometime in the summer of 1947, Lindsey was in search of gainful employment after returning It was all very simple, home from World War II. He needed to assemble an audition record for an assignment broadcasting sports for WKGN radio.

One afternoon at home, and make the breaks, and with no one else around and tape recorder in hand, Lindsey began doing playby-play of an imaginary scrimmage at Shields-Watkins Field several miles

the field "in order not to intrude" on the festivities.

'The recorder inscribed a voice on the record, all right, but it wasn't too clear. Perhaps that was just what

I wanted. Maybe a thin reproduction, a suggestion of performance, would serve my purpose best." Lindsey delivered the

finished product in a plain brown wrapper to station manager Charlie DeVois on a street corner downtown, much the way spies did in the movies. It was a cloakand-dagger operation, all top-secret stuff.

With that little exchange,

a nightly 15-minute sports gig and a chance to broadcast high school football.

His first game was at the old Evans-Collins Field, just off Magnolia Avenue, near Winona Street.

"I had tried to put together all I had ever learned from the afternoons with Bill Stern at the Rose Bowl [as Stern's spotter in 1940], with Fort Pearson at the Sugar Bowl [as Pearson's spotter at the 1941 contest in New Orleans], and with the writers in the press box at the Orange Bowl. I tried to draw on Stern's sense of drama and Pearson's professionalism. I had studied exciting and accurate."

"You have just done the best football broadcast ever heard in this town," said DeVois afterwards. "The very best."

"The best football broadcast ever heard in this town."

Preparation had suddenly become well acquainted with opportunity. Everything Lindsey had done to that time suddenly was a prologue to glory.

"I went home," Lindsey wrote, "and patted my spotter's boards gently. They had been to the Rose Bowl. Maybe I could someday work in the Rose Bowl. Wouldn't that be something?"

Then he added this comment.

"If you don't have a dream, how are you going to have a dream come true?"

Lindsey did make it to the Rose Bowl, calling the contest between Illinois and Washington for NBC. That dream, as well as many others, came true.

This all came about because of an audition record prepared in the yard of a house in Northeast Knoxville. The McClung Collection at the Knox County Public Library gave a street address for the record: 1606 Valley View Road.

There's nothing there to commemorate the opening stanza of a storied career, no marker or anything like that.

But there ought to be.
