Top Wrench Competition provides opportunities for area students

Area high school auto mechanics students convened in Powell to show their work and compete at the 33rd annual Top Wrench Competition Thursday at Crown College to display their technical skills.

The Top Wrench Competition, which began in 1991, gives students the chance to compete, earn scholarships and even find future employment in the automotive field.

The competition is open to the public and is judged by automotive instructors, including teachers from Tennessee College of Applied Technology.

"This gives these students the chance to compete and get recognized," said Top Wrench Competition President Kenny Boatman. "I want

Farragut alderman to switch vote to favor growth plan

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Farragut Town Hall's special called meeting on Wednesday proved to be an evening of disagreement and surprise. The session was called to hear the objections of the three aldermen who opposed the Knox County Growth Policy Plan and the meeting ended with one of the aldermen saying he would change his vote to support the plan.

State law requires Knox County, Knoxville and Farragut to agree to a plan for growth and development in the county. The "No" votes from the three Farragut aldermen would have killed the plan as well

as the larger Knox County Comprehensive Land Use and Transportation Plan.

The three aldermen, David White, Drew Burnette and Scott Meyer, had opposed approving the amendments to the growth plan during the March 28 Farragut Board of Mayor and Aldermen meeting. Farragut Mayor Ron Williams and Vice Mayor Louise Povlin both supported the plan.

Williams opened the meeting and White immediately called for a point-of-order several times, calling the event a violation of Robert's Rules of Order. He said Farragut's 3-2 decision to oppose the **Continue on page 3**

Speakers gaveled at city council meeting

The usual readings of ordinances by Knoxville City Council Tuesday evening, April 2, turned out to be anything but routine.

First, there was the announcement at the start of the meeting that a tornado watch had been put in effect for Knox County.

But it wasn't until the second reading of ordinances that four members of the audience, who had signed up to speak in favor of or in opposition of the ordinances, proved that routine was no longer a part of the meeting.

Starting with the second

reading of an ordinance to update the Knoxville Fire Department records retention, Knoxvillians Tom Ruggles (speaking in favor) and Ellis Connelly (against), voiced the reasons for their particular stance.

And in both cases the conversation veered into how record retention was valuable, especially in the Israeli occupation of Gaza.

Kincannon gaveled both speakers, reminding them they had five minutes to speak on the topic, not about the conflict in the Middle East.

Next up was a second reading of an ordinance

amending the oath of office taken by Knoxville police officers and firefighters.

Speaking in favor of the ordinance was Connelly, and opposing was Ruggles. Again the conversation veered to the Israeli occupation of Gaza.

And Kincannon, again, gaveled the speakers and reminded them they needed to stay on topic.

A second reading of an ordinance closing a section of McElroy Avenue from the east side of the Varner Street and McElroy Avenue intersection for the purpose of development came next.

Speaking in favor of the

ordinance was Ruggles, and opposing was Connelly. Again the conversation veered to the Israeli occupation of Gaza.

And Kincannon, again, gaveled the speakers and reminded them they needed to stay on topic.

All three items did pass on second reading.

The pattern continued through the readings and ultimate approval of seven resolutions before council.

Knoxvillians Madison Funk and Lillith Sweeney had signed up to either speak in favor of, or speak against, the resolutions.

While the viewpoints

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A Better Way

From a distance

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The following is a column I wrote for the July 2006 edition of *Chronicles Magazine*. The dollar figures are much higher now, but the views expressed are even more applicable today.

On April 14, the front-page headline of *USA Today* read, "More say U.S. focus should be home." The story cited a *USA Today*/Gallup poll that found that nearly half of Americans thought the United States "Should mind its own business internationally and let other countries get along as best they can on their own."

Similarly, the *New York Times* ran a front-page story decrying U.S. isolationist and protectionist trends. Did the readers of these

articles stop to think about the fact that no one is really in favor of the type of isolation or protection the critics imply? No one wants to throw up walls around the United States or stop all foreign trade and commerce.

Our interventionist foreign policies, however, have produced more anti-Americanism than any isolationist could ever have caused. Back in 2002, William Schneider, in the *National Journal* (December 21), wrote:

Throughout the Middle East, anti-Americanism has grown along with U.S. influence... The United States is in a stronger position strategically and a weaker position politically. The lesson: great power breeds great resentment.

His words are even truer today, except that they apply all over the world and not just in the Middle East.

Our internationalist policies have killed more U.S. industries and have resulted in more lost jobs than anything any protectionist could ever have done. Even the neoconservative Ben Stein,

in a recent column about the bankruptcy of Delphi, wrote: It is a big company and its death knell tolls a whole new sad day for the American worker. Free trade is great for college professors and consumers. It is a stone killer for workers, and I feel badly for them.

Because we have sent so many millions of good jobs to other countries over the last several years, huge numbers of young people are now working as waiters and waitresses, going to graduate school, delaying the inevitable. Many - even those who hold advanced degrees - are finding the good jobs are simply not there. A young man who holds a Ph.D. from Vanderbilt recently visited my office; he works as a cook in one of Knoxville's finer restaurants.

In mid-March, I spoke at a Development Districts of Appalachia meeting in a hotel near Reagan National Airport to a crowd of 300 attendees, including government officials from 13 states, from New York down to Georgia. When I said that

the first obligation of the U.S. Congress is to the American people, I was interrupted by applause. No matter what the audience, this is the reaction I always get when I say we should start putting our own people first.

Today, you are labeled an isolationist if you opposed the war in Iraq, even though it was a very unnecessary war that has become one of the biggest foreign-policy mistakes in U.S. history.

Conservatives used to believe in balanced budgets and fiscal prudence and used to oppose deficit spending. Now, some conservatives will label you as an isolationist if you believe that a nation that is over \$8 trillion in debt should never have spent \$300 billion in Iraq and Afghanistan, as we have over the last three years.

You are considered a terrible protectionist if you are upset about our \$700 billion trade deficit or all the jobs we have sent to other countries. And you are considered a protectionist if you think it is unfair for foreign governments to take over our ports or for foreign businesses to get our most lucrative government

contracts when those same foreign countries will not allow Americans to compete fairly or control businesses in their countries.

There is a better way. It is not the ridiculous isolationism or protectionism critics scornfully and sarcastically describe. Nor is it the no-borders global intervention of the neocons. And it is certainly not a weak-kneed trade policy that lets the Chinese and others do anything they want while killing off one U.S. industry after another.

The better way is to have trade and tourism and cultural and educational exchanges with the countries that treat us fairly, and to help them out during humanitarian crises. This would mean renegotiating trade agreements with any country with which our trade gets seriously out of balance. We need to insist that, if we are to do business and trade with them, they need to find something they can buy from us.

The better way—indeed, the best way—would be a return to America-first policies, in both trade and foreign relations. This means kicking our habit of

intervening in so many religious, ethnic, and political disputes around the world—a habit that has caused so much resentment toward the United States. We could still maintain the strongest military in the world, with a much smaller price tag, if we stuck to genuine national defense.

This better way would mean a foreign policy of friendship toward all countries, without calling for yearly expenditures of hundreds of billions of dollars that we do not have. And it would mean taking positions of enlightened neutrality toward foreign disputes that are really none of our business. And it would mean trade policies that show at least a little concern for, and support of, American companies and American workers.

Obviously, this is not the neoconservative way, or that of big-government conservatism (if there really is such a thing). This is traditional conservatism, or what we used to call the American way.

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Merit board approves new animal investigator position

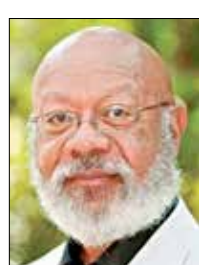
The board discussed

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Then there is the new mandate from the EPA that will effectively ban automobile internal combustion engines starting in 2032. Alert! That is only eight years away. The new rule requires that 70%

of new vehicles be either electric or hybrid. Clearly, the market has shown that EVs are not ready for prime time and the only way that the public can be forced to buy EVs is to limit the production of gas and diesel vehicles. The public be damned. I have yet to hear the Republicans confront this latest attack on American industry and the American public. Right now the public has shown that the current production of EVs has outstripped the demand for the vehicles. EVs sit languishing on dealer lots. Manufacturers have scaled back production and continue to lose billions. Some startups are near bankruptcy. An ad for the Ford Lightning offered \$15,000 in incentives. However, the Lightning is a vanity pickup. It cannot haul or tow nearly the loads of the gas truck and its range is compromised when it tries to haul or tow.

Then it is \$17,000 more for an inferior product.

That the EPA would issue its rules now was a surprise. I thought they would wait until after the election because the rule should cost Biden Michigan. Although the Michigan Republican party is in disarray, the automobile industry is the main industry in the state. The EPA mandate will shrink the number of automobile workers and shutter all those companies that produce parts for the industry. Automobile workers and ordinary citizens should now vote for Biden.

Then there is the problem of power generation. Our electric grid is not ready and will not be ready to handle 10 million new EVs (assuming that the rule is implemented). Consider that New York now has less than 2,000 chargers for EVs. In 2032 it will need 40,000. What about the demands on the grid? Currently, California and other states are experiencing more brown outs and black outs due to the unreliability of solar and wind. What happens as coal and natural gas are phased out? Remember when California was asking residents to curtail the charging of EVs due to

the strain on the grid? Then too the EPA is issuing rules that will shut down many power plants due to carbon emissions. This will make things worse. New transformers, cables, relay stations and infrastructure will be needed and will not be ready by 2032. Also, all of this comes at a higher cost. What about the burden on the poor?

I've written before about the environmental damage that comes from the mining of the minerals used in EV battery production. I've also written about the impact of wind and solar on animals, birds and ocean wildlife. I've also written that China is the main beneficiary of Biden's rules. Again, was Hunter on the Chinese payroll too?

EVs are too expensive for the majority of car buyers. Used EVs sell poorly because of their limited range, cost of charging, cost of insurance and battery replacement. The only way to get to the 70% number is to eliminate the tariff on cheap Chinese EVs. BYD, the largest Chinese EV manufacturer, has announced it is building a plant in Mexico. Trump has said that he will hit BYD with a 100% tariff. But Trump will be around only four years if he is elected. BYD can wait.

Again, the Republican senators and representatives are doing nothing to stop this onslaught of rules and regulations that will severely damage the economy as well as the environment. I hate to call them gutless. But if it walks like a duck and quacks like a duck.....

Advance Knox, the growth plan meticulously put together to address the myriad of concerns raised by more and more people moving here and the attendant changes necessitated in terms of building infrastructure, was the subject of a heated meeting in the Town of Farragut. Originally, the growth plan was derailed by a 3-2 vote against it by Farragut's Board of Mayor and Aldermen. That appeared to have been reversed last week when the board met, as required by state law so that Aldermen could explain their votes against the plan. That's when Alderman Scott Meyer said following a personal conversation

with Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs, that he was moving to reconsider and would support the growth plan. In a legislative body, a motion to reconsider must be made by a member who voted with the majority, which Meyer did. Alderman David White was apparently aggravated throughout the course of the meeting and loudly and wrongly insisted it was illegal. White also claimed Scott Meyer's motion to reconsider was not legal. Thomas Hale, the attorney for the Town of Farragut corrected White and informed the alderman that it was indeed a legal motion. White got up in righteous indignation and said he would not sit there "and listen to the law be violated 20 times that you suckers all agree with."

White also refused to explain his own vote against the growth plan, although required to do so by Tennessee State law.

David White seemed to be wrong just about every step of the way. White claimed Mayor Jacobs had sent a letter to the State of Tennessee seeking mediation. Jacobs, who was attending the Farragut Board of Mayor

and Aldermen meeting, got up and set the record straight, saying he had not sent the letter yet. With the board set to reconsider the growth plan, there is likely little need for Mayor Jacobs to send the letter.

The growth plan was specifically designed to include the City of Knoxville, Knox County, and the Town of Farragut to limit sprawl, as well as compress development and ensure rural land is preserved.

The rapid growth in numerous areas in both Knoxville and Knox County has put a strain on infrastructure as well as seriously impacted travel. One only has to look at the development along Chapman Highway to see the increasing strain on traffic all feeding out onto the highway, creating long delays and longer travel times.

When people pour into a community, there is increased pressure to build more, yet it also often times proves to be a strain on existing infrastructure, necessitating more roads, schools, and services. The fact 10 million people have entered the country across our southern border has increased that pressure

throughout much of the United States.

The recent primary elections clearly demonstrated voters in Knox County are becoming more acutely aware of growth and they don't like it much. Nominees for the Knox County Commission in several districts — Andy Fox in South Knoxville, Adam Thompson in the Eighth District, and Angela Russell in West Knox and Farragut — all ran on platforms involving responsible growth.

For those of us who have lived here our entire lives, it is interesting to see many of the transplants who have come in recent years who are up in arms about growth. Those are some of the folks who are the most vehemently against more growth at the present.

The rabidly anti-growth warriors who are fighting Advance Knox may well be cutting off their noses to spite their faces. Advance Knox does preserve rural land and sets a blueprint for reasonable growth with a genuine and hard-fought effort to eliminate urban sprawl. Otherwise, it will be a constant battle, fought hand-to-hand over every proposed development all

across the county. Advance Knox serves as a reasonable starting point.

Age-Appropriate Common Sense Needed

The Knoxville News-Sentinel published an article discussing the "banning" of books in Knox County Schools. Let's be very clear about this. The literal definition of "banned" is to prohibit or forbid, which would make it unavailable for anyone to read, anywhere. When the conversation concerns schools and children, it is entirely a different thing. Any rational adult realizes there are things that are age-appropriate throughout a young life. Books that are overly sexual don't belong in school libraries. There is also a difference between "challenging" texts and books with sexually explicit imagery. There is such a thing as something being inappropriate content for minors.

The Sentinel invariably comes down on the side of the Left. One of its writers, covering the conversation about age-appropriate books, cites

the Southern Poverty Law Center as having identified "Moms for Liberty" as an "extremist antigovernment group." The Left routinely uses the Southern Poverty Law Center to label organizations it doesn't like as "hate groups" or the like. The Southern Poverty Law Center has regularly spread hatred in the guise of combating it. The SPLC also is against parental rights and had to fork out a settlement of \$3.37 million to a group it had falsely accused of being "anti-Muslim extremist."

John Rose Considering Run For Governor

Congressman John Rose has acknowledged what many already knew — he's thinking about running for governor in 2026. A former state agriculture commissioner, Rose sent out a statewide mailer urging his election as a delegate to the Republican National Convention just before the March primary. The Cookeville Republican evidently told state legislators he is giving the coming gubernatorial contest some thought.

growth plan should go back to the Knox County Coordinating Committee and not the Farragut Board of Mayor and Aldermen. He said Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs had asked the state to intervene.

Jacobs addressed the meeting briefly, saying he had the paperwork ready to send to the state but had yet to send it, depending on the action of the Farragut aldermen.

After several Farragut citizens spoke in opposition to the growth plan and encouraged the three aldermen to "stay the course," Mayor Williams called

on the three aldermen to explain their "No" votes and White stood, was called out of order, and spoke anyway.

"I will not stay in here and listen to the law be violated," White said, adding, "You suckers all agree with it." He walked out of the meeting after refusing to speak further on why he voted against the growth plan the previous week.

The standing-room-only crowd erupted in applause as White left the meeting.

Mayor Williams then called on Alderman Drew Burnette who said while he found some good parts in the Growth Plan, he is concerned about the current

and future traffic from Choto and Hardin Valley the plan would create. He said Farragut wasn't "looking for a fight" but he would stick to his "No" vote.

When Alderman Meyer spoke, very briefly, he said the growth plan did not address density but after meeting with Mayor Jacobs, his staff and Knox County Commissioners, he was changing his vote. He called a vote to rescind his previous vote at the board's next meeting on Thursday, April 11.

Mayor Williams called for a vote and he, Meyer and Povlin voted "Yes" and Burnette abstained.

Board of education briefed on new library review

Knox County Schools will begin a new process for the development of their respective library collections.

Supervisor Library/Media Services with Knox County Schools Sarah Searles addressed the KCS Board of Education Thursday night, April 4, to talk about the system's libraries and to tell how KCS plans to change its reviewing process.

Seales said the new process is being implemented because of the "national conversation going on" about libraries and some books considered to be inappropriate for school libraries.

"There is a national conversation around us ... with heated rhetoric about book banning," Searles said.

Searles asked, "What is a library's purpose?"

She said libraries aren't about books, per se. They are about people.

She said they exist, in KCS schools, to inform and empower students, to make them think, create, share and grow.

She said there are three constants at KCS libraries. They are managed by highly qualified and trained professionals, school collections will be "safe, inclusive, and age appropriate, and they are tailored to meet the "unique needs of each school community."

Searles said the new system is an opportunity to improve how the library's collections are made, developed and managed.

Searles said the new process will involve more voices and opinions with five to seven "stakeholders" being involved.

That would include the librarian, an administrator, a teacher, the school counselor, and at least one parent/guardian, and they would make recommendations to pass on to the library board.

And it's a new review process for titles that have been brought into question.

At present a parent with a child in the school where a book is being questioned, may make a complaint about a book.

Searles said that is dealt with on an individual basis. If the parent is not satisfied with the decision it will go to the school level committee. If that does not result in the result they want, it goes to the district level committee.

If the complaint is still not what was being asked for, that person is told how to take it to the state, which is their right.

Searles said there is "collaboration" on getting new titles.

"The same with removals," she said.

"We are aware that certain titles are considered especially sensitive," she said. She said that's usually because of content including drugs, sex, violence, or offensive language.

It's not an easy task, Seales said.

"In the late 90s, early 2000s, there was a growing concern with, then, a newly popular series called 'Harry Potter.' The concern was that children would learn

the discussions on topic were questioned at one point by Councilwoman Amelia Parker.

Parker said citizens have a right to be heard. Kincannon responded she would prefer the speaker(s) stayed on the topic being discussed and address local concerns.

But she used her gavel a little less.

All resolutions were passed by city council. Those resolutions:

- Authorize the mayor to execute any and all documents necessary to allow Knoxville/Knox County Emergency Management Agency and Middle East Tennessee Emergency Radio Services, Inc., to co-locate communications

equipment at a tower on Sharps Ridge owned by the city.

- Authorize the mayor to execute any and all documents necessary to apply for and, if awarded, accept a grant from the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency in the amount of \$400,000 for the purpose of funding a new public boat dock at Suttree Landing Park for a project cost not to exceed \$535,000 - with \$135,00 in matching funds.

- Authorize the mayor to execute any and all documents necessary to apply for and accept a grant award from the Tennessee Highway Safety Office in the amount not to exceed \$200,000, with no local match, to provide

enhanced community traffic safety education under the Community Traffic Safety Program.

- Authorize the mayor to execute any and all documents necessary to apply for and accept a grant from the State of Tennessee Highway Safety Office in the amount of \$35,000.00, with no required local match, to provide overtime funding for Pedestrian Safety Campaigns.

- Authorize the mayor to execute any and all documents necessary to apply for and accept a grant from the Tennessee Highway Safety Office in the amount of \$200,000, with no required local match, to purchase traffic safety equipment and to

provide for overtime costs to enforce impaired, distracted or aggressive driving, occupant protection and speeding, and to conduct high visibility and traffic calming operations.

- Authorize the mayor to execute any and all documents necessary to apply for and accept a grant award for \$200,000, with no required local match, from the U.S. Department of Justice, Community Oriented Policing Services to be used to support and enhance Law Enforcement Mental Health and Wellness Act programs and activities for police department staff.

- Authorize the mayor to execute an agreement with Design and Construction Services, Inc., in

an amount not to exceed \$117,000 for the construction of a push wall in order to add a third compactor at the Solid Waste Transfer Facility located at 1033 Elm Street.

In other business, Kincannon noted that April saw the opening of the Dogwood Trails in Knoxville. She said a kickoff event for the opening of the trail was held at 5 p.m. Thursday, April 4, at Talahi Park in Sequoyah Hills.

Councilwoman Debbie Helsley announced Knoxville Area Transit will restore "most" hours that were cut during the COVID-19 Pandemic. Those hours will be restored beginning April 8.

District 6 Councilwoman

Gwen McKenzie was recognized by Andrew Roberto (Second District) for being awarded the Ethel Beck Society 2024 Woman of the Year. The Ethel Beck Society honors the heritage and legacy of African American women with an annual brunch.

District 6 Councilwoman Lauren Rider (Fourth District) announced a "lunch mob" will be held from 11 a.m. - 1 p.m. Wednesday, April 10, at Time Out Deli, 2012 North Broadway. The event is being held to support businesses in that area affected by Knoxville Utility Board work on water lines on lower Broadway north of First Creek. The work is expected to continue through June 2024.

BOE votes 8-0 on teacher raises

Knox County School Board of Education took a step closer to meeting a state law passed last year that requires Tennessee teachers to be paid at least \$50,000 a year by the 2026-27 school year.

The board voted 8-0 in favor of a new salary scale presented two months ago by Evergreen Solutions.

The new salary schedule means a teacher with a bachelor's degree will have a starting salary around \$47,000 a year. With a

master's degree, the starting pay would be about \$50,700.

The new salary scale will cost approximately \$39 million and is scheduled to take effect July 1. Funding for the pay increase will be discussed later this month during the board's budget meeting.

Second District's Jennifer Owen recused herself from the vote.

She said she probably didn't have to recuse herself but, "When my time on the board ends I would want

to go back to my classroom. I would be voting on my own salary and that is not right."

Owen is running for reelection this year.

Owen also asked the board to hold off on the vote because there were many questions about the new salary scale.

"A salary scale for a public school district is supposed to be a public record," Owen said.

"Not only have board members not fully seen every piece of the salary scale, the public has

absolutely not seen every piece of the salary scale."

Owen suggested the board study the salary scale further and meet in a special called meeting before the budget meeting.

Interim Assistant Superintendent of Business and Talent Jennifer Hemmelgarn said is has "been decades" since the Knox County Board of Education has made such large changes in the compensation for teachers.

"We are excited about this. Very excited," she said.

The new review system will get tested this school year.

after Hall of Famer Todd Helton and a property at 503 East Inskip Drive may be sold for \$1,000 to pay back taxes. Observations

I hate writing. I love having written.

Dorothy Parker

As my readers know, I have retired from my medical practice after 50 years, and now consider myself in my second career as a writer. I finally retired my medical license because it was unnecessary and I became tired of paying a lot of money every year for governmental licensure.

I write because I like the creative process. And I am able to do so because my wife, Becky and I always lived frugally, so I don't need to make a living from writing. Becky teases me when we receive royalty checks for books I've published, by inviting me to go to Chick-fil-A for lunch.

There are benefits to being your own boss. My "homemade" essays are my own. I write about what interests me. And I only have to answer to my wife and editress!

Even though I am retired,

medicine continues to interest me and I still follow three medical journals. And people still ask my opinion regarding medical issues, even though I'm quick to point out that I'm retired, no longer have a medical license and, consequently, unemployable. I'm no longer in the medical trenches, but the observations of five decades afford some measure of discernment.

My skepticism of media reporting is well known. However, a number of recent medical stories raises issues worthy of comment from the so-called bird's eye view of an emeritus internist and geriatrician.

Recently, Kate Middleton's illness and cancer diagnosis captured the world's attention. I have no inside information on this young lady's final diagnosis and respect her privacy where so many did not. The media circus and speculation were deplorable. Most people are sincere and concerned when they

learn of someone's cancer diagnosis. But as a cancer survivor, I can say that most patients do not want to be the subject of speculation or discussion. And repeatedly asking a cancer patient how they are doing is problematic.

When I first heard of Kate Middleton's abdominal surgery, I thought about diverticulitis, which sometimes perforates the colon leading to surgery and a temporary colostomy. I have had many patients with diverticular disease. But I later learned she had a history of Crohn's Disease which is a chronic inflammatory bowel problem. Not infrequently, Crohn's Disease can lead to elective or urgent surgery. And inflammatory bowel disease can predispose to colon cancer which might only be discovered during pathologic analysis of surgical specimens. My analysis is obvious conjecture, but perhaps marginally better than untrained journalistic speculation.

Too often we read of tragic illnesses such as cancer in young people. However, having survived cancer, I can state that cancer at any age is terrible. However, a recent report of data from 57,000 patients collected between 2010-2019 suggests that colon, breast and endocrine cancers appear to be occurring more frequently in younger patients, defined as those less than 50 years

old. Interestingly, cancer rates are declining in older people as defined as those older than 65. The explanation for increased cancer in younger people is unknown, but causative speculation includes obesity, alcohol, exposure to pollutants and carcinogenic chemicals as well as smoking. I mention the time period because the data is pre-Covid, so delayed cancer screening during the pandemic can't be indicted.

Every doctor has what medicine describes as an "anecdotal case." You might say an illness which is unusual. I remember a young woman who was pregnant and complained of a breast mass. Her obstetrician told her it was a swollen milk duct, but when it increased in size, I sent her for a mammogram. I later found out that the radiologist told her she was "too young for breast cancer" and refused to do the mammogram. Months later, breast cancer was finally diagnosed with a tragic outcome. The lesson is: don't delay screening or medical care, and don't let "experts" override common sense.

The standard screening test for colon cancer is colonoscopy, although stool testing for occult blood or stool analysis for cancerous DNA is also utilized. A study in the March 14, 2024, New England Journal of Medicine reported a study analyzing blood samples to screen for

cancerous colonic DNA. And if you develop colon cancer the DNA of the cancer can be analyzed and a diagnostic test can be developed to screen blood samples for recurrent tumors. And researchers are working to develop a technique to stimulate the immune system to recognize the DNA of colon cancer proteins and fight the cancer. Sounds like Star Trek.

In experienced hands, the colonoscopy procedure is safe and reliable. The big drawback is the prep to clean the colon. But once that's done, the wonderful "rush" of propofol anesthesia knocks you out and explains why propofol was Michael Jackson's drug of choice. Unfortunately, it was administered by unskilled people and it cost Jackson his life.

Next, a paper in Nature magazine reports a study where up to 50% of aggressive colon cancers were associated with the bacterium (fusobacterium nucleatum). The explanation is complicated but may be related to what is called the gut microbiome. The lower intestine is full of bacteria that participate in digestion, make vitamin K for coagulation and produce molecules regulating some aspects of the immune system. We live in a symbiotic relationship with the bacteria in our intestinal tract. It is speculated that the fusobacterium somehow "cloaks"

cancer cells from chemotherapeutic drugs.

Lastly, a study regarding marijuana caught my eye. The harmful and carcinogenic effects of partially combusted tobacco leaf (smoke) is well known. Years ago, I predicted that the legalization of marijuana and exposing millions to partially combusted marijuana leaves would lead to vascular disease. The study showed that people who smoke marijuana also have increased risks of heart attacks, strokes and vascular disease.

Aldous Huxley borrowed Shakespeare's term for Huxley's futuristic, dystopian book, "Brave New World." I can identify with that term as I read that 10% of doctors are using AI to research medical articles and make diagnoses. A report from the University of Kansas studied the use of AI in clinical practice. Reportedly, there was 92% accuracy and inaccuracies were said to be uncommon. I'm not a technology luddite, but the description of AI "hallucinations" (making up information) in the Kansas paper disturbs me.

Admittedly, I'm old school with books and journals. Research with machine learning should continue, but this seasoned Doc believes AI is not ready for medical prime time.

Something is happening at Melton Hill Park

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Atop the hill overlooking the waterfront at Knox County's Melton Hill Park are several pieces of new playground equipment waiting to be installed. It seems sort of lonely to see all those playthings not yet being used yet.

The Focus asked Knox County Commission Chairwoman Terry Hill, who represents the area inside District 6, what's going on there.

"The plan is to have it ready to go (by) May 1st. There is some concrete that needs to be done at both Melton Hill and (the) weather has to cooperate

Melton Hill Park is a 112-acre county park on the Clinch River with two boat ramps, a fishing pier, a sandy beach and a swimming area. There's also a picnic pavilion and a sand volleyball court. It may well be the most distant park in the county system with lots of trails, wildflowers, paddling and cycling, lots of back roads and easy and more difficult hiking areas.

The park is said to be ideal for bird watching. The nature trail is about three miles long and the park is open from dawn to dusk every day.

On April 26 until April 28, Melton Hill Park will be the site of the "Camporee

on The Hill" hosted by the Knox County Parks and Recreation Department. Promoted as an "immersive camping experience" it will feature interactive nature programs for all ages, a sunset movie, local band campfire jams, water sports rentals and beautiful scenic views.

The free event offers a select number of primitive tent and group sites, designed to accommodate up to six people or group sites for up to 12 individuals. Reservations for the Camporee and programmed events need to be made a week before the event. Check-ins are Friday, April 26 after 4 p.m. and pets on leash are welcome.

An onsite bathhouse offers showers and restrooms but the campsites do not include electric or water hookups. The event is open to Knox County residents only.

find the park is to take the Hardin Valley exit on Pellissippi Parkway and turn left. Go 2.1 miles west and turn right onto Steele Road. Take the 1st left onto Sam Lee Rd and stay straight onto Couch Mill

Rd. Stay right onto Williams Bend Road which will dead end at the park.

What children find online can be disturbing, depressing and deviant material. Other youngsters are the victims of online bullying. Too many children come away from their times online with a belief that the world is a terrible place

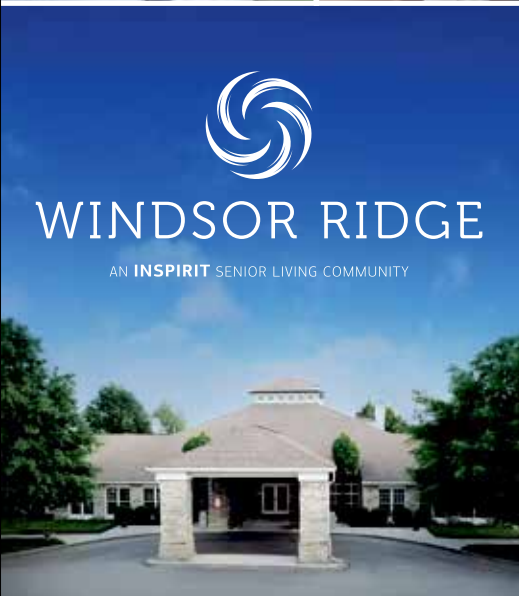
and that life might not be worth living. Haidt says childhood suicide rates have increased by 50% since the introduction of cell phones.

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A Senate Tragedy

The Death of Lester Hunt

Pages from the Past

It is not highly unusual for political contests to bring out the absolute worst in an individual or individuals. Perhaps it is not as omnipresent as much as many cynical members of the public suspect, but nonetheless, it exists. There are incidences of such behavior still, even locally. The most notable case in history is that of Lester C. Hunt. Hunt was a former two-term governor of Wyoming and a United States senator. Senator Hunt was at the center of an intense internecine battle that involved control of the United States Senate.

Allen Drury, the author of perhaps the penultimate political novel about the United States Senate, "Advise & Consent," was a young reporter working for the Associated Press. Drury wrote of Lester Hunt, describing the Wyoming solon as "60-ish, dumpy, always smiling, always humorous, outwardly serene, but obviously [a] host to hidden demons." Time would prove Allen Drury was a shrewd judge of character.

Like much of the rest of the country, the Great Depression colored the politics of Wyoming. Some historians claim the Equality States was normally Republican, but if so, it had a habit of electing Democrats. John B. Kendrick was governor of Wyoming and elected to the United States Senate in 1916 and remained there until his death November 13, 1933. Wyoming's other Senate seat was occupied by Republicans, including Francis E. Warren who was a long-serving senator and the father-in-law of General John J. Pershing. Joseph C. O'Mahoney was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by Senator Kendrick's death and he served in the Senate from 1933-1953 when he lost to GOP Governor Frank Barrett.

Lester Callaway Hunt was a dentist who had been born in Illinois and moved to Lander, Wyoming, to engage in his chosen profession. When America entered the First World War, Hunt joined the U.S. Army's Dental Corps and left the service as a lieutenant. Before returning home to Lander, Lester Hunt did some post-graduate work at Northwestern University. By 1924, Hunt was respected inside his profession and prominent enough to be appointed to serve on Wyoming's Board of Dental Examiners.

Lester Hunt's political career began with his election to the Wyoming House of Representatives in 1932, the year Franklin D. Roosevelt headed the Democratic ticket and swept Herbert Hoover out of the White House. In 1934, Hunt was elected to statewide office, winning

a contest to serve as the Wyoming Secretary of State. Lester Hunt was popular with Wyoming voters and was reelected to another four-year term in 1938. Hunt was the near-unanimous choice of Wyoming Democrats to be their gubernatorial nominee against incumbent Governor Nels H. Smith in 1942. The 1942 election did not go well for Democrats across the country and Wyoming voters tossed out U.S. Senator Harry Schwartz for wealthy Republican rancher Edward V. Robertson by a majority of almost 7,000 votes. At the same time, Lester Hunt was demonstrating his personal appeal by beating Governor Smith by 2,000 votes.

1946 was an even better year for Republicans nationally, as the GOP captured both Houses of Congress, but in Wyoming, Governor Lester Hunt and Senator Joseph O'Mahoney both won reelection.

As the 1948 election approached, Governor Hunt was the logical candidate to challenge Senator Edward V. Robertson. Robertson, a native of Wales in Great Britain, had been the owner of the famed Hoodoo Ranch in Wyoming. Senator Robertson still spoke with a discernable accent and was a through-going conservative. Lester Hunt, with two years left remaining on his gubernatorial term, challenged Robertson in the general election. While 1942 and 1946 had been good years for Republicans, 1948 proved to be an unexpectedly terrible year for GOP candidates. Presidential nominee Thomas E. Dewey campaigned as the heavy favorite in the general election against President Harry Truman. The national news media fully expected that Dewey would carry a continued Republican majority with him. Truman campaigned against the Republican Congress shrewdly, while Dewey tried not to say much of anything. Even with Republicans favored in many races, most political observers believed Senator E. V. Robertson was an endangered incumbent due to Lester Hunt's personal popularity in Wyoming. Virtually nobody was surprised when Hunt won the general election with 57% of the ballots cast. TIME magazine described the contest between Hunt and Senator Robertson as "an out-and-out popularity contest." The most widely read news magazine of the age, TIME noted Hunt was "a good rider, good shot, and terrific campaigner."

The 56-year-old governor resigned his office and left for Washington, D.C., to take the oath of office to serve as a senator of the United States.

Lester Hunt became a member of the notable Class of 1948, which included Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, Paul Douglas of Illinois, Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, Lyndon Johnson of Texas and Robert Kerr of Oklahoma.

Lester Hunt served capably in the U.S. Senate and was a member of the crime investigating committee, headed by Estes Kefauver, that became the first televised sensation in the country. Hunt had exchanged bitter words with the self-appointed subversive hunter in Congress, Senator Joe McCarthy of Wisconsin. Hunt assailed McCarthy for being "an opportunist" as well as being "a liar" and "a drunk." McCarthy growled he would get his revenge.

Hunt tended to his responsibilities and was considered to be the heavy favorite for reelection to the Senate in 1954. Everything changed in the blink of an eye. On June 9, 1953, Lester "Buddy" Hunt Jr., 24 years old, went to Lafayette Square in Washington, D.C., where he propositioned an undercover male police officer. Buddy Hunt was arrested on a morals charge. In the beginning, the Washington, D.C. Police Department dropped the charges against the younger Hunt. Two members of the United States Senate, both of whom were political allies of Joe McCarthy, caught wind of Buddy Hunt's arrest. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire and Herman Welker of Idaho brought terrific pressure on District of Columbia prosecutors to bring Buddy Hunt to trial. At the time of his arrest, Buddy Hunt was a student at the Episcopal Theological School, where he was also the president of the student body.

A trial was held, and Buddy Hunt was convicted. Senator Lester Hunt sat beside his son in court and pulled cash from his pocket to pay the \$100 fine. Unfortunately, things only got worse. With the Senate almost evenly divided and the 1954 elections approaching, Bridges and Welker wanted Senator

Lester Hunt to withdraw from his expected reelection campaign and retire from the Senate. Otherwise, Wyoming would be flooded with pamphlets detailing Buddy Hunt's arrest for having solicited a male officer for sex.

In a documentary film made when Buddy Hunt was 87 years old, he told an interviewer, "They were going to canvass every house. . . in every town that they could and tell them what was going on in the Hunt family. They were assholes. Bastards. You just don't engage in that kind of political activity."

The same documentary, "Uniquely Nasty," featured an interview with former GOP U.S. Senator Alan Simpson, who thought what happened to Senator Lester Hunt and his family "just passes all bounds of decency." "This is absolutely beyond the pale of politics," Simpson barked. "It's a couple of sons of bitches doing evil things like out of 'Macbeth.'"

It might be difficult for modern-day readers to understand that very few people in Wyoming even knew of Buddy Hunt's arrest. As noted by Hunt's biographer Rodger McDaniel, news of Buddy Hunt's arrest was blacked out by Tracy McCracken, the influential Democratic National Committeeman from Wyoming and the publisher of several newspapers in the state. That made the threats by Bridges and Welker something to be feared by Senator Hunt.

At first, Senator Hunt refused to be intimidated. Hunt announced he was running for reelection on April 15, 1954. Whether it was Joe McCarthy, Frank Welker or Styles Bridges, or a combination of the trio, evidently someone assured Lester Hunt his son's arrest would surely be used in the fall campaign against him.

Under terrific pressure and with an abiding love for his family, on June 8, 1954, Lester Hunt announced he would not seek reelection to the U.S. Senate. Ostensibly, Hunt's decision was due to health issues. Almost immediately, the

strongest possible GOP contender to succeed Lester Hunt in the Senate announced his candidacy. William Henry Harrison was the great-great grandson of the president of the same name and the grandson of President Benjamin Harrison. Harrison was also the congressman-at-large for Wyoming. Congressman Harrison had little desire to risk his seat in the House by challenging Hunt, but with the senator out of the race, he felt much better about his chances.

Welker and Bridges may have tried to leverage their threats to get Hunt to resign his seat so that Wyoming's Republican governor could appoint an interim senator who could run in the general election as an incumbent. If so, Lester Hunt refused.

Senator Hunt continued to fret about the situation and how the morals charge would affect his wife, Nathalie. Hunt was certain it would ruin his wife's health if it didn't actually kill her. Hunt worried about a maliciously vicious campaign that would ruin his son's future and life.

Hunt went to what is now known as the Russell Senate Office Building on the morning of June 19, 1954, which was a Saturday. Despite it being June, Hunt wore an overcoat, under which he awkwardly carried a .22 caliber rifle. Sitting at his desk, Lester Hunt shot himself. Rushed to a local hospital, the senator died a few hours later.

Drew Pearson, the

premier muckraking journalist of his time, published an expose the following day. Pearson, a staunch liberal, was never one to allow facts to get in the way of a good story, but this time he had the facts on his side and printed them. "Two weeks ago he went to the hospital for a physical check and announced that he would not run again," Pearson wrote in his column, which was carried in hundreds of newspapers across the country. "It was no secret that he had been having kidney trouble for some time, but I am sure on top of this, Lester Hunt, a much more sensitive soul than his colleagues realized, just could not bear the thought of having his son's misfortunes become the subjects of whispers in his reelection campaign."

Privately, Drew Pearson didn't believe Lester Hunt's health was declining but rather had been motivated by the torment he suffered over his son's arrest and his worry. As for Hunt's tormentors, Joe McCarthy was eventually censored by his Senate colleagues and descended into alcoholism as he became a pariah without influence. McCarthy died in a hospital from his alcoholism. Herman Welker was defeated for reelection in 1956 by Frank Church. Welker's behavior was noticeably more erratic during his campaign and the former senator died from a brain tumor shortly after leaving office. Styles Bridges withdrew into the shadows following Lester Hunt's suicide and while he remained an influential legislator, he was never the same again. Bridges died in 1961, just after having been reelected in 1960. After his death, Bridges' financial corruption became known.

The Republicans failed to win Hunt's seat in the United States Senate. William Henry Harrison was upset by former Senator Joseph O'Mahoney's comeback in the 1954 election. Allen Drury drew from life and altered the plot of his novel on the Senate, patterned on the suicide of Lester Hunt. "Advise & Consent" became a huge best-seller and later a highly popular movie.

I will never forget talking many years ago to Senator O'Mahoney's niece, who 30-some odd years after Lester Hunt's suicide was still boiling with indignation over what had happened to her uncle's friend. The senator's niece still remembered Styles Bridges and Frank Welker bitterly.

Politics can be mighty rough, but there is a boundary of common decency no decent person should ever breach.

supervisor. His late wife, Libba Moore Gray, was a children's book author, an actress, and well-known in her own right.

I remember meeting Bob, Roy Price and Bill Landry for a casual lunch on the UT campus and Roy memorialized the afternoon with a photo. We talked about regional history, shared stories, and had a great time. All four of us were Swift Silver Mine buffs and followed other legends in our region.

I remember Bob Gray as

being humble, open and friendly. He had humor and could use his knowledge to correct opinions or comments in a friendly manner.

Roy Price, my longtime friend and fellow history buff and Jellico native, recalled outings with Bob in the Cumberland and Pine Mountains

"His favorite thing to say about Swift, was, 'We know stuff.' He was so proud of the fact that after searching for Swift Silver Mine for over twenty years, we had seen and learned things that no other person (had),"

Price said to me recently.

"We spent so many enjoyable days together on mountains following clues carved on rock faces and following tales passed down from past generations. He called me Brother Roy and I called him Brother Bob. That is how we felt about each other," he said.

"I could write a book about all the trips and adventures we had together. He was a very special person, who will always live in my heart," Price said.

Gloria Johnson's dilemma, county ballot set

"At the moment, there is no prohibition against her running for both offices," Knox County Election Commission Administrator Chris Davis told The Focus Thursday. He was talking about District 90 state Representative Gloria Johnson.

Johnson, who is seeking a win in the statewide Democratic Primary to challenge Republican U.S. Senator Marsha Blackburn, had also filed for re-election to her Tennessee House seat.

"She currently has no challenger for her state House seat," Davis confirmed. Thursday was the filing deadline for federal and state candidates.

However, two bills filed with the state Senate and House by Republicans could prohibit any person from seeking two different elected positions at the same

time. While Knoxville state Senator Dr. Richard Briggs says the bill isn't aimed at Johnson, the status of the bill could directly affect the unopposed Johnson in her drive for state House reelection.

What would happen if she is excluded from seeking reelection to the state legislature and no one else is on the ballot?

Knox County Law Director David Buuck said that if a vacancy exists for the seat the Knox County Commission would appoint the new representative. Johnson has said that if she should win the U.S. Senate seat, she would choose that office. If not, she'll fall back on her current state seat.

Buuck said he is surprised that the Knox County Republicans found no one to oppose Johnson for the state House seat.

Senator Briggs told The Focus the bill has passed in the state Senate but is still in committee in the House.

Davis said that should the bill pass and be signed by the governor it could exclude Johnson. The local ballot for state and federal races won't be approved by the election commission until June.

Johnson faces opposition for her party's nomination to the U.S. Senate from Marquita Bradshaw, staffing consultant and nominee for the U.S. Senate in 2020, and Civil Miller-Watkins, a former Fayette County School Board member.

Ballot set for August 1 Election

Now that the results of the March 5 primary are certified, every race for Knox County Commission has an official opponent in the August 1 general election. Candidates have until April 11 to withdraw.

Dasha Lundy's District 1 seat on the commission has Democrat Damon Rawls up against Republican Charles

Frazier. District 2 incumbent Democrat Courtney Durrett will face Independent Ethan Grantham and Republican Debbie Phillips. In the race for Kyle Ward's District 4 seat are fellow Republican Garrett Holt and Democrat Shane Jackson.

District 5 John Schoonmaker is term-limited. Vying for the position are fellow Republican Angela Russell and Democrat S. Arthur Moore. District 6

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incumbent Republican Terry Hill, who currently serves as commission chairwoman, will face Democrat Daniel Greene. District 8 Republican Richie Beeler decided not to seek reelection. Seeking that seat are Republican Adam

Thompson and Democrat Charles Chandler. District 9 Republican Carson Dailey is term-limited. Contending for that position are Republican Andy Fox, Democrat Matthew Park and Independent Stacey Smith.

Not nearly enough wrong to fire Coach Harper

Did Danny White do his homework on Kellie Harper the coach before firing her?

Sure the UT athletic director knew she had played on three national title teams for the legendary Pat Summitt in the 1990s, but how well did he know her as a college basketball coach?

White said he told Harper they were making a change after a "thorough review" of the program.

But was White aware the UT women's basketball team was the lowest point contributor among winter sports in the SEC All-Sports standings in 2018-19, the year before Harper took over the program. The Lady Vols (7-9, 19-13) were fortunate to extend their NCAA tournament streak that season.

It takes time to get a program turned back around and Harper accomplished that as the Lady Vols were 13-3 in the conference and 25-12 overall in 2022-23.

I admit the Lady Vols' record this season (10-6, 20-13) slipped a little, but not enough to fire a coach whose team never quit.

The 73-62 loss to MTSU in early December stung, but Harper's team bounced back with six straight wins.

And that gut-wrenching 74-73 loss to unbeaten South Carolina, the No. 1 team in the nation, in the SEC tournament had to count for something – but apparently not enough in White's book.

The Lady Vols lost that game on a buzzer beating 3-point bank shot from a player who rarely fired from long range!

Yes, Harper's team didn't make it out of the NCAA's second round in Raleigh, losing to No. 3 seed North Carolina State 79-72, but that defeat wasn't so bad if you consider N.C. State made it to the Final Four and lost 78-59 in the semifinals to South Carolina.

Unfortunately, the UT athletic director already had pulled the plug on Coach Harper by then.

There are other things too that makes Kellie a good coach for a team.

I heard a story not long after Harper was fired about how she put her foot down on her top player's repeated tardiness. Rickea Jackson responded with how she had never been disciplined and sincerely thanked her coach for correcting her.

That is an example of "life skills" in the statement Coach Harper made when she learned she had lost her job.

"I am grateful for the opportunity my staff and I have had to lead an amazing group of young women and to mentor them on the court as well as provide them with life skills that will benefit them far beyond the game of basketball," she said.

That's called class.

Before Coach Phil Fulmer hired Harper for the Tennessee position, she had finished her sixth year at Missouri State, guiding a young Lady Bears team to the NCAA Sweet 16 before falling to No. 2 Stanford 55-46.

'Tough' Lady Rebels outlast Oak Ridge on softball diamond

Over the past several seasons, wins haven't come easily for the West High School softball team. But the Lady Rebels picked up their third win of the 2024 season Wednesday night.

West battled cool temperatures and blustery conditions on its way to notching an 11-6 comeback victory at home.

Like the Lady Rebels, the Lady Wildcats are attempting to establish some sustained success on the diamond.

Oak Ridge, which fell to 3-6 with

the loss at West took an early 2-0 lead as it scored twice in the top of the first inning. Morgan Perry drove in the game's first run with an RBI groundout and Kaylee Hickman came home on a wild pitch to make it, 2-0.

The Lady Rebels scored their other runs in the inning with the help of defensive miscues by the Lady Wildcats. And when the dust had settled, West had a 10-2 lead.

Perry pulled Oak Ridge to within 10-3 with a solo home run in the third and Makenzie Miller had a two-run homer in the fifth

to make it 10-5.

Weaver, the Lady Rebels' pitcher drove in West's final run with an RBI double in the sixth.

Weaver pitched a complete game and had seven strikeouts. She walked three and gave up eight hits in seven innings. She surrendered a run in the seventh when Perry had an RBI single, but she would escape further damage as she got out of a bases-loaded jam.

Lady Rebels' coach Brandy Weaver said that her team showed toughness against Oak Ridge.

"I think these were two evenly matched teams, but our hitting was better and our defense was better," Weaver said. "We only have 12 players, so these girls are tough."

"They're tough because they have to be. They have to play when they don't feel well or if they're hurt, and we had to wait so long to get this field. When we played at Tyson (Park), we had homeless people sleeping in our dugout."

Fantasy player doesn't let blindness put him 'out'

Fantasy sports had yet to enter the internet world when Greg Speck graduated from high school in 1986. Little did he know then how much this activity would mean to him in the years to come and still to this day.

Having grown up in a military family, he joined the U.S. Army right out of high school. After putting in six years of service, he was on his way to making the Army a career.

But that plan literally blew up on October 22, 1992.

"I was at my Army duty station in Fort Ord, Calif., and working with 8½ pounds of C-4 plastic explosives and there was a malfunction of the fuse system – it detonated prematurely – and that caused my blindness and the rest of my disabilities," recalled Speck recently.

"When the explosion happened and I was in the hospital, I was actually given less than 72 hours to live and in a coma for 28 days," he added.

Fortunate to have survived, he was discharged in 1993.

"I've been blind now going on 32 years," said Greg.

It is bilateral blindness, a total loss of vision.

"I'm also totally deaf in my right ear and I have no sense of smell," he said. "The sensory organ in (my) face, the smell pallet, was damaged. I have hearing in my left ear with the use of a hearing aid and my sense of touch, and those are my primary senses."

Computer application keeps Speck in the game

Speck began playing fantasy baseball in 2003, co-managing a team called "Rolling

Thunder" with Vinny Carcello, his father-in-law, in the TaintBragginIfYouCanBackItUp league founded by Mike Waters, the league's commissioner and a friend of Vinny and Greg.

That was long after the pre-Internet fantasy days in Knoxville when fantasy players had to get their information from newspaper box scores and write them down by hand and somebody had to keep score.

The growth of the Internet during the 1990s enabled fantasy sports participants to instantaneously download tabulated statistics.

But Speck still had to find a way to overcome his blindness and he did.

"I use a desktop computer with Windows and I have a screen reader called JAWS For Windows," he said. "It's a simple application that I buy. It reads anything in text, including numbers."

"It's kind of funny, because I don't turn on the monitor screen. It (the text) is there, but I don't use it at all. I just hear from the speakers what the screen reader

reads to me.

"I visualize. I turn what I hear into vision."

The JAWS application gives Speck individual and team totals, too.

"You get a comprehensive statistical performance of all of the batters on your team as one group," he said. "You will hear, for instance, how many runs, how many home runs, how many RBIs and how many stolen bases and what the collective team batting average was for that day. That daily total is read to me and the same with the pitching statistics."

He chose Knoxville to start his new life

"When I was retired from the Army in 1993, I had a choice to make of where to go to start my new life as a civilian," Speck pointed out. "And I chose Knoxville of all the places in the world to come and live. I've been very happy here and it's by far the longest I've lived in one place."

"And here's something cool ... I went to the University of

Tennessee and got my Bachelor's degree in Psychology."

Why Knoxville?

"My mom lives in Ohio and my father lives in North Carolina," Greg explained. "It was kind of centrally located between the two of them."

"We traveled back and forth between those two places a lot and Knoxville was always our gas stop. At the Raccoon Valley truck stop (just north of Knoxville on I-75), we'd stop there for gasoline. And I remembered when I could see, knowing how lush and green and pretty it was. I liked the Smokies. I liked the mountains. So all the visuals of what Knoxville had to offer was in my mind when I left California."

Speck also was fortunate to see the majority of the country before his accident.

"As a family, we made it a point to visit most of the states," he said. "I didn't make it up to the northeast corner, but just about everywhere else. I'm glad I got to see as many of our beautiful United States as I did before I lost my vision."

Greg also said he made it to Canada and saw Niagara Falls and New York when he was around 15 years old.

He lived in Dayton, Ohio for six years before graduating from high school and joining the Army a month later.

TaintBraggin' league and Rolling Thunder is 'first priority'

Waters and Carcello both passed away in 2013 and Speck became the league's commissioner and sole manager of Rolling Thunder a couple of years later. Carcello and Speck together had named their team Rolling Thunder.

"I take great honor in the fact

that I'm keeping our league alive and in honor and memory of Mike and Vinny," said Greg, who has eight fantasy baseball teams he's managing this year and is the commissioner of two leagues.

"Well, I do have to say that Rolling Thunder by far is the most important and the most special of all of them no matter how many teams I have. That's my first priority."

Speck also managed three fantasy football teams this past season, but prefers the "marathon" fantasy baseball season (162 games in 180 days) over the "short-lived" football campaign.

Greg calls his wife Cathy the "draft master."

"She and I sit side by side and she's on her iPad," he said. "We log into the draft and as the draft is going on, she tells me the list of players and I tell her my choice. She actually hits the draft button."

"Once the team is drafted, I can take it over and manage it."

When asked, Speck did say he has won "five or six championships. I've had a couple of years when I finished in seventh place. For the majority of the years, I've finished in the top third."

His other hobbies: "Spending time with family and likes to travel a little bit. Goes to gym once a week for exercise. Has a hot tub in the backyard. Walks on the treadmill. Does a little bit of weightlifting."

Greg also mentioned he has a PTSD companion dog named Graham. "He's named for his Graham Cracker color. He is 11 years old. I got him when he was eight weeks old and raised him up."

As of Saturday, Speck's Rolling Thunder was in last place in the 12-team standings. That's no big deal though. He's made comebacks before in fantasy sports and life.

Fulmer, then UT's athletic director, recalled how Kellie made the decision easy for him. He set out in the interview process to hire the "best coach" for the job and that gender or ties to Tennessee didn't matter.

"It became clear that a Lady Vol would be really great, and then Kellie knocked it out of the park (in the interview)," said

Fulmer, who added that Kellie sometimes even sounds like Summitt.

Both Pat and Kellie, by the way, also grew up in a small Tennessee town and lived and worked on a farm.

If Coach Summitt were still living and retired from coaching, what do you think she would say to Danny White about this change in coaches?

My guess is probably

nothing, but she would give him that stare!

Harper finishes her Lady Vols coaching tenure with a 108-52 record, including 53-24 in conference play. She has become one of only two coaches to take four different programs to the NCAA Tournament and is just seven victories shy of career win No. 400.

A point of pride for both schools

When the powers-that-be on both sides honored Bobby Dodd at Tennessee's season-opening game against the Yellow Jackets on Sept. 4, 2017, it had to have been a point of pride for both schools.

After all, Dodd was an All-American quarterback for the Vols when Bob Neyland had the Tennessee program reaching for the stars. His time on campus stretched from 1928-30, as the Vols compiled a 27-1-2 record, led by the "Flaming Sophomores of 1928."

Vol fans sang the praises of "Hack, Mack and Dodd," better known as Buddy Hackman, Gene McEver, and Dodd. Fans also wore buttons that read "In Dodd We Trust." The fourth member of that famous backfield was Quinn Decker.

Dodd had a 57-year association with the Yellow Jacket program, through stays as head coach (1945-66), athletic director (1950-76) and alumni association consultant until his death on June 21, 1988. He compiled a 165-64-8 record (.713) in 22 seasons and guided Tech to a 31-game winning streak from 1951-53, including a 12-0 season and the national title in 1952.

He was inducted into the National Football



The annual mid-October gridiron battle between Tennessee and Georgia Tech was anxiously awaited, whether on Shields-Watkins Field in Knoxville or on Grant Field in Atlanta.

Foundation College Football Hall of Fame in 1993, honoring his coaching career. Already inducted for his playing career at Tennessee in 1959, Dodd joined Amos Alonzo Stagg and Bowden Wyatt as the only inductees selected as a player and a coach to that time.

Since 1976, the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award has been given to a head coach whose team excels on the field, in the classroom, and in the community. Georgia Tech's Grant Field became part of Bobby Dodd Stadium in 1988.

Dodd and Wyatt, both

Neyland protégés, were on opposing sides on Nov. 10, 1956, at Grant Field in a game later selected by The Associated Press (AP) in 1961 as the No. 2 game of all time. In a classic battle of field position and defense, No. 3 Tennessee defeated No. 2 Tech, 6-0. Tennessee earned the game's only score with a quick third quarter drive.

Tailback John Majors found end Buddy Cruze on two long passes, and the Vols were in sight of the Tech end zone. Tommy Bronson found the end zone for the game's only score. Bill Johnson remembered it was one of the

tightest, tensest games he had ever played in, play after play.

"That really was one of the greatest games ever played," Dodd would say later. "I thought we were going to win 7-6. We had Tennessee backed up, but [Johnny] Majors won the game again with one call. I had our safety playing back to watch for a quick kick, but Majors ran for 16 yards. My safety moved up quite a bit and then Majors quick-kicked 68 yards to our 12. We couldn't get out of that hole."

The game was played so close to the vest that Dodd, facing fourth-and-4 at the

Tennessee 29, decided to punt rather than go for the first down. Asked about Dodd not going for the requisite yardage, Wyatt, always the outspoken and consummate competitor, had a cogent answer: "Because he wouldn't have made it." Reflecting the Neyland influence, those old-time Vols were ultra-competitive as players and continued to be so as head coaches.

Dodd was 9-7-1 against Tennessee during his coaching career, with two memorable moments among the games.

When Tech defeated Tennessee 30-13 in 1949

on Shields-Watkins Field, Dodd told reporters, "My season is a success if I don't win another game."

News Sentinel sports editor Tom Siler recounted another story after the 1963 contest on Homecoming Day in Knoxville, won by Tech 23-7. On one play, Tech wide receiver Ted Davis didn't come back to the huddle, but stayed in his flanker position and was wide open for a touchdown pass. Tennessee partisans called it a maneuver that was "unethical if not illegal."

When Bob Woodruff, the interim athletic director at Tennessee, complained to the media, Dodd's response was to the point, calling Woodruff, his one-time assistant at Tech, "the worst public relations athletic director in the United States."

A Kingsport native who wore No. 17 as a Vol, Dodd was also selected to the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1966.

"In his three years at Tennessee," legendary sportswriter Grantland Rice wrote, "he figured in only one losing game and on any number of occasions his keen directing strategy saved the day."

Whether playing at Tennessee or coaching at Georgia Tech, Dodd certainly had a profound influence on the landscape of college football at both schools.

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Geoff Courtney Takes Over at Farragut

When Eddie Courtney stepped down as the head coach of the Farragut Admirals the first week of March, the Admirals knew that there would be some big shoes to fill. Courtney won 204 in 28 years as Farragut's head coach, including the 2016 state championship in Class 5A. Well, the Ads didn't have to look very far. On March 22 they promoted Geoff Courtney, Eddie's son, to the head coaching position. Geoff had served as the Ads offensive coordinator since 2017.

"Farragut High School and the football program in particular has a reputation to it," said Courtney. "People know you are going to compete against the best when you play Farragut. It's a place that has a lot of resources, due in large part to coach (Eddie) Courtney and his work, and also goes to the administration, the staff, the community. We have a lot of great kids that come up through our feeder program. It is a great school that wants to do well."

Geoff Courtney played for the Admirals and graduated from Farragut in 2006. He's been on the FHS coaching staff since the 2010 season.

"It's been a part of me," Courtney said of his alma mater. "I've been around the program my whole life, outside the four years I spent at UT and one year as a grad assistant at Carson-Newman. I'm a product of this community and this program and the school itself. I was fortunate not only to have my father's leadership but many other coaches on staff. They were influential in my life, and I just wanted to continue that on to the next group."

He added, "You are constantly learning and being in an environment where you are constantly challenged. I

never really looked to leave or go anywhere else. I have had a couple of opportunities where people have inquired the last few years but never really took any of those opportunities too seriously, but I was never looking to leave."

Geoff Courtney was an assistant coach in a variety of roles on the Farragut coaching staff under his father and plans to lean on what he's learned from Eddie Courtney during his time on the sidelines.

"He's encouraged me to be myself," Geoff said of his father. "But I've always had my own philosophies and how I want to get things done. He said to lead by example. He was always doing the grunt work and the administrative work, coordinating bus routes, lining off the field... I think when kids and your staff see that and know how much you care and how hard you work, they will want to give you the same in return. But I do plan to do things a little differently."

Last season the Admirals had their struggles. They went 4-6. Despite finishing the season with wins over rivals Hardin Valley and Maryville they missed the Class 6A playoffs due to an unkind Region tiebreaker.

Still, Courtney is excited about the future of the program.

"We are only bringing back seven starters," said Courtney. "There are going to be a lot of young, new faces. Even last fall, they were fairly success in freshmen and JV ball. It opens it up to a lot of competition at key positions. We will have a new QB to break in. On defense we will have new linebackers and two new defensive ends, plus a new corner to break in."

The Admirals are set to begin spring practice on April 24, the first official practice with Geoff Courtney in charge.

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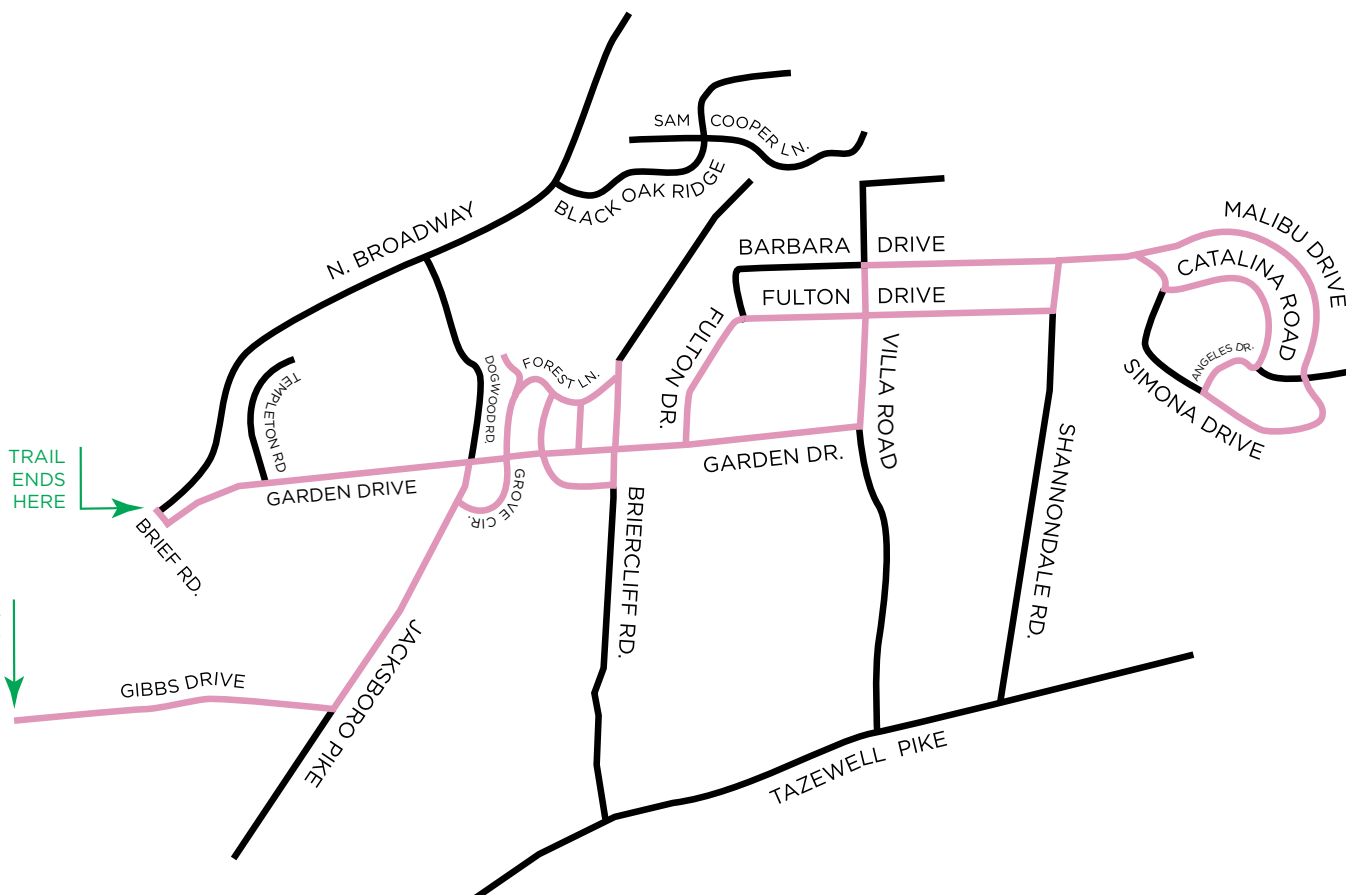

The Central Baptist Prayer Garden offers a sacred space for respite and reflection, with stone benches facing a large wooden cross. The young garden features dogwoods, azaleas, rhododendrons, boxwoods, ferns, and hydrangeas, with accent lighting enhancing the beautiful landscape in the evening hours. The site provides ample parking, and visitors should enter from Lynnwood Drive.

The Garden Side of the Fountain City Trail begins on Historic Gibbs Drive, the definition of a story-book neighborhood, noted since the early 1920s for its double row of pink dogwoods. With its linear street pattern, broad sidewalks, and spacious façade lawns, this Historic Neighborhood District reflects the characteristics of an early streetcar and automobile suburb in Knoxville. The houses are mainly Craftsman in style but all are unique featuring bungalows, Minimal Traditional, and four squares, an outstanding example of the early twentieth century tread away from elaborate Victorian-

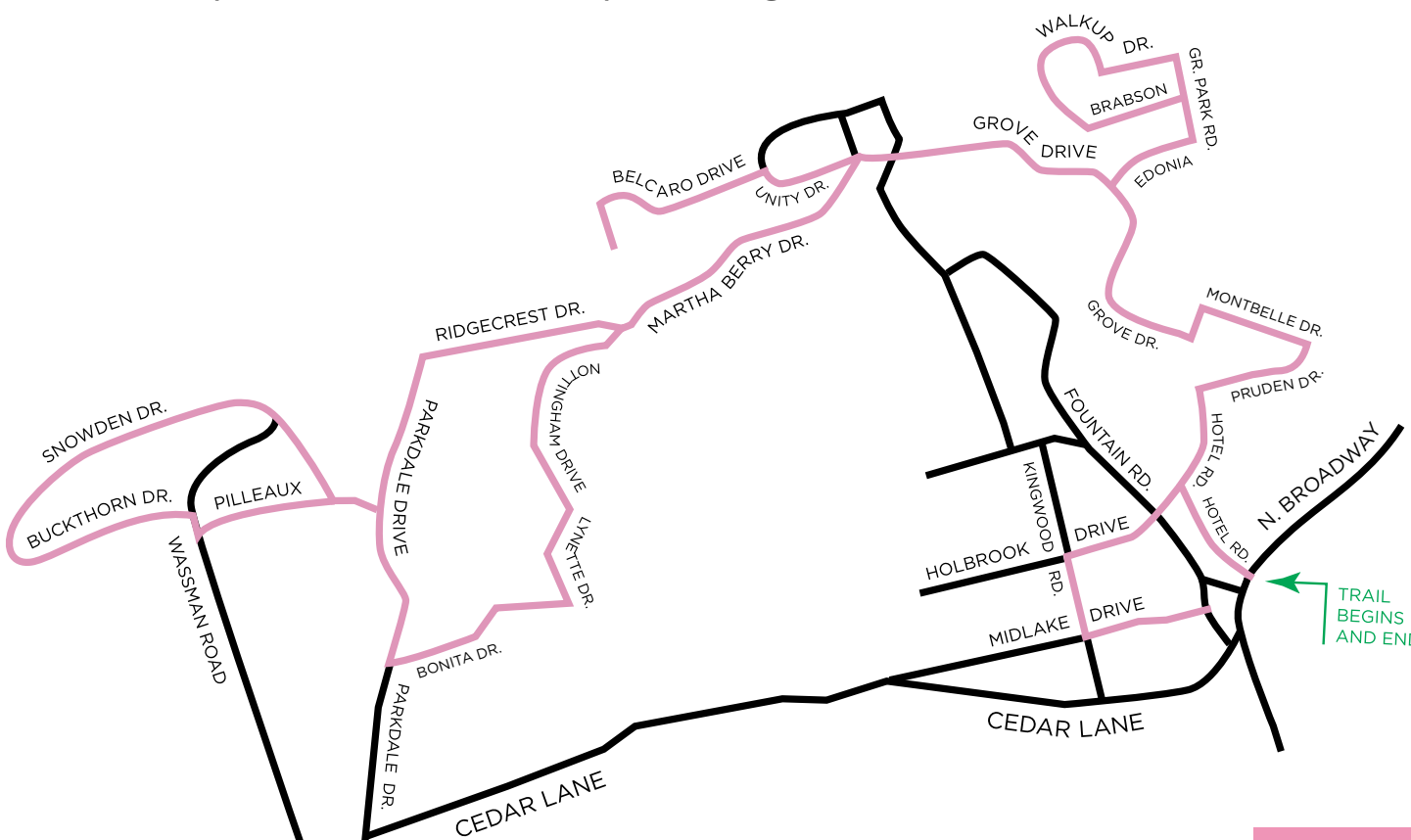
era styles to a more simplified appearance. Stone Columns mark the entrance to another historic neighborhood, Harrill Hills, which dates back to the early 1920s and is an interesting mix of architectural styles including everything from stone cottages to mid-century ranchers. This charming neighborhood enjoys lots of mature trees with beautiful gardens around every corner. Colorful plantings of mature azaleas, perennials and wildflowers are abundant along Garden Drive, Dogwood, Crestwood, and Briarcliff Roads.

The Trail climbs halfway up the steep side of Black Oak Ridge to enter Beverly Acres, where handsome houses blend into their forest setting and acid-loving azaleas flourish in the rich woodland loam. You might catch a glimpse of a lovely “weeping dogwood” which is unique to the Knoxville area. Its slender, pliant branches sweep down from the top of the trunk. Wherever it chooses to grow, a weeping dogwood must be left undisturbed; it cannot be transplanted. The route continues across Broadway at Hotel onto the Panoramic side of the trail.

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Three acres of dogwoods, floral gardens, park setting, benches, and rocking chairs for relaxation overlooking Fountain City Lake.

The Panoramic Side of the Fountain City Dogwood Trail begins and ends in a historic area. Fountain City Park located on the right is a community favorite. A clear spring, for which Fountain City is named, bubbles out of a steep cliff of solid rock behind the park. The trail is abundant with pink and white dogwoods as it meanders up the hillside to offer a first glimpse of a panoramic view from Black Oak Ridge across the city to the distant Smoky Mountains. The route skirts the western brow of Black Oak Ridge where charming homes framed

by dogwoods continue into a heavily wooded valley, known as Sherwood Forest. Enjoy another look at those panoramic views of the mountains before winding down from the heights of the ridge to the early-day resort and popular Fountain Lake. In the 1890s, the area around the spring for which the community was named, developed into a popular resort. Vacationers reached the resort from Knoxville on a dummy-line railroad with open side cars pulled by a miniature steam engine. Gresham Junior High

School, on Hotel Drive, occupies the site of a large hotel that was surrounded by cottages. By the time the hotel burned early in the 1900s, Fountain City had grown into a prosperous community connected to downtown Knoxville by an inter-urban trolley line. Atop the ridge stands ‘Belcaro’, an imposing Italianate villa once referred to as ‘The Crown Jewel of Black Oak Ridge’ which was built in the 1920s by John Hugh L. McClung. The once-magnificent villa has been abandoned and fallen into disrepair.

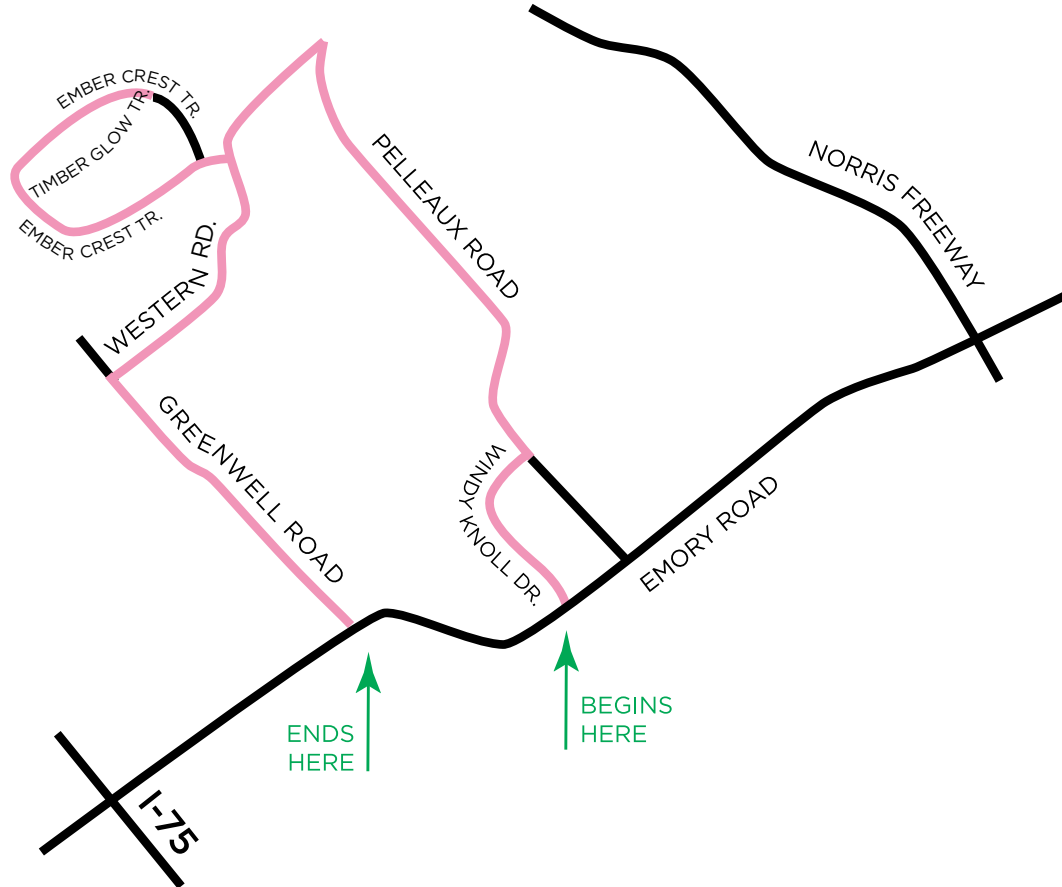

HALLS/TIMBERLINE

3.6 Miles | Established in late 1970s | Trail Begins at 7400 Windy Knoll Drive (37938)

This trail begins on Windy Knoll Dr. in the Meadowcrest neighborhood just off busy Emory Road and then winds through the beautiful Halls countryside to Timberline Estates. Developed in 1979, this community was designed with the vision that every tree possible would be spared during the construction phase. Located north of Knoxville and in the foothills of the Clinch mountains, the beautiful site was abundant with native Tennessee flowering dogwood trees. Timberline, together with the access roads, Greenwell and Pelleaux, represented Dogwood Arts' first trail outside Knoxville's city limits. Due to its strong support of Bazillion Blooms, Dogwood Arts annual tree-planting campaign which began in 2009, this peaceful neighborhood has added hundreds of blooming trees to the trail.

NORTH HILLS

2.8 Miles | Trail begins at 1999 North Hills Blvd (37917)

From its beginning in 1927, North Hills has been a unique one-of-a-kind setting for classic homes. The original 185-acre tract was developed by George, Carl and Hugh Fielden into approximately 250 residential lots for custom-built homes. Since the neighborhood was approximately 2 miles from the streetcar line on 6th Avenue, the North Hills Corporation ran a private bus service for neighborhood families until the city provided a similar service. By 1928, forty three homes were built and restrictive covenants were established to protect the area characteristics. Under those restrictions, homes of Craftsman, Colonial Revival, Foursquare, Spanish Colonial Revival, Bungalow, Italian Renaissance, English Cottage, Neoclassical, and Minimal Traditional were built. Most of the homes include brick, marble, stucco, and other Tennessee native stone in their construction. The first home was the brick Colonial-Revival styled two-story at 1929 North Hills Blvd.

The North Hills Garden Club was established in 1932 and remains an active partner in the neighborhood today. The North Hills Dogwood Trail and neighborhood gardens attract much interest during the annual Dogwood Arts spring celebration.

In 2008, about 130 homes and 50 acres along the three boulevards were designated a historic district in the National Register of Historic Places.

As a Level 1 Arboretum, the neighborhood, boulevards, and park exhibit a great diversity of trees, with over 40

labeled species of trees and more than 400 individual trees in the arboretum. The Flowering Dogwoods (*Cornus florida*), a primary symbol of Knoxville and focus of a spring city-wide festival, lead the count with over 200 individuals. Other common tree species include oak, hickory, maple, redbud, elm, crape myrtle, and mag-

nolia, and the arboretum also contains many labeled shrub species. The North Hills Garden Club and the city urban forestry program continue to add to the total number and diversity of trees. Also located in North Hills is a tree sanctuary recognized by the state with a collection of all the native magnolias.
