ents these perspectives.

Later, Biblical wisdom

held that each person is

held accountable for their

own actions (Deuteronomy

24:16). And even later, ill-

ness was considered the

result of demon possession

as described in Mark 9:17-

24. We moderns do not

believe illness is caused

by sinfulness or demons,

but there are things I

cannot explain, and Dr.

Peck's observations are as

thought-provoking as they

are disturbing.

Fifteen years ago, I entered a News-Sentinel writing contest and won the right to publish a series of opinion pieces as a community columnist. I can only remember one such column published on April 10, 2010. I remembered that column because the editor changed the title of my essay from "The Barely Civil War" to a politically correct and unmemorable plumb. I no longer write for the daily paper.

My point then and now is that we are at war with ourselves like never before since the actual Civil War. And the division goes far beyond Republican or Democratic policy differences or turf battles between the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government. Both Parties Have Always Tried To Nationalize Elections

The Democrats and the national media they control got in a big uproar when President Trump said a few days ago that he wanted Republicans to "nationalize

the elections," obviously referring to the upcoming midterm races.

The president's critics reacted in horror as though they had never heard of such a thing before and, of course, tried to put the worst possible spin on it.

Actually, efforts to "nationalize the elections" have been made by both parties whenever it is to their advantage to do so, and this has gone on ever since there have been elections.

In fact, almost all the

Democratic candidates have been trying much harder than Republicans to nationalize the elections ever since Trump came down the escalator at Trump Tower to announce he was running for president.

Democrats have tried to avoid talking about their unpopular stands on many national issues and instead have based their campaigns almost entirely on Trump hatred. Their platform has been Trump, Trump, Trump, and almost

nothing else.

This has been especially true over the last few months since the president's favorability has reached its lowest level.

The Democrats have tried to ignore or refused to admit that all over this country, people are fleeing the high taxes, high crime, wasteful government policies in Democrat-run cities and states and are moving in droves to conservative, low-tax, Republican areas.

Holier-than-thou liberal elitists have tried to proclaim that they are protectors of democracy. There is even a far-left national program called "Democracy Now!" Yet, these same "protectors" had court actions going in 30 states to try to keep Trump off the ballot until the U.S. Supreme Court ruled 9-0, including even the three liberals, that this was unconstitutional.

They overturned a decision by leftist "protectors of democracy" on the Colorado Supreme Court to kick Trump off the ballot in that state. If all these anti-Trump cases had been successful, the more than 77,000,000 who voted for him in 2024 would have been deprived of the right to do so.

Liberal elitists have always felt superior to "the little people" and believe that more people should be appointed rather than elected. Unfortunately, even in Tennessee, past actions by the state legislature have

taken away the right of the people to elect school superintendents in some counties, and have made most judges appointed rather than elected.

When President Trump said he wanted to nationalize the elections, all he really wants is honest, clean elections with voting being done only by American citizens. Democrats have wanted same-day voter registration so that it would be impossible to keep millions of illegal immigrants from voting. Their party is becoming more and more dependent on foreign-born voters - legal and illegal.

In a column in USA Today on Feb. 4th, Nicole Russell wrote that a 2025 poll by the Pew Research Center found 83% of Americans favor a law to require all voters to show a government type of ID. She also wrote that a Gallup Poll in 2024 found the same percentage favor requiring presentation of a government ID to register to vote for the first time. Democrats in the Senate have said they will filibuster any bill requiring voter identification.

Right now, the Democrats are trying to nationalize elections based on the unfortunate killing of two people by ICE officers in Minneapolis. Leftist organizations have mobilized demonstrations all over the country against these killings. Unfortunately, they

have not demonstrated against the many killings of women and children all over this country by illegal immigrants.

The most dramatic nationalization of an election I remember was by the Democrats a few weeks before the 1990 midterm elections. Their party went on the attack after the first President Bush went back on his "no new taxes" pledge.

A panicky, late-night meeting of the House Republicans was held in the historic Cannon Caucus Room. Ed Rollins was the head of the National Republican Congressional Committee, which was the campaign arm for Republicans running for the U.S. House.

He told us all Republicans had dropped by at least 10 points almost overnight. This meant that a 60-40 race was now 50-50, and one that had been 55-45 Republican was now 55-45 Democratic. His advice was to "run as far away from the president as possible." The White House sent orders the next day for Rollins to be fired, and he was.

Polls before that pledge was broken had predicted Republicans would pick up 20 to 30 seats in the House. Instead, we ended up losing nine seats, dropping from 175 to 166 in the 435-member House, a swing of almost 30 to 40 from the earlier polls.

School board splits on charter school waiver

Betsy Henderson and Steve Triplett abstained. With the nine-member board, it takes five affirmative votes for an issue to pass. Therefore, the motion failed.

The vote on the resolution to request the state to consider a waiver also failed on a split vote. Kristi, Morgan and Wright voted "yes." Templeton, Bike and Fontenot-Ridley voted "no," with Henderson, Triplett and Butler abstaining. Once again, the resolution failed for lack of five votes. Therefore, the board ended up taking no action.

During the public

comment time prior to board discussion, Lance McCord urged board members to fulfill their oath of office and uphold the state constitution and "stay out of religion."

In the regular board meeting, members recognized officials of the 18 Knox County schools that were recognized as Reward Schools by the state for the 2024-25 academic year. Schools are recognized as Reward Schools when they demonstrate high levels of performance and/or improvement by meeting objectives across performance indicators and student groups.

The board also heard a

presentation about proposed improvements in the Powell school district. Predicted growth and traffic congestion will have to be dealt with soon. Studies indicate that building new schools or adding to existing schools is not the best solution. The studies took into account existing enrollment and capacities of current schools and projected future enrollment and determined that the best solution would be to change the boundaries of districts to equalize student population. It is anticipated that at their March meeting, the board will consider zoning changes.

Honeycutt to the Pension Board.

Council members were also appointed to boards on Tuesday, including Lloyd, who was approved to chair the Golf Course Advisory Committee. Helsley was approved as the council's representative on the Knoxville Zoological Gardens board and Grant was chosen to chair the Public Property Naming Committee. Amelia Parker asked to be removed from the Rules Committee.

Three companies, Stansell Electric,

Davis H. Eliot Construction and Progression Electric, were approved for \$150,000

each to maintain the traffic signal management project. The Salvation Army was

granted \$205,000 for plumbing repairs

and improvements at the Joy Baker Center

and Hope Manor.

Councilwoman Amelia Parker applauded the efforts to provide shelter during the past two weeks of below-freezing temperatures and called for expanding those services and establishing funds in the budget to help.

The Western Heights and Old Sevier community groups were approved for \$650 in Neighborhood Small Grants to support community-building activities.

Numerous re-appointments and appointments were approved to boards and committees, including Dennis Murphy, Ben Ream and Jack Coker to the Better Building Board; Will Dorsey, Mark Grayson and Ashley Beals to the Public Arts Committee; and Councilman Nathan

This Tax Season Brings Historic Relief for Tennesseans

Last week marked the beginning of the 2026 tax season, which will deliver historic relief for Tennesseans thanks to the Working Families Tax Cuts (WFTC) signed into law by President Trump. This landmark law prevented the largest tax hike in our nation's history—\$4 trillion—and includes measures that will jumpstart the American Dream for millions across the country.

On Wednesday, I had the honor of joining President Trump and Treasury Secretary Bessent for the official summit for the Trump Accounts. With the new tax-advantaged accounts, which were established as part of the WFTC, Americans born between 2025 and 2028 will be eligible for a \$1,000 seed contribution from the Treasury Department. Parents may contribute up to \$5,000 a year, and children can access the accounts at age 18. Based on historic stock market averages, the Trump administration estimates the value of such accounts could range from \$50,000 to over \$300,000 by adulthood.

These accounts represent a monumental investment in the future of our children and grandchildren, empowering the next generation to invest in a college fund, put a down payment on a home, or start a business. Already, more than 600,000 families have applied for the

law also strengthens the federal adoption tax credit and expands 529 education savings accounts for both K-12 and higher education, empowering families to send their children to the schools that best meet their needs.

For seniors, the law includes my measure to provide a \$6,000 bonus

exemption to millions of low- and middle-income seniors, ensuring that they keep more of their hard-earned dollars, including Social Security.

For workers, the WFTC increased the standard deduction—used by roughly 9-in-10 Americans—significantly reducing their tax burden. While lowering taxes on tips and overtime pay, the law allows individuals to deduct up to \$10,000 each year on interest for America-made vehicles. The law also levels the playing field for Tennessee's independent music creators by including my HITS Act, which provides additional tax relief for writing off recording expenses.

For small businesses, the law permanently extends the 2017 Trump tax cuts that helped drive growth and investment across Tennessee, including the Permanent Qualified Business Income Deduction and 100 percent bonus depreciation. These tax incentives are estimated to save more than 100,000 jobs in Tennessee.

Altogether, Tennessee households will save an average of \$2,600 in taxes this year and see a long-run wage increase of up to \$10,000.

Unlike Democrats, Republicans understand that families do best when they have more money—not less—in their pocketbooks. With all the provisions in the Working Families Tax Cuts, every American will have something to celebrate this tax season.

improvements on county agenda

The Knox County Commission is scheduled to review 38 items at their agenda review meeting next Tuesday, several of which may receive some verbal debates. The commission will meet Tuesday, February 17 because Monday of that week is Presidents' Day.

The commissioners will decide which agenda items to discuss again later in the month during the Monday, February 23 regular session; most items on the agenda will go to the consent calendar list and be passed with one vote. Any commissioner may remove a consent item for discussion.

One agenda item that will probably see some debate is a deferred resolution from District 9 Commissioner Andy Fox.

He's calling for "encouraging the Knox County Sheriff's Office to undertake a Memorandum of Understanding for the 287(G) Task Force Model."

An enhanced Task Force Model would permit the

KCSO to go beyond its current policy and identify and

apprehend undocumented aliens.

Fox also has a presentation on the agenda entitled "A Christian's Biblical View of Illegal Immigration," where he plans to give examples of how the sacred text does not always give undocumented residents full integration into a community. His brief description of his presentation last month drew some strong objections from the audience and some of the commission members.

The commissioners are already commenting and being critical of each other on the Knox County Commission's online forum. Both Fox resolutions were introduced in January and postponed until this month's meeting.

The commission is also being asked, on first reading, to approve the creation of a juvenile center advisory board and place the center under the supervision of Juvenile Judge Tim Irwin. Currently, a four-member board of county commissioners is overseeing the facility and making the recommendation.

Several road improve-

ments are on the agenda and may well go into the consent list. One request from the Department of Engineering and Public Works is a right-of-way acquisition of land for the widening of Bakertown Road between Schaad and Ball roads. Other road improvements include the Johnson Road widening project, the Northshore Improvements project between the Concord and Chota roundabouts, stream and wetland mitigation along Ball Camp Pike, and a highway-rail agreement for a crossing at Westcott Blvd. and Crossland Road.

The KCSO is requesting approval of \$17,000 from the Joint Law Enforcement Operations Task Force for overtime reimbursement and a lease agreement for 10 years with Corporate Square L.P. for the West Precinct office at 9000 Executive Park Drive.

The commissioners are also being asked to approve \$744,983.34 in U.S. Housing and Urban Development funds for the construction of four fixed units of multifamily rental housing for the Everett Pointe development.

A \$1,291,600 state

grant request from the Knox County Health Department is on the agenda. The health department is also seeking approval of a \$70,000 boost from the state for recruiting, retaining and training of public health workers, an increase in tuberculosis control funding from the state, and \$150,000 from the state for healthy food environments and safe and accessible spaces for physical activity services.

The Information Technology Department is asking for an agreement with Tyler Technologies INC to renew software at \$1.8 million.

Chairwoman Gina Oster is asking to support the Knox County Bridge to Safety program using the Sheriff's Victims Assistance Fund to receive the monies.

District 7 Commissioner Rhonda Lee plans to honor Janice White for her community service, and the commission may hear presentations from Jeff Bagwell of Rural Metro and Mike Hammond on the Bridge to Safety Program.

George Ewart is requesting permission to rezone a general residential property and change it to rural preservation. The District 1 property is on Riverside Drive.

The rural preservation zone focuses on protecting agricultural land, natural resources and scenic, open spaces from suburban sprawl. This zoning aims to limit development to agriculture and agri-tourism, requiring minimum lot sizes of 15 acres.

George Ewart submitted the zoning change request for the property owner, Karen Claussen. The 64.82-acre site is near Holston Hill Road.

The zoning session will also hear three multi-unit housing requests from developers, with Mesana Investments LLC asking to change 7716 Strawberry Plains Pike from agricultural to planned residential to build nine dwelling units per acre. Clean Slate Realty LLC is asking for

2.5 units per acre at 9717 Ball Camp School Road and Smart Hospitality LLC is asking to change 1215 Everett Road to planned residential for 12 units per acre.

Abdulrahman Qasem is asking for a change from agricultural to low-density residential for 1402 Andes Road, and SH Build Group Team is asking to change a Lovell Road property from neighborhood commercial to planned residential.

The commission may also discuss changes to the Knox County Code related to vested rights following recent changes in the Knox County Comprehensive Plan.

The second reading of the change was recommended by the planning commission and

The Aristocrat in Politics

Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania

Pages from the Past

Gifford Pinchot (pronounced Pin-Show) was the epitome of the aristocrat in politics. Immensely wealthy, Pinchot dedicated himself to conservation and was a perennial office seeker. The future governor was motivated to participate in politics for a number of reasons, which included his admiration of Theodore Roosevelt and his fervent belief in the conservation of America's forests. Pinchot was a resident of Pennsylvania, one of the most boss-ridden states in the country. The master of the Pennsylvania political machine was wealthy, acquisitive Boies Penrose, who sat in the United States Senate. A powerful political machine operated in Philadelphia under Congressman William Vare. The Vare machine was unusual in that, unlike virtually every other urban big-city machine in the country, it was Republican rather than Democratic. The machine was so powerful it nominated James Montgomery Beck for a seat in Congress to represent a working-class district. Beck did not live in the district or even the state; Beck was a resident of Washington, D.C. Beck rented what TIME magazine referred to as "a sleazy apartment in a poor district of Philadelphia which he never occupied." Beck's residency was challenged, but he was seated after having won the election.

Gifford Pinchot was married to Cornelia Bryce, a red-headed, formidable and accomplished woman in her own right. Called "Leila" by her friends and family, Cornelia Bryce Pinchot was an ardent advocate for the rights of women and like her husband, was an outspoken progressive. She and Gifford lived at Gray Towers, the ancestral home of the Pinchot family. Like most everything else she encountered, Cornelia Bryce Pinchot left her mark on Gray Towers as well.

Gray Towers was designed and built by famed architect Richard Morris Hunt, who was responsible for Biltmore House and quite a few of the remarkable "cottages" on Millionaires' Row in Newport, Rhode Island. Gray Towers was built in the style of a French château, originally situated on 303 acres with numerous other outbuildings built on the property. Gray Tower sat atop a gentle slope in Milford, Pennsylvania, overlooking the Delaware River. After Cornelia Bryce Pinchot's death, her son donated Gray Towers to the government of the United States.

Both of Gifford's parents came from successful families and his mother, Mary, was the daughter of


Amos Eno, one of the richest developers in New York City. Pinchot's interest in forestry was encouraged by his parents, and apparently, his father suggested he become a forester. It was while managing the forests surrounding Biltmore House that Pinchot fell in love. The object of his affection was Laura Houghteling, whose family lived nearby. The two were engaged to be married, but Laura tragically died of tuberculosis before they could be married. Pinchot's grief was deep and profound. At the time, when someone lost a loved one, he or she wore dark clothes as a sign of being in mourning. Pinchot wore mourning clothes for several years after Laura's death and did not marry for 20 years.

Gifford Pinchot and Cornelia Bryce became acquainted through their mutual work on behalf of progressive causes, and the two were married in 1914. Their union produced one child, Gifford Bryce Pinchot. Cornelia Pinchot was as interested in politics as was her husband. At least three times she ran for the GOP nomination for the House of Representatives, losing each time. Mrs. Pinchot was an independent and very outspoken woman for her time.

By 1898, Pinchot was head of the Division of Forestry inside the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Gifford Pinchot took what was then the somewhat unusual position that the federal government should protect and conserve the country's natural resources, a policy that was opposed to those who had previously occupied his position. Pinchot's view of forestry and conservation met a kindred soul in Theodore Roosevelt, who assumed the presidency following the assassination of William McKinley in 1901. The two became friends, and together they lobbied Congress to create the United States Forest Service. That federal agency was charged with overseeing the forest reserves of the country, and President Roosevelt named Pinchot as the first Chief Forester of the United States.

Pinchot continued as America's chief forester under the administration of William Howard Taft, but the two did not have a close relationship. Taft mistrusted Pinchot, whom the chief executive thought was "a strange combination" of a "socialist and spiritualist." Taft thought Pinchot was "capable of any extreme act," and the president frowned upon those occasions when he felt the chief forester was acting beyond his authority under the law.

Eventually, Gifford

Pinchot intervened on behalf of an Interior Department employee who was upset about Secretary Richard Ballinger having approved claims to mine disputed coal in Alaska. Pinchot was very vocal in his criticisms of Secretary Ballinger and was eventually fired by President Taft for insubordination.

Pinchot sought out former President Theodore Roosevelt when the two were traveling in Europe and discussed his dismissal. Gifford Pinchot delightedly bolted the Republican Party to become a Progressive and gleefully supported the candidacy of Theodore Roosevelt against William Howard Taft. Splitting the Republican Party asunder, neither won, and allowed Democratic nominee Woodrow Wilson win the election with a plurality of the vote.

Pinchot continued to affiliate with the Progressive Party and was the nominee against GOP incumbent U.S. Senator Boies Penrose in the 1914 election. Senator Penrose won easily, although Pinchot tallied more votes than the Democratic nominee.

Like most of the others who followed Theodore Roosevelt out of the Republican Party, they followed him back into the GOP. Pinchot supported the candidacy of Warren Harding in 1920. There was no appointment to any office forthcoming from the Harding administration, but Pinchot did receive an appointment from Governor William Sprout to serve as the head of Pennsylvania's forest commission in 1920. Working with his customary zeal, Pinchot quickly lobbied the legislature successfully for more money, weeded out political appointees and replaced them with professionals, and streamlined the effectiveness of the commission.

Pinchot announced his candidacy to become governor of Pennsylvania when

he entered the Republican primary in 1922. Pinchot only narrowly edged out George Alter for the GOP nomination by just over 9,000 votes out more than a million cast. In the general election, Gifford Pinchot won by more than 250,000 votes, tallying more than 56% of the ballots cast.

Governor Pinchot was faced with a bitter coal strike during the first year he was in office. He worked to settle it as quickly as possible, summoning both owners and workers to the state capitol. The governor located the mine owners in one room and the workers and their representatives in another. The tall and lanky governor shuttled back and forth between the rooms as he tried to negotiate an agreement. Pinchot took elements from both sides and helped to craft a compromise which both sides eventually accepted, albeit both complained they had been done an injustice. Perhaps it was indicative of a truly fair settlement.

"I made no threat whatever," Pinchot told newsmen. "The settlement was brought about by my insistence that the principles proposed were right and just." Pinchot had helped to end the strike just one week after it had started.

When Gifford Pinchot assumed office as governor, the state was operating with a deficit in its treasury of some \$32 million, a considerable sum for the time. Pinchot worked hard to balance the books and by the time he left office, the governor had Pennsylvania running in the black and left a surplus of more than \$6 million.

Pinchot was viewed by some as the progressive alternative to President Calvin Coolidge, who had succeeded to the White House following the sudden death of Warren Harding. Ironically, it was Pinchot's work with the coal strike that helped to derail his presidential ambitions. As a

result of the settlement proposed by Governor Pinchot, coal prices rose steadily, which was much resented by consumers.

At the time, Pennsylvania did not allow its governors to seek a second consecutive term in office. Barred from running again, Gifford Pinchot opted to run for the United States Senate once again in 1926. The incumbent was George Wharton Pepper, a Republican who had been a very well-respected attorney who had been appointed to succeed Boies Penrose in 1922. Pepper had subsequently been elected to serve the remaining four years of Penrose's term.

The campaign for the GOP nomination for the United States Senate quickly became a three-cornered fight between Governor Pinchot, Senator Pepper and Congressman William S. Vare of Philadelphia. Vare was the boss of the enormously powerful Philadelphia machine, which could produce astonishingly large majorities for its favored candidates.

Pinchot ran a distant third while Senator Pepper lost the GOP nomination to Congressman Vare by 81,000 votes. Vare only carried one county outside of Philadelphia, but his majority in his home town was quite nearly a massive 224,000 votes.

Governor Pinchot refused to certify Vare's win in the general election, pointing to instances of fraud and corruption. The expenditures by the Vare campaign and questionable results caused the Senate to refuse a seat to William S. Vare.

As Governor Pinchot gave his farewell message before the state legislature, the restless legislators suddenly snapped to attention when the chief executive mentioned "gangs." "After four years in a position to learn the facts, I am going out of office with the most hearty contempt not only

for the morals and intentions but also for the minds of the gang politicians of Pennsylvania," Pinchot snapped. The governor denounced the "Mellon machine in Pittsburgh" and the "Mitten machine in Philadelphia" and said the machines were rife with "men who depend for the living and their power, on liquor, crime, vice." "These are the men the magnates buy," Pinchot sniffed. "These are the men they protect from time to time against the revolt of honest citizens who would otherwise destroy them."

As for the machine bearing the name of Andrew Mellon, the treasury secretary under presidents Harding and Coolidge, Governor Pinchot charged ordinarily respectable people "shut their eyes and make common cause with gangsters, vote thieves, dive keepers, criminals and harlots, because of the social and financial eminence of the Mellon name."

For his comments, the governor received a smattering of applause and a torrent of jeers and hisses from legislators. Four years later, Pinchot was back once again campaigning to recapture the governor's office. To the horror of the old guard, Pinchot won the primary election and the Republican nomination. While Pinchot carried Pittsburgh in the general election, the Philadelphia machine refused to back the former governor and supported the Democratic nominee, John Hemphill. The result was a very narrow win for Gifford Pinchot, who won with 50.77% of the vote. Part of the small margin of Pinchot's win was the increasing difficulty imposed upon people by the effects of the Great Depression.

During his second term, Pinchot once again wrestled with the budget while doing his best to help those who were suffering intensely due to the Depression.

Governor Pinchot prodded the legislature to approve money to help the indigent and poor and worked during his last two years in office with President Franklin Roosevelt's administration.

Term-limited once again in 1934, Gifford Pinchot made a third bid for a seat in the United States Senate, challenging incumbent Senator David A. Reed, one of the louder voices against the New Deal in the chamber. Reed won the GOP nomination by almost 99,000 votes.

Gifford Pinchot's last hurrah in elective politics came during the 1938 election when he sought once again to return to the governor's mansion. Bitterly opposed by the few remnants of the machines, conservatives and the old guard, Pinchot campaigned gamely but lost decisively to Lieutenant Governor Arthur James.

For the rest of his life, Gifford Pinchot traded verbal blows with curmudgeonly Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes and remained active until he died on October 4, 1946, at age 81, a victim of leukemia.

Anxiety: The Invisible Storm

Imagine walking through a quiet, empty city at night. Put yourself there. The streets are familiar, but every shadow seems to move. Every distant sound, a car door slamming, a dog barking that doesn't seem far away, a footstep echoing, feels amplified and even threatening. Your chest tightens. Your hands start to sweat, and your mind races with "what ifs" that begin to spiral out of control. You try to breathe, but each inhale feels heavy, each exhale shallow. Your body trembles even though nothing is attacking you, nothing is chasing you, yet the terror is as real as if it were. This is anxiety; an invisible storm that traps you in your own mind, making the ordinary feel dangerous and the familiar feel unsafe.

Anxiety is not imagination. It's not a trick of the mind or a weakness to overcome; it is real, tangible and relentless. It floods your brain with racing chemicals, ignites intrusive thoughts that

refuse to let go, and sends your heart pounding as if your body is under siege. Your chest tightens, your breath catches and it can feel as though your very own mind has turned against you, locking you

in a cage of fear and uncertainty. But listen carefully: This does not mean you are broken. It means that you are human. You are living in a world that is unpredictable, often overwhelming, and full of pressures beyond your control, and your mind is responding to the weight of it with the very mechanisms God designed to protect you.

The enemy's strategy is more than fear; it is to convince you that you are helpless, isolated, and defeated. Paul describes the spiritual side of this battle in 2 Corinthians 10:3-5 and says, "... the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds; casting down imaginations ... and bringing every thought into captivity to the

obedience of Christ." The battlefield is in your mind. It's important to remember that God has given us powerful weapons to fight anxiety: a Word that dissolves lies, worship that lifts our eyes, and a Savior who has made us more than conquerors.

Imagine anxiety as a shadowy figure lurking in your mind, whispering doubts and fears. It tells you, "You're not safe. Something bad is coming!" But amid that storm, faith offers a different voice.

God says, "I am your refuge. I hold you even when the world feels like it's falling apart."

Anxiety persists: "You're alone. Nobody sees this battle." And yet, God assures, "I am near to the brokenhearted. I see every tear, every tremble of your heart."

When anxiety insists, "You can't handle this. You're trapped!" God responds, "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. You are not confined, and My power is at work in you."

Even in the moments when it seems hopeless, "This will never end. You're losing control", faith whispers back, "Trust Me. I hold all things together. My grace is sufficient, and My peace is yours if you will reach for it."

In the tug-of-war between fear and faith, there is a profound reminder: no matter how dark the shadow of anxiety, there is a voice of reassurance, strength and hope.

Victory over anxiety doesn't happen all at once. It begins moment by moment: one thought taken captive, one Scripture spoken, one act of worship chosen. As these moments accumulate, freedom begins to replace fear and peace starts to fill the spaces anxiety once dominated. Anxiety may be real, but so are God's promises. Fear does not get the final word. Step into His Word. Worship. Trust Him. Win the moment, one by one, and watch as anxiety's grip loosens, and the quiet, steady rhythm of peace begins to fill your life.

This Trailblazer hasn't quite burned out

Not every fire turns into a blaze. Some begin with a spark and never get going. Others are tiny and blow out quickly like a candle on a birthday cake. All fires, though, have a chance to be big and productive and clear paths for others.

The latter was like Lisa Myers in the world of sports, and specifically, high school sports. She played and coached for a long time and earned the title "Legacy Trailblazer" from the Tennessee Secondary Schools Athletic Association.

Galen Johnson struck the first match when he brought Lisa with him when he became the first principal at William Blount, the new high school in Blount County in 1979-80.

Lisa had been at Porter High for three years until that school was consolidated with other small high schools in Blount County. At Porter, she played 6-on-6 basketball and was a guard. That was the only sport Porter had.

In her only year at William Blount, Myers was a senior post player and part of the first team to shoot a basketball in its gym and the first to letter and captain four sports. She also was a member of the first girls basketball team in school history to play full-court basketball (5-on-5) and compete in the state tournament.

After her graduation from William Blount, she played college ball until she had an injury at UNC-Asheville. After college, she started working at UT hospital before deciding to teach and coach on the high school level. Mike Asquith offered her a position at Doyle High,

What does Myers cherish about her career?

"The connections you make," said Lisa Myers. "Not only the kids, but their parents, their brothers and sisters, cousins and their friends and the very fact that ninety-nine percent of the time everything was good and it was positive. And I received a great education in Blount County schools and I know the kids that we had in Knox County received a good education.

"It was like there was an invisible hand. Somebody was always pushing you to do better. You don't go backwards. You keep going forwards. And I hope I instilled that. Not only with the athletes, but the kids that were in my class. We don't quit. We do our best. Any job worth doing, it's worth doing your best. When you teach, you coach. I walked up and down the front of the class. I coach all day long. What I cherish the most is all the acquaintances I've met along the way."

Lisa coached basketball and softball and helped with track, too. Later on, she did the announcing for baseball coach Robbie Howard's games for 14 years.

Myers taught for 26 years in all at South-Doyle.

Whatever Memphis city leaders did must have worked

It wasn't too long ago, in the late 1980s, actually, that Alabama and Auburn were squabbling over the venue of the "Iron Bowl."


Finally, Auburn drew a line in the sand. Auburn would play its "home games" in Auburn, a seemingly reasonable request in some circles, an unreasonable one in others.

Alabama threatened all kinds of repercussions, including canceling the series or keeping the game at Birmingham's Legion Field, a venue seemingly ordained by higher powers.

The "Iron Bowl" couldn't be played anywhere else, could it? That was the spin put out by Alabama and Birmingham civic and community leaders.

The games are now being played on each campus at stadiums much larger than Legion Field, and the rivalry hasn't suffered one iota. Alabama partisans who had once said "Never" to playing at Auburn, now head to Lee County every other year.

Alabama did get in one last shot at Auburn fans before the 1989 game, raising the specter of a

Their comment, expressed in bumper stickers and other media, was to the point: "Your a-- on your grass."

That didn't happen. Auburn won, but this was the stuff of which great rivalries are made.

Closer to home, there were those across Big Orange Country who expressed great fear and trepidation relative to trips to Auburn, Ala., Starkville and Oxford, Miss., and even Athens, Ga., instead of Birmingham and Memphis, or in Georgia's case, not

playing the Bulldogs at all between 1938 and 1967.

It took the Vols until 1974 to play in Auburn. They've been there to stay since 1980. Tennessee returned to Starkville in 1987 and Oxford in 1988 after a game at each venue in the early 1950s. Tennessee never played in Oxford before 1951 and had played in Starkville only three times (1910, 1920, and 1926).

It always seemed more convenient to go to Memphis to play Mississippi State or Ole Miss instead of Starkville or Oxford. Even the Bulldogs and Rebels thought it was a good idea.

All three teams have strong fan bases in Memphis and West Tennessee, but things always seemed strange about Tennessee being the visiting team against a Mississippi school in Memphis.

Community honchos in the Bluff City tried to get as many games in Crump Stadium as they could over the years, with games featuring Tennessee, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, and Arkansas, among others. There were day-night doubleheaders scheduled - Tennessee versus Ole Miss in the afternoon, Mississippi State versus

Arkansas, in the evening, for example. Whatever Memphis city leaders did must have worked.

There was one trip to Starkville that was a comedy of errors. The year was 1950. To begin with, the Vol team plane landed at the wrong airport, one where grass was growing through the cracks in the concrete. Former Vol center Bob Davis remembered that facet of the trip well. Then the Vols lost to State 7-0.

After the game, another Bob, this time General Robert Neyland, reportedly told his players their only friends were the people on the plane with them. The Vols ended up 11-1 that season, playing and defeating Texas in the Cotton Bowl.

The series with Georgia resumed in 1968, and, with the advent of divisional play in the early 1990s, the series between the neighboring states is as hot and heavy as any Tennessee has played in recent years.

The first two games were something to behold. Tennessee stole a 17-17 tie on Sept. 14, 1968. Bubba Wyche tossed a controversial TD pass to Gary Kreis and a two-point conversion pass to Ken DeLong after the clock at the North end of Neyland Stadium had hit

double zeroes.

Georgia folks thought they had Tennessee right where they wanted them on a rainy day in Athens on Nov. 1, 1969. However, in the game played between the legendary hedges, the Vols won 17-3. Curt Watson and Don McLear each gained more than 100 yards rushing.

Vol fans also incessantly worried about having to play Memphis State, known as Memphis, in one of those games perceived by many in the Vol fan base as "nothing to gain, and everything to lose."

That series began in 1968, after some indelicate political wrangling. The Vols have won 22 of the 23 games played, but the 1996 game, Memphis 21, Tennessee 17, was a classic upset.

The rivalries may be more competitive and intense than ever, if that's possible.

The inexorable passage of time has a way of defusing nearly any game site controversy. But at the time these controversies arose, they were issues that engendered considerable debate and even rancor.

Jason Mayfield earns milestone victory with Lady Admirals

When Jason Mayfield took the Farragut High School girls basketball head coaching job, he inherited one of the area's most successful programs, built by former coaches Mike Driver and Wes Edmonds.

Mayfield immediately made his mark on the program as Farragut

battled against some of Tennessee's best players and teams.

Longtime regulars in the state sectional round of the playoffs, the Lady Admirals finally made the state tournament in 2022, where they reached the title game before losing to Kingston Pike rival Bearden.

While his tenure at Farragut has been packed with excitement and some big wins, there have been a few hard times as well.

"The first three years I was here, we lost three (state sectional) games, and we lost two of those on last-second shots, and those were hard to take," Mayfield said. "But you learn from those, too."

Mayfield refuses to take credit for his success. Instead, he lauds his players and also a solid group of assistant coaches, including several former Lady Admirals, who have come back to work in Farragut's program.

The former Lady Admirals who are working or have worked in

the program include: Alex Munday (who played before Mayfield was the coach), Madison Maples, Claire Wyatt and Kristen Freeman.

Another former assistant, Jesse Booher, played for Mayfield when he was an assistant coach with the Karns boys. Another former assistant, Jessica Sweat, was a star player at Halls High School, and still another, Andy Arendt, is the head boys coach at Hardin Valley Academy.

"We've had a lot of greats, whether it's Alex, Madison or Jessica (who spent multiple seasons with the program), or Claire and Kristen, who had one year to help before medical school," Mayfield said. "Jesse is a former player. He played for me at Karns."

"And Andy, he's the head boys coach at Hardin Valley, and he's doing great things over there."

great feel for their commitment to getting things rolling here. We really like the people. They felt like people we wanted to be around. We're excited.

KF: What are your thoughts on the current state of the Webb program?

GQ: I don't know how quick a fix it's going to be. Numbers were low. I think they finished the year because of injuries and other things, with like 20-something kids on the team. That's not a really good recipe for a football team. So, we are trying to build it and build it the right way that's sustainable, hopefully from the ground up with your middle school and all those things. That's kind of the goal here.

KF: What will your staff look like, and do you anticipate any turnover?

GQ: Some assistant coaches are coming back, some aren't. We are trying to get more guys who are in the building. I think that was one of the tough things for Don (Mahoney, former HC).
